### OPEN MEETINGS MANDATORY BY GOVERNMENTAL BODIES

Gov. John Connally, on May 22, signed into law an "Open Meetings" bill which he proclaimed as "a great step forward for the people of Texas." He was referring to Senate Bill 94 sponsored by Sen. Chet Brooks of Pasadena. Similar legislation was introduced in the House by Rep. Bill Rapp of Raymondville. Passage of the "Open Meetings" legislation at the 1967 session culminated a drive that began some 20 years ago. It was engineered by legislators and the press to insure a better flow of information to the public. At the bill signing ceremony, Governor Connally made this statement regarding the importance of the legislation: "Senate Bill 94, commonly known as the open meetings bill, provides basically that all meetings of boards, agencies and commissions shall be open meetings, open to the press. This is something that the working press in the capitol and the press throughout the state have been interested in for a long, long time. I think it's an historic and significant bill and a significant day. "Certainly there's never been any desire, as far as I know, on the part of anyone who serves on a board or an agency or commission to transact its business under the cloak of

secrecy. But, nevertheless, the meetings have, from time to time, been closed." Connally added: "This bill will now end that and provide that all the meetings shall be open to the press. It's a great step forward in trying to provide a means where the public can be more informed with respect to governmental affairs and public affairs. "Beyond any question, one of the weaknesses of a democratic society is that it's always difficult to try to articulate and to inform the public of the problems that surround the administration of government. I personally feel that if the public is informed, if it has the knowledge, people themselves will always make the right decisions. And this is going to be a step in providing the means where people can be better informed on the workings of their government." Governor Connally further stated: "This is particularly important because the affairs of this state are run by the various agencies, boards and commissions. People generally do not quite understand the significance of these various boards, agencies and commissions and the work that they do and the decisions they make. It is really the heart and the essence of government in Texas.

Premiums and awards for the registered show include cash awards, trophies to all class winners and champions and ribbons through six places. In the Youth Activities there will be no cash awards but there will be beautiful trophies to all class winners in each age division.

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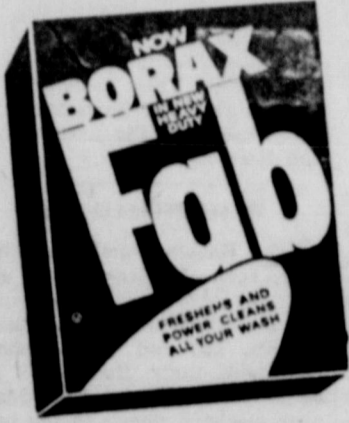

## Miss Jinx Reeder Becomes Bride Of R. A. Shaver 111 On Friday, June 23

Miss Jinx Reeder became the bride of R. A. Shaver 111 in an impressive marriage ceremony held Friday, June 23 at the First Christian Church of Knox City. The double ring ceremony which took place at the late afternoon hour of 5:30 o'clock was characterized for its beautiful simplicity and solemnity.

The Rev. David Downing, pastor of the Knox City Christian Church read the sacred marriage ceremony before an altar setting which featured an exclusive theme of magnificent white. Glimmering light from 48 white candles enhanced the beauty of two white foor baskets filled to overflowing with white gladioli. Slender tapers of white in Spanish wrought iron candelabras of prymaid-style encircled the white satin covered prie deau where the couple knelt for their exchange of vows. White satin ribbon streamers centered by massive bows of the satin ribbon beautifully marked the magnificent background of the numerous candleholders. Gracing the piano was an epergne of White milk glass holding white mums. Family pews were noted

with white satin ribbon bows and ribbon streamers set with bouquets of white daisies.

Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Shaver Jr. were hosts at their home in Rochester on the evening before to a beautifully appointed rehearsal dinner.

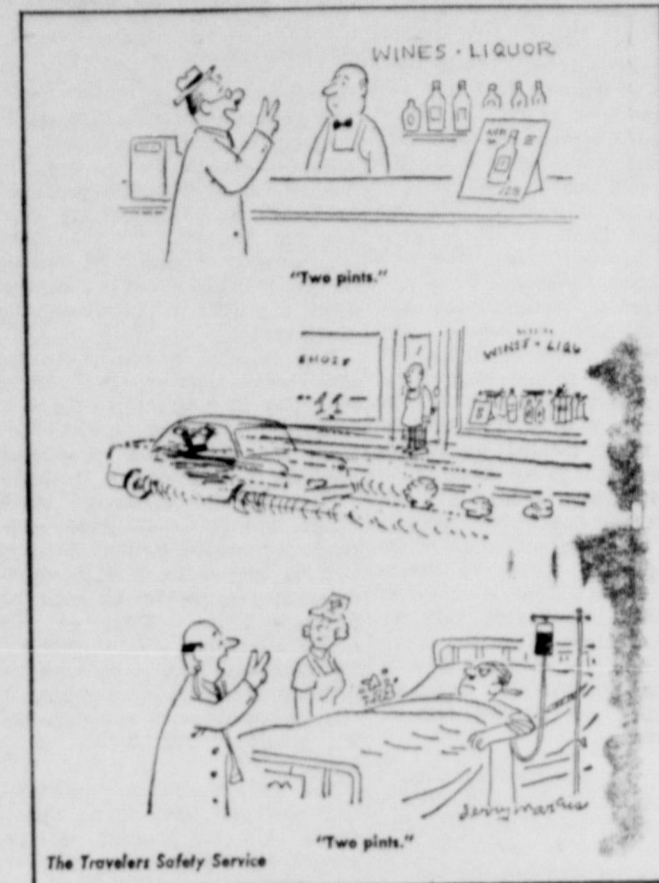
### ATTEND FUNERAL

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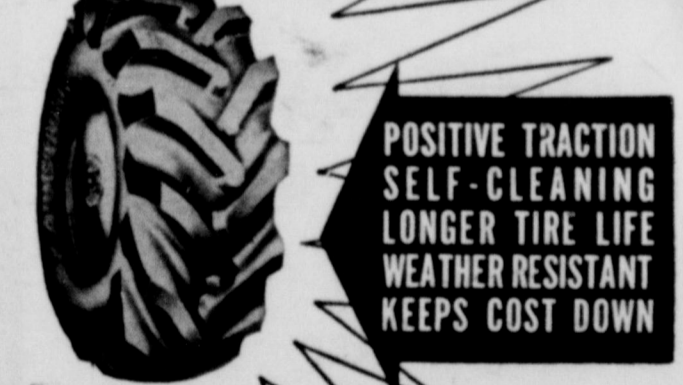
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
