## Two Knox County Schools Get State Aid

The State Department of Education has sent a certificate of standardization to the County Superintendent, Mrs. Ethie Lee P'Pool for the League and Rhineland schools. They are rated as standard A schools. These are the first rural schools in the country to receive standardization. Mr. Travis Fuller is principal of the League school and J. J. Hoffman is principal of the Rhineland school.

## CROP ROTATIONS PROVE HELPFUL

Crop rotation in West Texas has proven beneficial, according to a bulletin issued recently by the extension department of A. & M. College. E. A. Miller, extension agronomist of A. & M. in the bulletin cites a demonstration in Knox County as illustrating the value of diversification and crop rotation.

One farmer in that county made 32 bales of cotton from 52 acres of land after using rotation a few years, while an adjoining farm produced only 25 bales on 82 acres without the use of rotation," the bulletin relates. The county agent in Knox County is advocating half cotton and half feed program.

Crop rotation is profitable to many Texas farmers even if the rotation scheme consists only of alternating equal acreage of cotton, and feed crops in successive years, the report adds. "In the black land sections of the State a rotation of cotton, corn and oats has been found to reduce root rot damage and increase profits per acre," the bulletin reports.

## How New Marriage License Law Reads

The new marriage license law recently passed by the Texas Legislature reads as follows:

Article 4605-A. For the purpose of ascertaining all facts required under the statutes, the county clerk, at the time the license is applied for, shall examine the applicant under oath as to the age and residence which shall be reduced to writing by the county clerk, and subscribed to by the applicant. In case either party is absent when application is made an affidavit shall be made by a person other than the contracting party as to the age and residence of the contracting party. Said affidavit to be filed in some county clerk's office.

Article 4605-B. Application for license shall be made at least three days before and not more than thirty days before the license shall be issued. Immediately upon receipt of application for a license the county clerk shall record in a book kept for that purpose and marked "Notice of Intention to Marry" and after expiration of three and not more than thirty days after the signing of the notice of intention to marry, the county clerk may issue said license.

Article 4605-C. Before the county clerk shall issue a marriage license the man shall produce a certificate from a reputable physician to show that he is free from venereal disease.

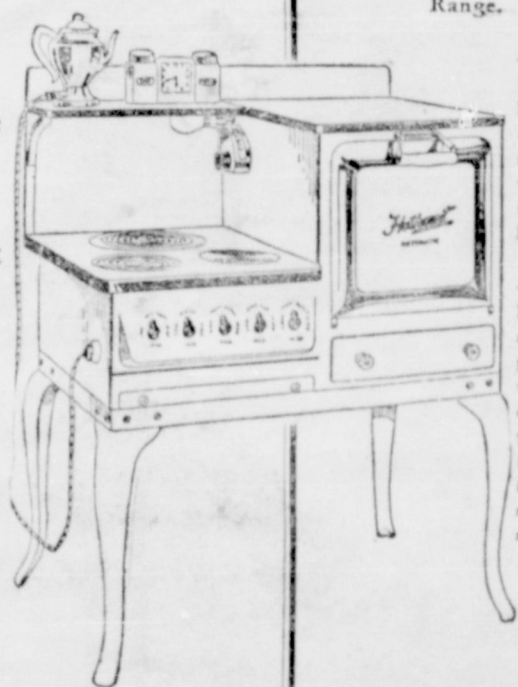

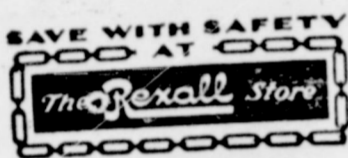
