'Hounds Bow to Aspermont; to Play Munday Friday Nite

The inability of the Knox City Greyhounds to catch passes, coupled with the overpowering strength of the Aspermont Hornets, spelled defeat number four for the locals here last Friday night.

Playing with the added strength of Guy Robinson's right arm and play-calling abilities, the 'Hounds' seemed determined to undermine their own chances by repeatedly dropping passes that would normally have been caught. Robinson, playing with a badly sprained shoulder after the first quarter, was finally taken from the game in the closing minutes of play. Coach Slaughter stated that he will be out for the remainder of the season. He had been used after a four week rest due to the initial injury to his shoulder in the first game of the season.

To say that the 35-7 beating, and it was a beating, can be blamed on lackluster play by the locals would be to grossly underrate the Aspermont team. They were good Friday night. They were big, fast, and good—that's all you can say. Piling up a total of 18 first downs is no small feat, indeed. And they seemed capable of scoring at any time, as is evidenced by their making 21 points in the first half and adding 14 more in the final half of play.

Although the 'Hounds' racked up a total of 13 first downs and penetrated beyond the Aspermont 20-yard line four times, there was but little doubt from the beginning as to what the outcome would be. "They were just too big, too fast, and too many of them," said Coach White after the game.

According to Supt. Harold Barnett, total gate receipts at the game were \$453.39. Officials from the Abilene Officials Association were paid \$69.20, leaving \$384.19 to be divided between Knox City and Aspermont.

There will be no rest for the local eleven this Friday night when they journey to Munday to play the Moguls of that city. We may look to the record of three wins against one loss the Moguls have made this season. Their solitary loss was given them by Seymour to the tune of 40-0. Victims of the Munday team have been Iowa Park, Rule and Rochester.

Layman to Tell of Holy Land Trip

A layman's impressions of the Holy Land will be told by Roy Hill, of Amarillo, at the Full Gospel Mission in Knox City Saturday night, Oct. 11. It was announced this week by Rev. Nettie Wilcox, pastor.

Mr. Hill recently returned from a six-weeks trip to England, Germany, France, Switzerland, and the Holy Land.

"The observations I will give will be those of a layman, not a minister," said Mr. Hill, who said he had formed his impressions of the Palestine country from conversations and contacts with the masses.

"Palestine still is a very primitive country," he said. "The people are just as poor today as they were 4,000 years ago; they enjoy no more conveniences than in the days of Noah."

Mr. Hill said the Arabs still live in tents and work their land with homemade wooden plows, drawn by camels, oxen or donkeys, and their methods of harvesting are just as primitive.

Rev. Wilcox invited everyone to attend the services.

Local Democrats Make Contribution To Campaign Fund

A number of loyal Knox City Democrats made voluntary contributions to the Stevenson-Sparkman campaign fund last week, according to E. L. Park, precinct chairman.

A total of \$220 was received, Mr. Park said, and a cashier's check for that amount was presented at the campaign headquarters in Dallas Saturday by Roy Baker.

A list of contributors was also submitted, and personal letters of thanks have been received by contributors.

Mr. Baker stated that he was informed by workers in campaign headquarters that funds are badly needed to combat the intensive advertising campaign being staged by Texas supporters of Eisenhower and Nixon, the Republican nominees.

A spectacular fire here early Wednesday morning completely destroyed the Bateman Food Locker plant, City Grocery and Market, and the apartments above the grocery store, and a blast caused by the fire wrecked Hoge's Pharmacy and damaged the building housing City Hardware.

Financial loss caused by the fire—Knox City's first major fire in the business district since 1936—has been estimated at near \$200,000.00.

The fire was discovered at 2:50 a. m. by C. A. Reed, whose apartments above City Grocery, which he owned, became filled with smoke. Mr. Reed hurriedly removed his wife and four children from the building and turned in the alarm. At the time the blaze was confined to the locker plant, next to the grocery.

At first, the fire was fanned by a gentle south wind, and for a time the entire business block was threatened. A shift in the wind aided the firemen in confining the blaze.

Trucks and firemen rushed to the scene from Benjamin, Munday, Haskell, Rochester and Rule, and their quick arrival is credited with holding the fire from other buildings. It was also reported that trucks from Hamlin and Stamford arrived, but were not put into service.

Also helping the fire-fighting was a 120-barrel water truck rushed into service by Hendrix Trucking Co.

It was about 6:00 a. m. Wednesday before it was evident that firemen would be able to keep the fire from spreading.

Hoge's Pharmacy literally "exploded" from the intense heat, and seven men atop the building were injured, while several others barely escaped injury.

Most seriously injured were Dan Steakley of Knox City, who sustained a compound fracture of the right leg and a fracture of the left leg, and Theodore Ressel Benjamin Highway Department and volunteer fireman, who has a broken hip. Both of these men were rushed to an Abilene hospital, where they are reported resting well.

Other injured firemen were John Nixon of Munday, burns and lacerations; Bill Dixon of Munday, flash burns on face; Toby Lane of Munday, abrasions and lacerations; and Ed Jetton of Munday, cuts on the face and legs.

The seventh injury was to Paul Hoge, who has a fractured left arm.

As the Herald goes to press, Thursday at noon, the ruins are still smoldering and firemen are keeping a constant vigil. Ed Bateman, Jr., owner of Bateman Lockers, and Mr. Reed have set up temporary offices at Egenbacher Implements, where they may be contacted by their customers. Neither man has made definite future plans.

Paul Hoge who purchased his drug store in June as his first business venture, says he will move his stock into temporary quarters while the building is being rebuilt by the owners, Dr. T. P. Frizzell, Jr., and Roy A. Baker.

Mr. Reed owned the buildings housing the lockers, the grocery and market, and the apartments.

City Hardware is closed pending repairs to the building, made dangerous by the blast which damaged the wall.

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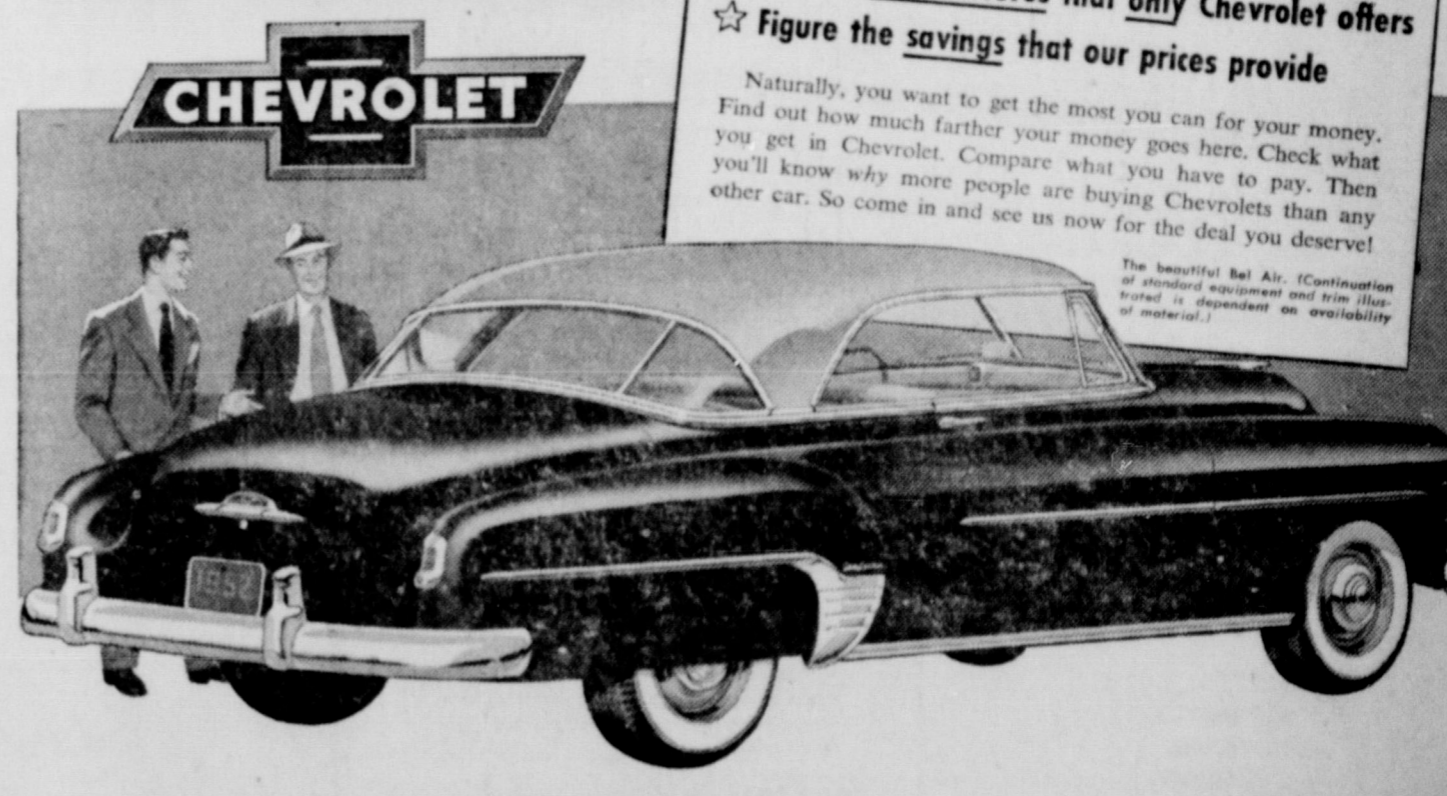

FARMERS SHOULD SUPPORT FARM BUREAU'S ROAD PROGRAM, WALDRIP SAYS

One of Texas Farm Bureau Federation's major objectives for a number of years has been "to get the farmers of Texas out of the mud".

Knox county farmers should lend wholehearted support to the organization's program, Ansel Waldrip, president of the Knox County Farm Bureau, said, because the task grows harder and the need greater each year. The 1951 census showed that 347 of Knox county's farm families lived on dirt roads a mile or more from a paved road, it was revealed by Waldrip.

Viewing the situation on a wider scope, Waldrip said there are 120,000 miles of dirt roads in the State of Texas, 66,000 of which are school bus routes.

A road program is one of the big jobs on which Farm Bureau will be working until a plan is adopted that will build adequate roads for school buses and for farmers to get their products to market, Waldrip said.

Farm Bureau sponsored the Sewell Bill in the last session of the legislature, which proposed a tax of one cent per thousand cubic feet on natural gas, the major portion of which is shipped out of the state. A token tax was levied on natural gas, but sponsors of the bill failed to get any portion of the funds earmarked for building roads. The greatest opposition the Farm Bureau has yet encountered on its road fight is looming in the next session, Waldrip declared.
