Oscar Rocha was born February 13, 1961, in Knox City. He was a student at O'Brien School, also.

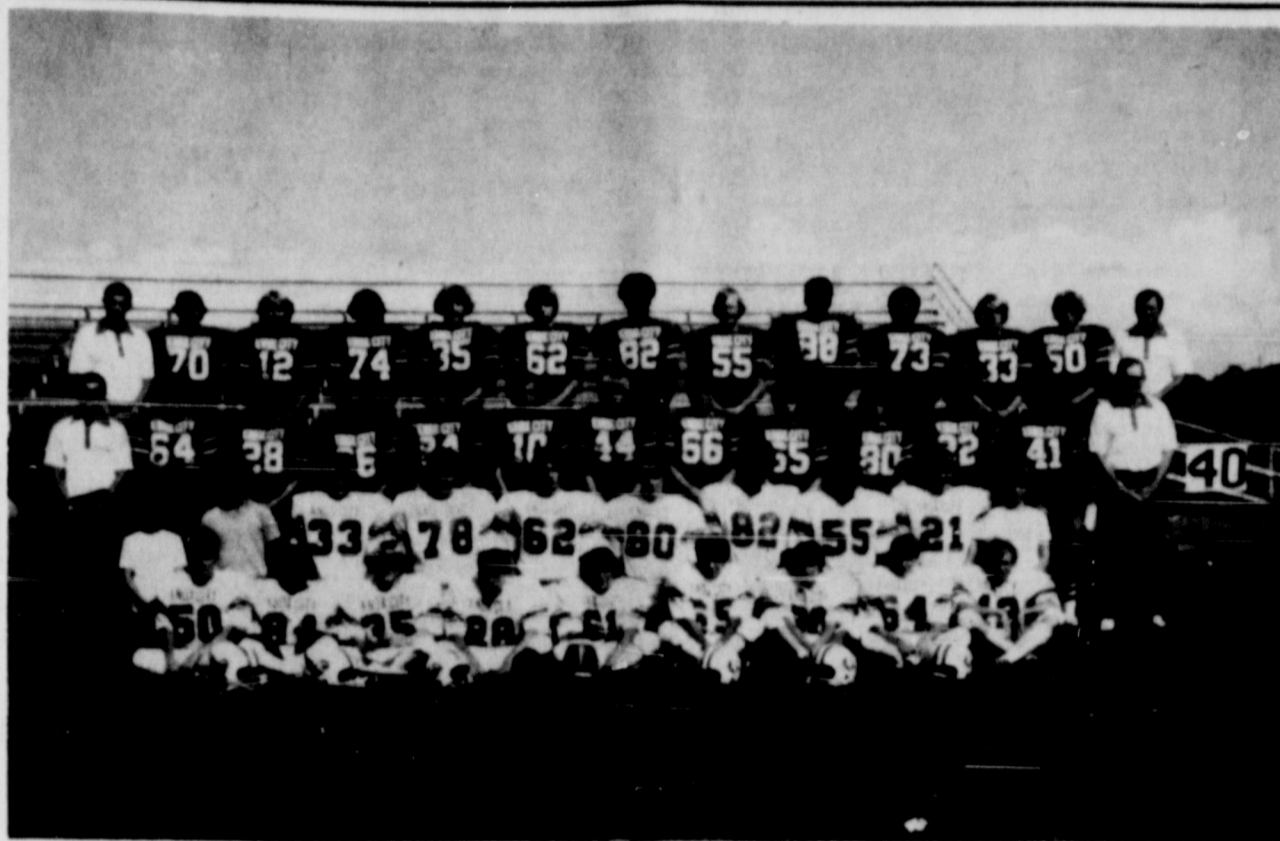

## Haskell Man Employed As CSTE Coordinator

A native West Texan was hired as area coordinator last week by four counties for a Concerted Services in Training and Education Committee (CSTE) project.

Gerald B. Fincher of Haskell, was selected from a field of eight applicants to serve as coordinator in Jones, Haskell, Knox, and Stonewall Counties.

Representatives from the four counties voted two weeks ago to accept a \$20,000 grant to finance the position of coordinator.

CSTE is an experimental rural program, a cooperative federal, state, and local venture, designed to bring together in a concerted manner the services of various federal and state agencies for improvement in education, employment, health, housing, and economic resources.

Fincher, who will continue to live in Haskell comes to the position from the Aspermont Small Business Development Center, Inc. He will begin as coordinator effective Sept. 1 with offices tentatively planned for Haskell.

He has been on loan from the Aspermont center to the Small Business Administration, assisting in a disaster project in Arkansas.

Fincher was born at Girard in Kent County. He graduated from Girard High School in 1938 and served in the U.S. Air Corps from 1942 to 1945 during World War II.

He and his wife, Sue, have three children, two of whom are living at home.

He served as county and district clerk in Kent County from 1952 to 1966.

He has worked with the Aspermont center since 1966.

Fincher will be making contacts in the communities within the four counties during the first week in September. He will attend a training seminar in economic development in Austin Sept. 9-13.

He has been employed by M-System for the past three years.

## Monday Is Deadline For Weevil Program

Monday, September 9, is the deadline for applications for the Cotton Boll Weevil Diapause Control Program, according to Vernal Zeissel, president of the Knox County Boll Weevil Association.

Cotton producers must sign up now for the diapause program in order for the association to receive matching funds from the Texas Department of Agriculture. Cost of the program for the producer is \$3.00 per acre for three applications, starting September 16. In the event the farmer defoliates his crop

before the three applications are made this money will be refunded.

If you are a cotton farmer and have destroyed your cotton acreage, you are asked to notify the boll weevil office of this information.

The contract for the spraying will be awarded Thursday, September 12, at 9:00 a.m.

"If you have not signed up for the program, please do so immediately," the county president urged. "Also if more information is needed, call Mrs. Mary Birkenfeld, clerk, in the office at 658-3676.

This program is available to all cotton producers in the county. However, enough farmers must sign up in order to have a solid block, Mrs. Birkenfeld explained.

## Fire Destroys Duncan Home

During a severe thunderstorm Thursday night of last week, the home of Bessie and Clifton Duncan west of O'Brien was destroyed by fire, apparently starting from lightning.

The Duncans, who were watching the cloud from their pickup parked near the cellar door, were not aware of the fire until C.H. Underwood, who was driving by at the time, saw smoke coming from the house. The fire occurred about 8:30 p.m.

According to a report, the front rooms were completely gutted and the remainder of the house, along with their clothing, was badly damaged from smoke.

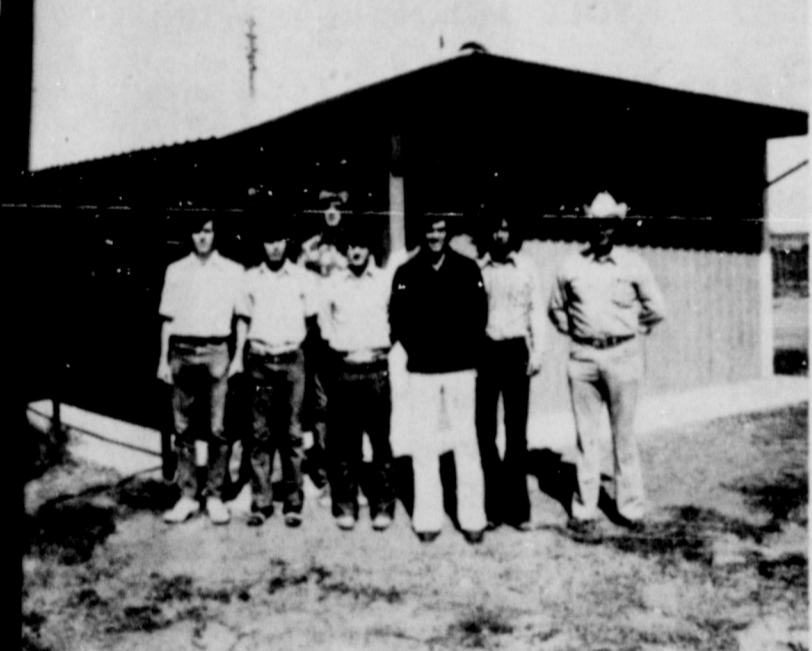

"...the path of the just is as the shining light, that shineth more and more unto the perfect day."

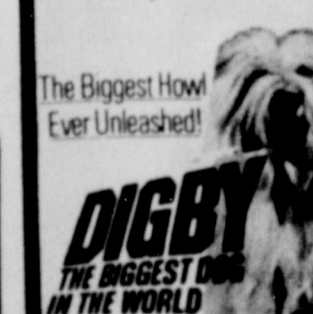

Coats, professor of Old Testament at Lexington Theological Seminary since 1968, delivered an address entitled "Moses Versus Amalek" to the International Organization for the Study of the Old Testament in Edinburgh, Scotland, August 18-23.
