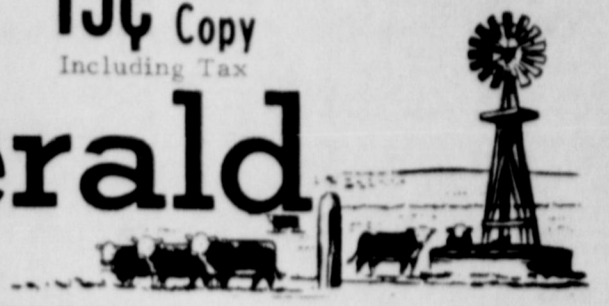

Fall Range & Agronomy Meet Held At Plant Center Sept. 8

Range conservationists, agronomists, and biologists from Texas and Oklahoma gathered at the James E. "Bud" Smith Plant Materials Center northwest of Knox City last Wednesday, September 8, for the fall review.

Purpose of the meeting was to observe plants being grown at the Center and to evaluate them for use in the two states. Holding the conference at the Center helps the men working in the field to keep informed on Center production. It also enables them to have a voice in what is produced at the Center to meet their most immediate needs. According to Jacob C. Garrison, PMC manager, it helps him to determine which plants to try to get into production for field evaluation. With the number of large assemblies of plants, it would be impossible to put all of them in production, he said. Each man lists the plants being evaluated and gives the needed plant a priority for use in his location. The group made a tour of the field seed increase plantings at the Center to determine what would be available for distribution to the two states in 1972.

Young, Southern Regional Plant Material specialist, Fort Worth; Fred Fortney, state resource conservationist, Oklahoma; and Hank Leithhead, range conservationist, Washington Field Staff.

Small Business Center Receives \$32,890 Grant

The Aspermont Small Business Development Center, Inc. has received notice from the Texas Office of Economic Opportunity of approval of a grant in the amount of \$32,890 for economic development.

The grant is for a period of one year beginning 10-1-71 and ending 9-30-79.

The ASBDC is a non-profit corporation with 17 board members. J. Q. Jackson of Quanah serves as its president, George Frazier of Aspermont serves as vice-president, Robert Hall of Jayton is secretary-treasurer, and the board member for Knox County is Ray Escobar, manager of the Bush and Burnett Ranch in Knox City.

The ASBDC operates in 33 counties in the field of economic development, business loans, counseling and preparing applications, and feasibility studies. Services include (1) Screening and processing applications to the Small Business Administration for loans to initiate or expand businesses. It also arranges other sources of credit for promising small businesses, either through the programs of SBA, through other Federal Agencies, or through the private credit sources, including banks.

(2) Arranges for management training and counseling for loan recipients and for potential ap-

licants for loans.

(3) Helps to identify new or unfilled opportunities for establishment or expansion of small businesses in the community.

(4) Familiarize the small towns and communities with state and federal programs designed for improved local development.

(5) To help in locating, technical, financial, educational and other services available to the small community.

All applications are presented to local banks and the Small Business Administration Office in Lubbock for funding. This will mark the beginning of the seventh year for the ASBDC. Loans totaling three million dollars have been made during this period of time.

Ikie W. Ray Buried Friday

Funeral services were held Friday morning at 10:00 o'clock for Ikie W. Ray, 71, in the First Baptist Church at O'Brien with the Rev. Jackie Lee, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in the O'Brien Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Ray was found dead in bed Wednesday morning about 7:30 by his wife, Dr. Robert G. Howell ruled that death was due to an apparent heart attack.

Born August 5, 1900, in Nebraska, he married Jennie Elizabeth Edgar on January 6, 1944, in Memphis, Texas. They moved to O'Brien in 1950 where Ikie had served as city secretary since the town's incorporation in 1966. He was also widely known as a public auctioneer.

Mr. Ray was a member of the First Baptist Church in O'Brien and Orient Lodge No. 905 in Knox City.

Survivors include his wife, Betty, of the home; a son, S/Agt. James Ray, U. S. Army, Camp Casey, Korea; a daughter, Mrs. Mary Helen Reed of Pasadena, Texas; a brother, Vernon Ray of Belen, New Mexico; a sister, Mrs. Veva Ford of Amarillo; and 10 grandchildren.

Instruction will be offered for all levels of education, but will be divided into two groups. Group one will be for those who wish to complete work through the eighth grade. Group two will be for those who wish to complete high school work.

Workshops have been scheduled for teachers in the program, for September and September 29. Teaching methods and materials will be included in studies for teachers. Mrs. Celso Gonzales and Mrs. Louise Kemletz are the teachers for these classes.

Classes will meet from 7:30 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays beginning October 5 until 120 hours of instructions have been met.

Classes are under the sponsorship of Rule High School and have resulted in many students completing their high school equivalency certificates during the past three years.

Each person who plans to attend this year's classes are urged to contact at least one other person in an effort to give as many persons as possible a chance to improve themselves by adding to their education.

Farm and Ranch News

WINTER GRAZING

Winter pastures can be extremely important in supplying nutrients for cattle this year, and an early planting date will boost production and help to maximize profits.

The declining temperatures and shorter daylight hours that become more apparent each day closer to winter mean less favorable conditions each day you delay planting. High rates of fertilization and adequate amounts of good quality seed are essential to successful forage production in winter pasture programs.

High rates of fertilization encourage deep root systems, early growth and high quality forage. Soil tests are recommended to determine fertilizer, lime, and other requirements.

Another requirement in winter pastures is a properly prepared seedbed - one that is clean, firm, and fertile.

Army worms and other insects may become problems in early planted pastures, but they can be safely and economically controlled with insecticides; so the advantages of early planting far outweigh the threat of insects.

Winter pastures can provide necessary vitamins and minerals to improve nutritional conditions of cows suffering from the prolonged drought. The cool-season crops are most profitably used when grazed by animals with high market value such as dairy cows or stocker

calves, but they can be successfully used with cow-calf operations. Besides supplying nutrients, the pastures stimulate milk flow and encourage heaviest weaning weights.

For graze out crops results from the Chillicothe Experiment Station show Elbon rye to be a consistent high producer. Mixture of 1/3 each rye, oats and wheat have also good results for early fall to late spring grazing crops.

Additional information can be obtained from bulletin MP-988, "Keys to Profitable Winter Annual Forage Production".

VEHICLE BRAKE LAW

Farmers and ranchers as well as others in Knox County should become familiar with the new vehicle brake law passed recently by the Texas Legislature.

The new law applies to every trailer, semi-trailer, and pole trailer equipped with air or vacuum actuated brakes and every trailer in excess of 3,000 pounds. These trailers must now be equipped with brakes acting on all wheels which can be applied automatically and promptly and remain applied for at least 15 minutes upon breakaway from the towing vehicle.

However, there are some exceptions to the law. Trailers with a gross weight of 3,000 pounds or less and those weighing 40 percent or less of the towing vehicle are exempt.

Also farm trailers or semi-trailers moving temporarily on highways at speeds of 20 miles per hour or less and having a gross weight of 10,000 pounds or less are exempt from the brake requirements if they are otherwise exempt from vehicle registration laws.

In addition, cotton trailers weighing 15,000 pounds or less moving temporarily at speeds of 20 miles per hour or less are exempt if they are exempt from vehicle registration laws.

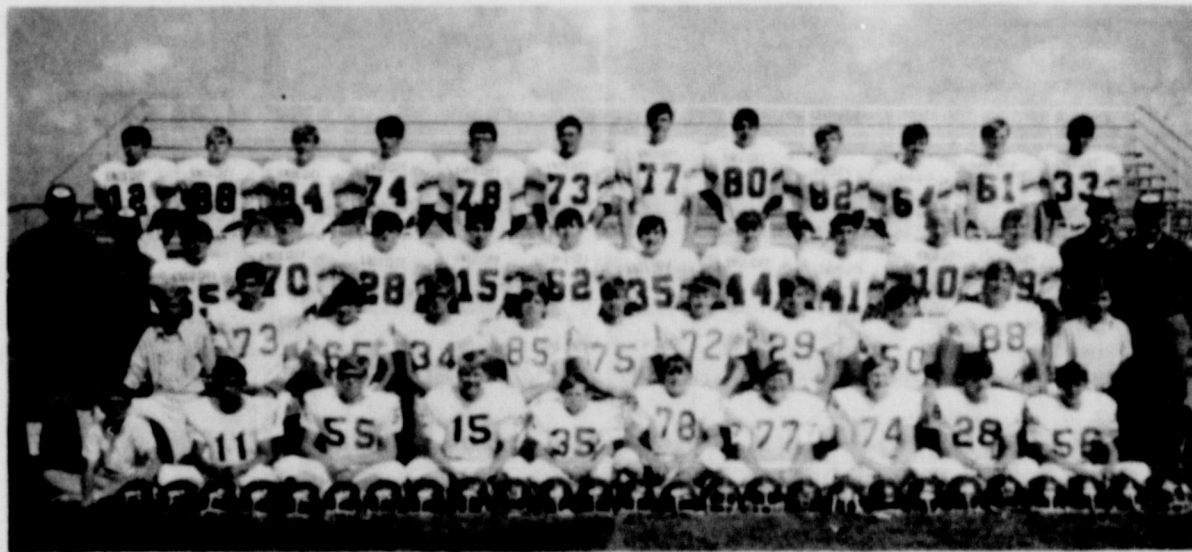

TEXAS LEGISLATIVE SERVICE, 8-27-175.
S. B. No. 249 AS FINALLY PASSED AND SENT TO THE GOVERNOR.

AN ACT relating to the recording and rerecording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties, each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect, have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act, all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months, only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be reregistered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this act. 9-2-4tc.
