Local Men Attend Firemen's School

Knox City Fire Chief A.T. (Drew) Holcomb and Fire Marshall Eddie Carr have returned from College Station where they attended the forty-fifth Annual Texas Firemen's Training School.

The school was held July 21 through 26 on the Texas A&M University Campus.

Approximately 1600 men engaged in fire prevention, control and safety from municipalities, industries and

armed services, representing over 465 cities from approximately 25 states and numerous provinces and countries attended the school. The school was conducted by approximately 400 highly qualified and experienced instructors and speakers made available by municipalities, industries, manufacturers, state and federal agencies, and the armed services through the Texas Engineering Extension Service cooperating with the Texas Education Agency and was sponsored by the State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' association. Equipment and supplies are loaned or donated for this intensive and practical training program.

Since both Holcomb and Carr attended the training program a four percent credit is allowed in the city key rate.

A greater savings to the community than the key rate credit is in the reduction of local fire losses which should be brought about by the use of efficient firefighting methods and fire prevention measures that are emphasized and taught during the school each year.

Borrowers Stimulate Rural Job Activity

WASHINGTON, July 16 -- Electric and telephone systems financed by the Rural Electrification Administration helped to create more than 45,700 new jobs in rural America during calendar year 1973, the U.S. Department of Agriculture announced today.

The job figure is based on reports from about 50 percent of the 1,857 systems surveyed by REA on their community development activities. The REA borrowers reported that the jobs resulted from 911 commercial, industrial and community facilities projects they helped launch during the year in cooperation with other Federal agencies and with public and private local organizations.

Will Erwin, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture for Rural Development, congratulated the REA borrowers for their work in stimulating economic development in the rural areas they serve. "Under the direction of your able Administrator, David A. Hamil, you long have provided the lead-

ership for helping to make rural and smalltown America a better place to live and work," Mr. Erwin said. "Because of adequate electric power and modern telecommunications, business and industry is becoming increasingly attracted to rural America. As a result, rural jobs are increasing at twice the rate of urban job opportunities. And REA borrowers are an effective force in bringing this about," he added.

Since 1961, when REA began making surveys of the community development activities of its borrowers, more than 466,600 new jobs have been created in rural areas through the 7,336 local projects they have helped establish. In addition to their involvement with the planning for the projects and providing the necessary electric and telephone services, REA borrowers contribute personnel, office space and many other types of assistance to local community development activities.

- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1 cup chopped green pepper
- 3/4 cups fresh-cut corn (from 6 average ears)
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon coarse black pepper
- 1 teaspoon sweet basil
- 1/2 teaspoon leaf thyme
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- 2 fresh tomatoes, peeled, chopped

Drain shrimp. Melt butter in a heavy skillet; add onion and green pepper. Sauté until vegetables are nearly tender. Add corn and all seasonings. Mix thoroughly; cover and cook over low heat about 6 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add shrimp and tomatoes; heat. 6 servings.

Flights Part of Training

301ST TFW, CARSWELL AFB, Tx-- (July 3) F-105 tactical fighters of the 301st Tactical Fighter Wing's 457th Tactical Fighter Squadron based at Carswell AFB, Tex., will continue to fly low altitude training missions over Northwest Texas and Southwest Oklahoma.

The low altitude missions, which started in December, 1972, are part of the wing's training program to assure that the F-105 pilots maintain their proficiency to fly at high speeds low enough to get under enemy defenses and reach target areas.

The 301st, commanded by Col. John E. Taylor Jr., is an Air Force Reserve wing located at Carswell AFB.

Two routes have been established for the low level flights. Route 214 starts seven miles northeast of Jacksboro; travels west to Lake Kemp; north to a point west on Mangum, Oklahoma, and then loops east to a simulated target area, about 20 miles west of Lawton, Okla.

The second flight pattern, route 209, starts about 20 miles west of Denton; passes north to Lone Grave, Okla., where it swings northwest to a point some 30 miles west of Oklahoma City. It then makes a loop and swings south to the Wichita Mountains in Oklahoma, about 20 miles west of Lawton.

Both routes make a lazy sickle shape pattern, ending near Ft. Sill, Okla.

According to Colonel Taylor, two flights of four aircraft each, use the routes daily, Monday through Saturday. These routes will continue indefinitely, he said.

No sonic boom will result from the flights, which are flown at 420 knots 1,000 feet above ground level.

In keeping with Tactical Air Command regulations, pilots will not fly low level over known hospitals, milk farms, large poultry farms, or congested areas.

The 301st was reactivated as an Air Force Reserve Unit in July, 1972. Other detachments of the wing are located at Tinker AFB, Oklahoma, and Hill AFB, Utah.

Pilots of the 457th Tactical Fighter Squadron from Carswell fly the "Thunderstick II", a specially modified version of Fairchild-Republic's F-105 "Thunderchief" series D model.

The F-105 is a mach 2 multi-purpose, all weather fighter-bomber, capable of delivering conventional or nuclear weapons.

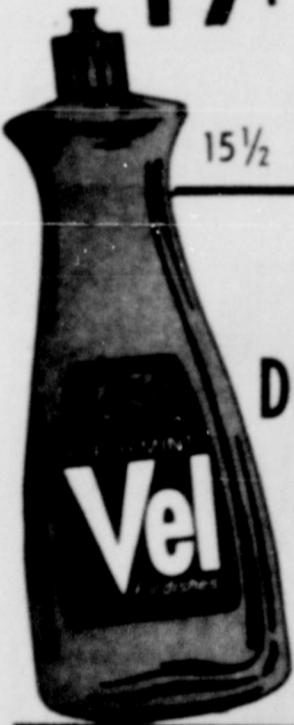

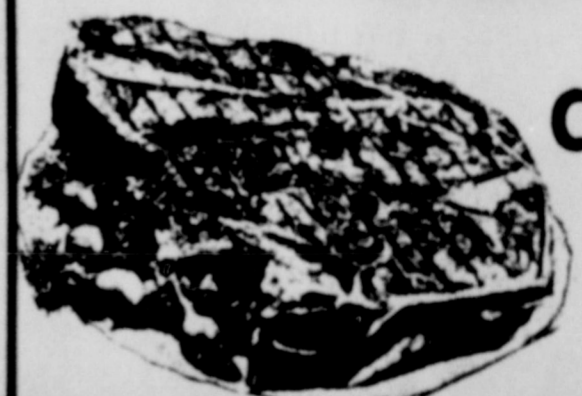
