Cheating offers no consolation to the student; but when the high grades come back, there is certainly litguilt.

Few teachers know how to conduct a fair exam anymore. Too much honesty is taken for granted-there is too much opportunity, too much temptation.

It is absolutely disgusting to study for a test and then watch someone as smart or smarter yourself constantly dig deep for a tricky answer. Some kids have become experts at this rewarding? game. When grades are passed out, without question, some students naturally conclude that there is no reward for

Cheating could be greatly lessened by stressing the honor system-not a farce in its name. Too much emphasis is placed on high grades and not enough on knowledge! Teachers need to be more strict and students more honest. Parents need to ask their children "What did you learn?" instead of "What did you make?" We all need to remember that "Thou shall not steal" applies just as well at school as any where else!
