Education Bill

Proposed Financing Dangerous To Area

The basis for indicating the effect of the Governor's Education Bill, House Bill 1083 by Representative Massey, on thirty-four school districts in Mr. Heatly's fifteen county district.

Mr. Heatly further warned that many of the taxpayers and school districts would be crippled by the new local taxes without helping the children of their districts, and therefore, he was of the opinion that it would be to the best interest of his District to oppose this legislation.

Based on the tax rate of 60

cents per hundred dollars in H.B. 1083, Knox City alone would have to increase its local tax support in 1975-76 from \$36,199 to \$123,059, an increase of \$86,860. The proposed local tax support in Benjamin would increase from \$27,966 to \$85,792; in Goree from \$16,554 to \$38,807; and in Munday, from \$41,396 to \$164,508. Paducah in Cottle County would have to increase its local tax support from \$67,363 to \$529,032, according to the figures on total market value of taxable property.

Supt. W.R. (Bill) Baker was contacted in regard to the proposed legislation, and he warned that if the Governor's bill passes, Knox City and area towns stand a good chance to lose their schools and still face the unbearable taxation. He explained that even if taxes were increased to the maximum of \$1.50 per hundred, local needs could not be taken care of and that the town still would not be assured that the school would remain here. As officials have discussed before, without a school, Knox City or any other small town would not exist for very long, he said.

Supt. Baker is in Austin again this week where he is serving as an advisor to the committee of the Speaker of the House, Bill Clayton. Both Mr. Baker and Mr. Heatly are in hopes that school boards and other interested persons will become active in this school financing issue.

Hester Is New Na-Churs Dealer

A number of area farmers were on hand Wednesday night of last week at Roddy's City Cafe to hear about a product, new to the immediate area, Na-Churs, a liquid plant food that has been tested and proved across the United States and Canada as well as Central and South America.

STUDENT POLICY ON INTAKE OF CHEMICALS

March 19, 1975

- A. Smoking**
Any student smoking on the school premises or a school sponsored activity will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action.
- B. Drinking and Glue Sniffing**
1. First offense - if a student possesses or consumes alcohol or sniffs glue on the school premises or comes to school after consuming alcohol or sniffing glue, there shall be a mandatory one day suspension while the case is reviewed by the parents, students, local school official, and representative of the Knox City ISD.
Note: Any school sponsored activity will be considered to be on school premises.
2. Second offense - there shall be an automatic recommendation for expulsion. Consultation will again be engaged in, coupled with the recommendation that re-entry after expulsion be accompanied by the condition that the student receive appropriate counseling concerning the reasons for alcoholic abuse.
- C. Possession and/or Use of Non-Prescribed Drugs**
This classification shall include amphetamines, barbiturates, opiates, hallucinogen - other than marijuana.
1. Well realizing that there are numerous classifications of "drug use and/or abuse", the School Board hereby divides the intakers of drugs into the following categories: the curious, the experimenter, the chronic user, the sharer, and the pusher for profit.
a. Curious Use or Experimenting - such a student shall receive a mandatory five day suspension during which time consultation shall take place with the parents, students, teachers, local school official, and representative of the Knox City Independent School District. Ramifications of the law shall be explained, possible legal action for all parties concerned and due investigation as to the merits of the case. Parental involvement shall be sought and law enforcement shall be consulted. If such involvement fails to materialize within due time, indefinite suspension and police involvement shall be recommended as actions to be taken by the School Board.
b. Chronic Use - "chronic use" is hereby defined as consistent (daily or almost daily) use of a mood altering drug where behavior is perceptibly altered. In this case, due to the gravity of the situation, a mandatory five day suspension shall be imposed and consultation shall be initiated between the parents, students, teachers, local school administrator, counselor, School District representative, and appropriate law enforcement official.
Upon second offense, there will be an automatic recommendation for expulsion, the case to be determined by the law enforcement and judicial branches of government. In such cases, the student is released from any jurisdiction of the school and placed in the hands of law enforcement authorities, and any recommendations made shall be done by this agency to the School District.
The "sharer" of drugs (i.e. distributing drugs but not for sale), will be treated in the same manner. Second offense will be dealt with the same as a "pusher."
- All effort shall be made to estimate the depth of the pathology (if any), the needs of the student relative to escape-dependency. After serious consultation, the school representative can make one of two recommendations to the School Board:
(1) Continuing expulsion, during which time the student is to seek evaluative counseling, the burden of which responsibility rests on the parents.
(2) Entrance back into school shall be with the condition that the student receive evaluative counseling as determined by a professional counselor, who will submit written recommendations to school personnel.

- D. Pushing Drugs**
"Pushing" is hereby defined as providing drugs for financial gain on the part of the seller to a party or parties on school premises. If such a person is discovered engaging in this activity, there shall be automatic mandatory suspension and the need for immediate consultation with the parents, student involved, local school officials, appropriate law enforcement officials, representative from the Knox City Independent School District, and any other such people as deemed necessary for the full investigation and resolution of the case. After such consultation and investigation shall be completed, the school representative shall make one of two recommendations to the School Board:
1. Continuance of the expulsion and the request to legal authorities that such a person receive maximal rehabilitative help, and if no cooperation is foreseen or evidenced, such a person be prosecuted within the full extent of the law.
2. Entrance back into school following indefinite suspension shall be with the provision that extensive rehabilitative therapy be engaged in and appropriate law enforcement recommendation be secured.
3. A second offense of this nature will result in full legal prosecution and the hope for therapeutic help, but with indefinite expulsion from the School District. Any future re-entry would be conditional.

- E. Possession and/or Use of Marijuana**
Due to the extremely tenuous and unwieldy nature of this area, it was felt necessary to separate marijuana (although a hallucinogen) from discussion under item "C".
Marijuana hereby is described as any class of this substance, or any grade which can be chemically assayed to be classified under the name "marijuana".
The District policy toward marijuana will be the same as that towards alcohol with the exception that law enforcement officials will be consulted in cases of possession, use and pushing.
First Offense - automatic one day suspension (see B-1)
Second Offense - there will be recommendations for expulsion and law enforcement officials will be consulted.

place and have the farmer climb down off his tractor and put his arm around him and say, "You knew what you were talking about and I want to thank you," this was gratifying enough for him to want to continue his research with Na-Churs.
