Be Observed May 6th-12th

Week of May 6-12 is Soil Conservation District Week in this county. It begins on Soil Steward Sunday, May 6, when many special services will be held. The rest of the week, most of the day, will be spent on special tours, field days to publicize district accomplishments and objectives.

As has 172 soil conservation districts which embrace 96 percent of the land area of the county. These districts represent the greatest force—and the first organized force—for the conservation of soil, water, plants and wild life.

soil conservation district organized only after landowners of the area voted to have a district. SCDs are legal subdivisions of the state government, subject to counties and school districts, but they have no taxing power. Each is governed by a board of five supervisors who are elected by farmers and ranchers of the district.

State Advertises For Bids on Road West of Knox City

Contract for 6.4 miles of Farm-Market Road paving, and a new bridge across Union Creek, will be let by the Texas Highway Department May 16, according to Herbert Cunningham of Munday, resident highway engineer.

The paving will tie into FM 143 west of Knox City and run southwest to the Haskell County line. The heavily-traveled road serves the Katz oil field and Stone-wall Gas Plant area.

Cunningham said additional paving in Haskell County will connect with an existing farm road, making a paved road from Knox City out through the area and back to O'Brien.

The engineer also stated that work has begun on a new bridge across Croton Creek in King County, on FM 143. This is part of a project of paving the remainder of 143 to connect with the Benjamin-Guthrie highway. The project should be completed in about four months.
