Subject to Forfeiture. The Governor contends that hold ers of the lease were required by it to pay annual rental in advance in addition to oil production royalty, McDonald reviewed and failure to pay rental made the lease subject to

"The record shows that in January 1933, the company tendered a rental check and the aLnd Commissioner returned the check with the statement that, under the statutes, rental was not required from a lease that was paying royalty and he cited 'n opinion from the Attorney General's department," McDonald said, "That opinion was rendered while Mr. Allred was Attorney General and it held that rental was not required. But his department rendered another opinion that rental was required." Says Mind Acrobatic.

The Land Commissioner asked why Allred as Attorney General did not sue for the lease when rentals were not paid for "that would have made the State the full owner of the for wells thereon and the State would have received a total of \$24,856.96 from the oil produced in 1933. 1934, 1935 and 1936 instead of \$3,107.12 in royalty which it did receive. The People's Protection

acts unauthorized by our Constitu-

Under our Constitution, "we the people" are supreme. We are the principal and we create the Congress and make it our agent with power to act within the limitations we enumerate in our charter, but with no power to go beyond those limits. In addition we specifically prohibit it from certain acts.

Under these conditions, what recourse do "we the people" have if the Congress, as our agent, exceeds the limits we specify or enacts legislation which we specifically prohibit? If left to itself to determine such a case, the Congress naturally would approve its own acts. It would not pass an act and disapprove it. Thus the agent would authorize

what the principal prohibits. To prevent this, "we the people," our Constitution, provide the simple means commonly provided where the principal challenges the acts of his agent in court. The court -in the case of our Constitution, a federal court and finally the Supreme Court-tries the case by hearing both sides. If the Court finds the agent's power, the act is upheld. But

Have we any protection against | if the Court finds that the agent acted beyond his authority the Court so states, whence such act is declared unauthorized, and therefore void, or in other words unconstitutional.

If the Congress as the people's



agent had power to exceed the people's Constitution, such a Constitution would be useless. To prevent this and protect ourselves against unauthorized acts by our agent, "we the people" make our Constitution "the supreme law" and we create and empower the Supreme Court to construe or pass upon it.

Texas Poll Tax Keep 70 Per Cent of People From Voting

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 .- The poll tax payable in Texas not later than Feb. 1 this year, disfranchised 70 per cent of the otherwise eligible white voters of the state in the national election of 1936, according to Simon Michelet. Washington attorney and political analyst.

His national study of the poll tax shows it is rapidly disappearing as a condition to suffrage, Florida abolished it last year and Arkansas this year is submitting its repeal in a constitutional act. The action of those two States reduces the number of poll tax States to seven.

Arguing for repeal of the poll tax which he terms a relic of barbarism Mr. Michelet cites its effect in Texas. According to his figures Texas in the last census had total white electorate of 2.430.432 which by 1936 exceeded 2.500,000

The total vote of Texas for all presidental candidates in 1936 was only 843,482 of which President Roos evelt and his Teras running mate Vice-President Garner, received 734, 485 votes. From that Mr. Michelet concluded that 70 per cent of the State's potential voters were barred from voting because they did not pay their poll tax.

Registration Barely 1.000,000, "But under the ban of a poll tax." said Mr. Michelet. "the Texas poll

tax registration barely reached 1,00-0.000 and the result-Texas polls a vote only one-half that of Massachusetts. Michigan, Missouri, Indiana and even a Democratic vote less than half that of the former Republican States of Pennsylvania, Illinois, Ohio or California."

Virginia was cited as the worst exmple of poll tax disfranchisement, comparing it with West Virginia. which has no poll tax requirements. Mr. Michelet said.

"In the census of 1930 Virginia had .300,893 citizens of voting age against 900.987 in West Virginia. In 936 Virginia polled only 334,590 presidental votes as compared with 829,945 in West Virginia, In other words, poll taxed Virginia admitted only 25.7 per cent of its potential electorate to vote while West Virginia poll tax free led the States in pollng over 90 per cent of its eletorate.

"Beginning 1920, there were eleven States in the poll tax group. Under the poll tax ban the combined vo: of these eleven States during the twenty-year period 1896-1916 had shrunk 18 per cent during the periol when the electorate had grown by 50

"In the presidential election of 19-36 there were nine poll tax States. With a combined electorate of 12.472citizens twenty-one years ago, hese nine states in 1936 cast only 1,005.177 votes for all candidates for President and Vice-President.

"They polled only 24 per cent of heir potential electorate as compared with 72 per cent. as the average of thirty-nine States free from poll

"Repeal of the ancient two-thirds rule by the Democratic national convention and the 1940 apportionment of delegates may be based on the votes of the respective States put the poll tax States in a tough spot.

"The combined vote of the present even poll-taxed States for President Roosevelt in 1936 was only 2,457,000 or less than 10 per cent of the President's 27.751.000. It is plain that, on this as the basis of representation in Democratic national conventions, the so-called solid South would quickly pass into partial eclipse asapowr in the Democratic party."

Tour church and my church can obtain their sustenance only in contributions from whatever surplus the doner may have on hand after taxes have been paid. Under the present system of taxation, or rather the lack of a tax system, the rather the lack of a tax system, the taxpayer can seldom accumulate a surplus, and as a result religious activities are retarded. Many of those who once supported the church in an adequate and substantial way have been forced to curtail religious contributions. They are now compelled to tithe to the politicians instead of to the Lord's work.

In many states preachers are becoming tax-minded. They frankly discuss tax problems with legislators. Largely because of this influence a recent session of the Texas legislature adjourned without levying any more taxes although it was called to raise fifteen million dollars.

The very sources from which the churches must derive their revenue are being taxed out of existence by National, State and local agencies.

National. State and local agencies. Any man or woman who ever served on a church finance committee knows full well that "burdensome taxes" is too often heard as a reason for failure to adequately meet these obligations. A church cannot balance its budget by "soaking the rich." The politicians have preempted that field to a point where they are now "soaking the churches."

The National Congress and many of the State Legislatures have found it impossible to evolve a program of taxation adequate to produce revenue to equal present expenditures and at the same time permit business, large and small, to survive. There is no escaping the economic rule that excessive taxes inevitably result in inadequate compensation to workers. There is a definite and distinct relation between the tax roll and the pay roll of industry.





At the Royal Academy in Vienna, he studied piano for three years under Leopold Godowsky, then returning to New York, spent two more years in study, chiefly self-instruction in composition. Then he returned to Texas as director of the Daniel Baker College School of Music in Brownwood.
