## The AG Club; Students Vocational Agriculture

In establishing this column in the school and town papers The Ag Club has the definite purpose of offering any suggestions or advice to the farming people of Knox City School District. It is certain that the farming people of this district meet problems every day that their work will not allow them to stop and study. Whether their problem be one of soil, of crops, of livestock, of marketing, or of the home, The Ag Club will be in a position to offer worth while assistance. In close communication with the leading sources of farm information, the Colleges, Experiment Stations, the State Department of Agriculture, the Farm Organizations, leading breeders of seeds and livestock, and with a complete library for reference The Ag Club organized by the members of the Vocational Agriculture Class in Knox City High School is in a position to help with any problem that the farmer or his family may meet.

The Ag Club is the result of long years of effort to find a means for interesting the farm boys in their work. During the few years conditions have developed that tend to discourage ambitious boys in their plans to stay on the farm. Farming with its advantages that only a farmer may appreciate has at present disadvantages that seem to overcome the inducements to stay with the job. These problems must be either of production, distribution, or of other problems resulting from evils existing in the system of production and distribution. It is possible to so organize farm work and to so cooperate as to make farm business a business with advantages that no other business may equal, and so again it is the purpose of The Ag Club to serve the people of its district.

The Instructor, S. G. West, has had a number of years experience assisting in the management of a large farm in East Texas and so had intimate contact with the little problems that farmers face daily yet that determine the satisfaction the farmer gets from his work. Mr. West has also had training in the State University and at A. & M. College and has learned to appreciate deeply the value of scientific knowledge of farm practices. The Ag Club with its eighteen members from every part of the school district and from every grade in the High School lays no claim to a complete knowledge of farming for the farming people are only now realizing the magnitude of the problems that they face, yet The Ag Club feels that it is in a position to offer assistance in finding a solution for problems that may confuse the farmer with fewer or no facilities for getting the experience of men who have spent years in the study of just such problems.

The Ag Club will hold open meetings at the Opera House on certain occasions for the purpose of studying thru illustrated lectures with slides and picture films different phases of farm practice. At these meetings it is hoped that every farmer who finds it possible will be present to study with the boys of the club. These meetings will be open conference meetings and any question that anyone may have will be answered by some member of the club or will be answered thru this column later.
