BAIRD MEMBERS JOIN NATIONAL FFA WEEK

Vocational agriculture students in Baird High School will join Future Farmers of America members throughout the nation in activities to focus attention on the importance of agriculture during National FFA Week, Feb. 15-22.

Locally, members of the Baird FFA Chapter plan to join other area members in attending the district FFA banquet, Monday night. Elaine Hass, chapter sweetheart, and other area sweethearts will represent the chapters there.

The National Future Farmers organization has 395,812 members, with 8,372 local chapters in

the 50 states and Puerto Rico. The Baird chapter has 51 members who have participated in stock shows at Dallas, Ft. Worth, Houston, Abilene, El Paso, and the county show at Cross Plains this school year.

The chapter project program has consisted of 43 beef animals, 67 swine, 44 sheep, 32 dairy animals, which have shown a total labor income of \$4,177.16.

Two Baird chapter members received showmanship awards for swine and cattle in the county show this year.

The chapter's main project this year is to sponsor an FFA Rodeo sometime in June.

Trent Girls Avenge Early Defeats By Pinning First Loss on Baird

It was the end of a long trail Saturday night in Abilene, but it was quite possibly the beginning of another.

The trail's end, which came in the final game of the annual Hardin-Simmons University basketball tournament, was for a 30-game winning streak by the Baird High School girls' team.

The beginning could be of a playoff string for the team, which stashed away 17 district championship last week.

Defending champion Trent proved the spoiler for the Callahan County sextet. Trent took home the crown with an 81-64 victory to avenge three earlier defeats at the hand of Baird.

Paula Corn was named to the all-tournament first team as a forward and Betty Corn received second-team honors as a guard. Paula Corn banked in 127 points during the tourney, third high for the tournament.

She scored 27 of the points in the finale while Elaine Hass

had 19. But they were no match for the barrage by Trent's DeLores Barnes with 35 and Barbara McAninch and Diana Lewis with 23 points each.

Trent raced to a 22-7 lead by the end of the first quarter, and that was the difference. At half-time it was 40-27 and by the end of the third quarter the count was 55-44.

Baird gained the semifinals by downing Lueders, 56-48 with Karen Bearden pumping in 30 points, and smashed into the finals with a 67-52 decision over Sands as Paula Corn shredded the cords for 47 big points.

Earlier in the tournament Baird outdistanced Anson, 69-35 with Miss Corn hitting 34 markers.

The Baird girls assured themselves of a spot in bi-district play the same day they began playing in the H-SU tournament — Thursday — with an easy 77-16 romp.

District Champion Baird Girls Set Twin Practice Games for Next Week

Baird's district champion girls basketballers will play a pair of practice games next week, tuning up for a bi-district clash which will be played either March 2 or 3.

The Callahan sextet will visit Abilene Wylie Tuesday night, then host the same team for a return engagement Friday night, Feb. 21.

Bi-district opposition for the team will come from either Goldthwaite or Copperas Cove, currently tied for the lead in their district. A playoff between the teams appears likely.

The Baird girls wound up their regular district slate Tuesday night with a 92-14 trouncing of an inept Ranger team. Ranger's Bulldogs took the second game of the night, however, 47-38 to clinch the District 10-A boys title.

Baird wrapped up the girls game in the first quarter, piling up 31 points while holding Ranger scoreless. The Callahan County crew slowed up the pace in the second quarter, scoring only six more points while Ranger got five for a 38-5 halftime count. It was 72-10 as the fourth quarter started.

Paula Corn ripped the nets for 41 points to show the way, while Karen Bearden had 20, Yvonne Shelnett made nine, Elaine Hass picked up seven,

and Sally Green meshed six. Sue Graham made 12 of Ranger's 14 points.

The Bulldogs overcame an early Baird lead to capture the boys game. The Bears jumped to a 9-6 lead by the end of the first quarter, and it was 21-21 at halftime. Ranger held a 37-28 edge after three quarters.

Wally Harris paced the Bears with 19 points, while Ronnie Hinds was high for Ranger with 17.

Baird and Albany split a twin bill last Thursday, with Baird's girls winning a 77-16 romp behind the 25-point outburst by Miss Corn, and Albany taking a slim 62-61 decision in the nightcap.

In the boys game Tommy Barton posted 21 points for Baird, which held a 44-43 margin going into the final quarter. Albany was in front, 18-8, after one quarter and held a 27-24 edge at halftime.

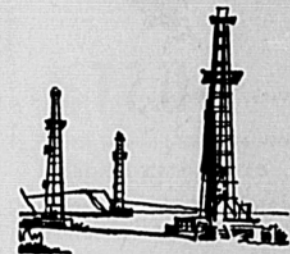

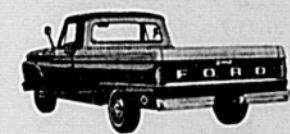

Attendance forecasts at Six Flags for the 1964 season indicate that the park will draw an estimated 1,500,000 visitors.



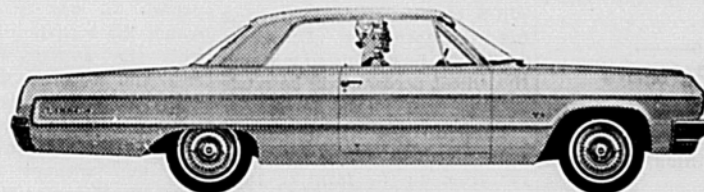
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Peanut Short Course to be Held In Rising Star Feb. 17, 18 and 20

County Farmers Get Wheat Cards

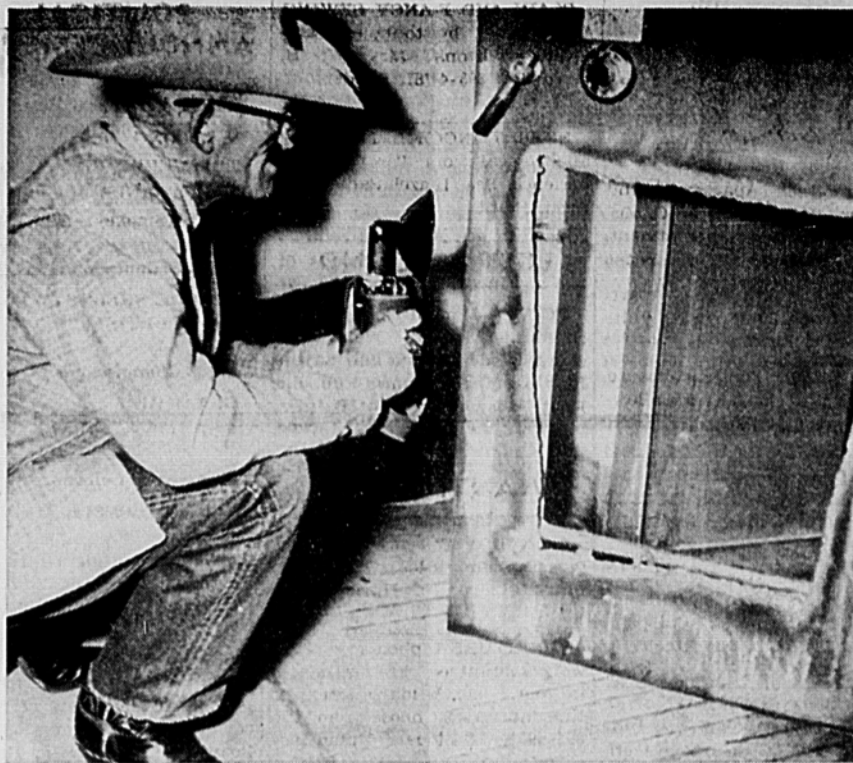
Farmers in Callahan County who have wheat acreage allotments on their farms have been mailed postal cards which they are asked to complete and return to the ASCS County Office as soon as possible, Tommie Harris, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said Thursday.

While postal cards have been used in previous years in connection with wheat allotment programs, he explained, their return this year is more important than ever.

Since marketing quotas are not in effect for 1964, farm measurement of 1964 wheat acreage will not be made unless requested either by returning the card or by calling at the ASCS county office to furnish needed information. Upon request, the farm visit to measure the wheat acreage will be made without cost to the farmer.

The card asks (1) how many acres of wheat will be harvested for grain on the farm in 1964, (2) whether the farmer intends to apply for price support on the 1964 wheat crop, and (3) if the allotment is more than 13.5 acres and the farmer will not apply for price support, whether he wants the wheat measured to preserve maximum acreage history credit.

Harris urged farmers return the cards as soon as possible so the county office may obtain measurements and give producers an opportunity to adjust excess wheat acreage before the final disposition date.

Heavy Safe Turns Back Burglars In Attempt on Moran Nat'l Bank

Burglars found the going heavy and the rewards few last week when they attempted to cut into the safe of the Moran National Bank.

Foiled by a 3,000-pound safe which they cut on with a torch and crashed with what was probably a sledge hammer, the burglars finally made off with \$1,290.83 in silver but left \$13,000 in cash and \$15,000 in negotiable securities.

The change — which weighed in the neighborhood of 200 pounds — was in the vault which the intruders sliced open with the cutting torch. The cash and securities were in the heavy old safe inside the vault.

When officers arrived Friday morning, the safe was on its side and was without a handle, knocked off during the burglars' attempt to open it. The torch cut about an inch into the

safe's surface before the burglars gave up the effort as hopeless.

The burglary was discovered about 7:30 a.m. Friday by Don Ellis, bank vice president, when he came to work. It was the first burglary attempt ever on the bank.

Entry was gained to the building through a window. The wall into the directors' room was then kicked through to give room to set up the acetylene torch unit.

The torch sliced a 24x18 inch hole into the vault, then opened the inner vault before being foiled by the safe. Damage to the vaults and safe were estimated at more costly than the loss of silver taken by the thieves.

The bank was open for business again Friday afternoon. No arrests had been made in the case by Thursday afternoon.

Want Refund on Tax? Help IR Read Return

"When will I get my refund?" is one of the most frequent tax questions according to Ellis Campbell Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue. He said that failure to receive a refund — check or savings bond — is usually caused by illegible names or addresses.

Campbell said it is permissible to sign your name at the bottom of the return the way you always sign your name, even if your signature is a hurried scrawl. At the top of the return, however, your name should also be carefully printed or typed along with your social security number. In other words, eliminate any doubt as to who you are and where you live.

Each year thousands of refund checks are returned to Internal Revenue offices because the postman cannot deliver them. Director Campbell said that if the taxpayer has moved, he should show his new address to promptly receive refunds and other mail from Internal Revenue. If he moves after filing, a forwarding address should be left with the post office.

11 Quality for Ballots In National Elections

Only 11 certificates had been issued Wednesday to Callahan County residents who did not pay their poll tax this year but wish to be eligible for national elections, according to Tax Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell.

Persons who paid their Texas poll taxes are eligible to vote in any election. Under new law, however, Texas residents may secure the certificates to be eligible for the national elections.
