New Process of Printing Sought

Suggestion that printing from type is likely to be superseded was made by William Gamble at the recent world's Congress of Printers, held in connection with the International Printing and Allied Trades exhibition. Mr. Gamble said that at least three inventors were trying to develop a photographic process to take the place of printing from type.

He predicted that the machines for printing by the photographic process would hardly occupy more space than a typewriter nor be any more complicated.

He expressed the opinion that eventually the great printing presses in newspaper offices would give place to smaller, swift-running and comparatively noiseless machines, which would turn out printed matter with almost the same facility as the moving picture machine operator reels off his film.

Our Mr. Hughes, Secretary of State has proposed some drastic reductions in the Naval forces of the first rate powers of the world, especially mentioning the United States, England and Japan. It is, however, very much like taking a group of people in a picture; everyone is well pleased with all the pictures except their own, which they invariably say is perfectly horrid. Japan can easily see the plausibility of Englands reduction but has already shied at any reduction on her part. It has been suggested that we have a League to enforce these reductions but it might be pointed out that we already have a world wide "League to Enforce Peace," which has failed utterly in its mission. No league will be any stronger than its constituency and since it is the powers that would make up such league it would not be any stronger than their disposition to enforce it. Some fancied grievance could upset the whole affair, just as the assassination of a worthless Duke plunged the whole world into war in 1914. It will be found in the end that the only way to prevent wars is to educate men to hate strife and finally they may come to realize the folly of it.

Russia, feeling the slight in not being invited to attend the Disarmament Conference, has called a conference of the far eastern powers to meet on her soil. Thus while guarding the front door we may be attacked by a more deadly enemy from the rear. Japan has sent emissaries and so will China and the other Mongolian races. The final issue will likely be that of Color, and as the dark races now have a preponderance of numbers them is constituted the real menace to the world peace. An alliance between the Asiatic and island yellow races could spread a pinion of darkness over the entire world.

A new third party is to be launched in ten states. A third party seems necessary and is always in demand in this country. It is a kind of lubricating oil that keeps the old party machinery going good. The third party is always on the aggressive, always attacking and ridiculing the older parties and advocating progressive measures, and in that way serving as a spur to quicken the governing power, to action on reform measures. They themselves never come into power but succeed in getting many of their pet measures made into law because of their constant nagging. Some of their measures are good some of them not so good, but you can rest assured that the process will go on to the end of time. The third party has ever been the channel through which the disgruntled man voices his sentiment.

This is to be a bumper season for the American sportsman. Game of the sort usually hunted is more plentiful, generally speaking, than it has been for many years. In some localities there are more ducks and geese than the oldest inhabitants ever saw before. East of the Mississippi River migratory birds are making their southern flight in unprecedented numbers. The quail, or bobwhite, is present also in numbers not equalled for years. And the deer is not so scarce apparently as it used to be.

AUSTRALIAN WHEAT CROP.

The present wheat crop of Australia is estimated at 134,000,000 bushels, and is larger than any crop since 1918, and nearly three times as large as last year's crop.

MOROCCAN HUMOR.

Referring to the trouble in Tangier, the "Way of the World" columnist of the London Morning Post quotes the following translation of some verses on Tangier by Mulai Hafid:

"In the last day the people of Tangier came to the Judgment Seat of God, and the Supreme Judge said: 'Surely you are the least and worst of all people. Under what circumstances did you live?' And they replied: 'We have sinned; we have sinned; but our government was international; we were ruled by the representatives of Europe.' And the Supreme Judge said: 'Surely you have been sufficiently punished; enter into paradise!'

ACQUIRE TRAVEL FREEDOM.

"Along with the vote and short hair, the women are acquiring something else which not so many years ago was little heard of," said the old conductor on the Pennsylvania Boston-New York line. "The right to travel alone was for a long time considered not quite the thing for women. But all this has changed. Hubby doesn't have to be along any more when his wife is going West or to Europe. Daughters inspire confidence from the parental hand, and in general women can come and go where they please. The old world's movin' along."

USE OF CARAMEL

According to recent research at the Iowa State college, caramel formed from sugar during cooking may contain furfural, a poison. Furfural forms in the greatest amount at a temperature of about 200 degrees centigrade, so that in making candy as low a temperature as possible should be used. It is volatile in steam, and where caramel is heated with water, as it is in making icings, no precaution is necessary; but it is desirable to boil caramel fruit syrups with an equal volume of water for ten or fifteen minutes before they are served; and in baking fruits care should be taken to avoid forming caramel.—Youth's Companion.
