## McFarlane Announces For Re-Election to Congress

### ROUND UPS

Harmony was the watchword all around as speakers before the committee meetings at the Texas Democratic convention at San Antonio pledged their allegiance to the Roosevelt Administration this week. Resolutions commending the "constructive humanitarian service rendered the American people" by congress under the leadership of President Roosevelt were adopted.

Campaign booklets were circulated from the Republican headquarters asserting that Postmaster General James A. Farley is a "good spott-master general", adding that "he has bought a lot of votes with money of the United States Treasury. Never before in the history of the nation his an administration, even before the passage of the civil service act, handed out jobs to political cohorts in payment of political services on such a grand scale," the G. O. P. pamphlet read. In the meantime the Socialist party chose Norman Thomas as their nominee for candidate in the November political toss.

Perseverant Roger W. Babson, Massachusetts economist and statistician, painted dark war clouds before graduates of Hendrix and Arkansas State Teachers Colleges. He advised the degree holders to keep away from saboteur cities and to stay in the interior of the United States. He contends that if a revolution takes place that it will be between the people living in the cities and the people living in the country. Babson said that if such a conflict should come that the people living in the country would force submission of the city folks by starvation. He also advocates a European war with American participation in 1950 in which the "seacoast cities" will be destroyed.

Mussolini represents a medieval civilization in Italy. Until 20 years ago, Communists and Anarchists, he defened regicide, anarchist crime, and political association. He has always considered religion "like opium, to lull people to sleep. Fascism has a naive way of becoming independent of opponents; it deports them or kills them.

Pearl S. Buck has written another story concerning the lives of mothers. This time she has written a biography of her mother. Every incident related in "The Exile" is true of the life of Mrs. Buck's mother with the exception of the names of the people mentioned. Much of the material of the book was learned from her mother's lips and diaries; the rest from her own observation. The New York Times says that "It is in the deepest truth American a portrait of an American mother."

The "dust-bowl" of the Panhandle of Texas is a "mud-bowl" this week after welcomed showers in that region. Farmers and stockmen of the South Plains region report that every surface tank on the plains country was filled by rains ranging from one to five inches.

The Herald has just received the formal announcement of Hon. W. D. McFarlane for re-election to Congress subject to the action of the Democratic Party in the July primary.

You will remember that while we carried nine of the twelve counties by a majority of 4727 votes in 1932, after three counties, Hardeman, Foard and Knox were added to the District, we carried 13 of the 15 counties by a majority of over 5,000 in 1934.

In submitting my candidacy for re-election, I ask your support entirely upon my record of service rendered the past three years, as your Representative. I am glad to be able to state that I have compiled 100 per cent with every pledge I have made you since I have had the honor to be your Representative. As stated by Vice President Garner and other leaders in Congress, a Member is considered more efficient and effective for serving his constituents, with years of service. I took office in March 1933, and since then have devoted my entire time to the duties of the office. I hope the record I have made will meet with your approval.

#### I Have Favored:

1. Immediate cash payment of (soldiers bonus) balance due to the world war veterans on their adjusted service certificates. I have been recognized as one of the leaders in this fight to finish paying the soldier his past due debt. National Commander-in-Chief, James E. Van Zandt of Foreign Wars, concerning my work on this measure said "Tribute has been paid to all of those who played an important part in the passage of the so-called 'bonus' bill and to you, Mac, Old Boy, belongs a great deal of the credit".

2. Adequate old age pensions. I have always favored adequate care for the aged and voted for the Social Security Act, recommended by the President, which while not perfect does more for the aged, the blind, the dependent mothers, the crippled children and the unemployed than any legislation ever enacted by any Nation in the world.

3. Cost of Production plus a reasonable profit for the farmer. Without this the farmers cannot continue to farm.

4. Prevailing rate of wages for all workers for all lines of endeavor.

### 1.33 INCH RAIN FOR WEEK ENDING TODAY

Rainfall for the week, from Thursday to Thursday, is a total of 1.33 inch. Up to last Thursday, May had received 3.64 inch rain. Today the total is 4.97 which is 1.13 inch more than was received for the entire month of May in 1935. There are four days left in the month and dark clouds are hovering about and a fine mist is falling as these figures are being compiled. Without a doubt another heavy rain will fall before the first of June.

May of 1935 was considered a wet month but May 1936 is wetter.

Enthusiasm is mounting as the date draws near and all business houses over the county are closing their stores so that they and all their employees may attend the party, Wednesday of this week Knox City merchants voted and petitioned Mayor Hoge to declare the day a holiday.

#### Parade At Ten O'clock

Initial feature of the day celebration will be a parade. Beginning about ten Wednesday morning the parade will travel the streets of Benjafin sufficient that every guest will have an opportunity to see it all. Pioneers will be seen in wagons and buggies; some will ride old paint on a side saddle and others in hacks. American Legion organizations, Fire boys, Bands and individual business men will feature a unit in the parade. Plans are rapidly developing for the evolution of Chevrolet to be displayed in the parade.

## MEMORIAL DAY

On May 30th it is the custom throughout most of the United States to observe the day as a memorial to the heroes of our nation who gave their lives for its defense. In many states this or some nearby date is observed as a memorial to the soldiers of the Army of the Confederacy who, no less than those others made the supreme sacrifice for the cause in which they believed.

It is meet and proper that these gallant dead, whether they wore khaki or blue or gray, should be held forever in fond remembrance. For they were brave men who did not hesitate to risk their lives that their beloved homeland might live.

But it is also meet and proper it seems to us, to consider whether the youth of today are as ready as these sacred dead were, to fight and to die, if necessary, for their principles. We seem to sense a slackening among the youth of our land of the fervent patriotism which was America's chief glory in the days when our nation was younger. We hear young men say that they would not risk their lives for their country, as their father did. We have noted the polls of students in our great universities in which an appalling number have declared that they would not take up arms in defense of America.

If such a feeling is general among the youth of our land, then it is a

more serious matter than mere unemployment of financial distress. It is through some failure on the part of our institutions, our schools, our churches, our home training, we are raising a generation which feels no such devotion to the principles of liberty and independence as once made every young American eager to go to war in their defense, then our nation is in a sorry case.

We do not believe that such a spirit prevails generally. We do not believe that the young men of America have before so infected with the germ of internationalism that they no longer look upon their own country as the greatest, the most glorious, the finest place in the whole world.

Many will be the prayers offered on Memorial Day at the graves of those who died honorably in the field of battle. Let it be the fervent prayer of every true American on that day that the honor which finds expression in unselfish self-sacrifice for country and for principle may not perish from those who are to take our places.

## Old Clock Keeps Perfect Time

Among other old things of interest which are being unearthed in and about Knox City for the exhibit at the county celebration next Wednesday is numbered a very old clock now in the possession of Mr. W. J. Jones. This old clock is known to be at least fifty years of age.

The clock was received by Mr. Jones in payment of a debt shortly after his marriage some forty six years ago while he was running a store in Parden Texas. Because of its receipt second-handed, it is impossible to determine accurately its exact origin or age. Suffice it to say that during the entire length of time it has been in his possession it has been a perfect timekeeper and not once during that period has it been necessary to send it to a shop for new parts or repair. It strike every half hour and must be wound only once each week. On occasions it has been left for two weeks without being wound and has not stopped running.

An interesting feature of the clock is its calendar hand which works as accurately as either its minute or hour hand. Running on the basis of thirty-one days, the only time necessary to move it forward is at the end of those months of a shorter duration of time. This hand moves forward each night promptly on the stroke of midnight.

This clock has been in Knox County for the past thirty-one years having been removed here at the same time Mr. Jones came to the town to make Knox County his home.

### Other Items Of Interest

Other items of interest found in the Jones home were several pieces of china and an old quilt.

Among the dishes mentioned was a plate of heavy china which is over a hundred years old and has been in the family for many, many years. Others of interest were a tea set of delicate design and workmanship which are some forty-five years old. Another was an old covered fruit stand originally belonging to an aunt of Mrs. Jones and brought to this country by Mrs. Jones from Tennessee.

The quilt mentioned is some sixty years of age. It was given to Mr. Jones when a mere child. Made of basket design, it has no small amount of quilting on it, no two blocks being quilted with the same design. Don't miss seeing these relics and similar ones of interest which will be on display at the Museum during the coming celebration.

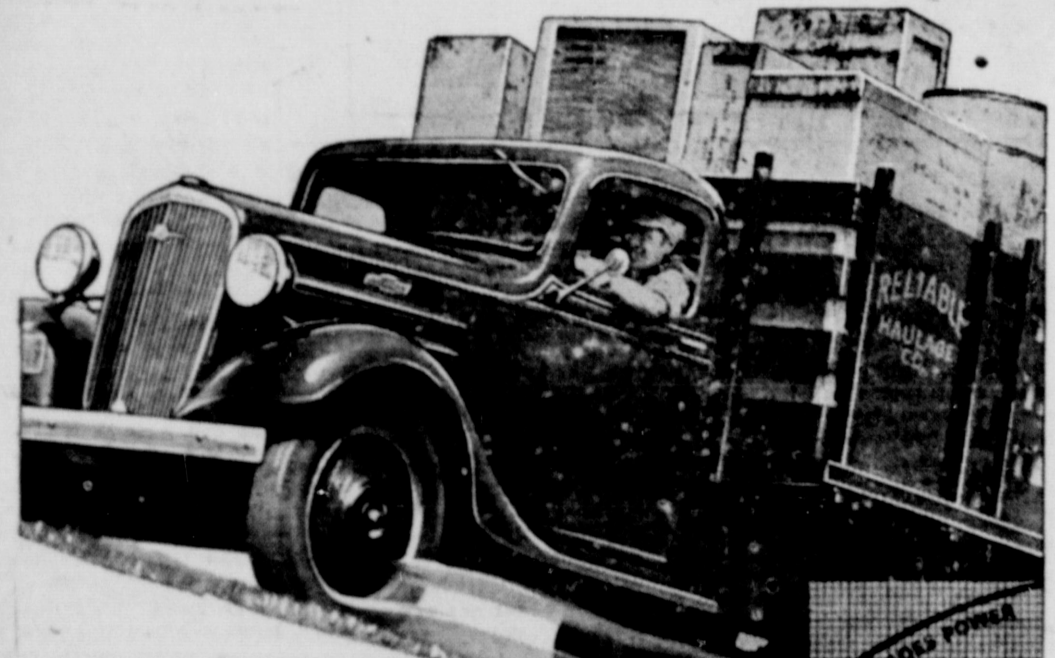

## McFARLANE ANNOUNCES

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

8. Financing farm and city mortgages at low rates of interest over a long period of time in order to encourage home ownership and reduce tenancy.

9. Guaranty of bank deposits.

10. Sound constitutional money issued by the Government, instead of Wall Street currency issued by the banks.

11. Enforcement of our anti-trust laws. I favor independent business and continued competition against absentee ownership and chain control.

12. Revision of our Tax Laws providing revenue based on ability to pay rather than through sales of excise taxes. More than 60 per cent of our present Federal Revenues are raised through sales taxes.

13. Taxing profits out of war and limiting all profits to 10 per cent on all Government War materials contracts in peace time. Government ownership of all war munitions supply.

14. Constitutional Amendment requiring the vote of the people before Congress may declare war except in the event of direct invasion of our Country by an enemy.

15. Rigid Economy in the administration of all Governmental Affairs.

16. Deportation of all Aliens illegally in this country. Some of our most atrocious crimes have been committed by aliens. We have hundreds of thousands of aliens on the relief rolls being fed at the tax payers' expense. All such aliens should be stricken from the rolls.

17. Law Enforcement. I have always favored rigid law enforcement and offered H. R. 6333 suggested by Judge A. H. Carrigan, giving dual jurisdiction of kidnaping, bank robbing and hijacking crimes and concerning this legislation, Chairman Sumners of the Judiciary Committee says:

"Your honest and constant efforts have contributed to the consummation of this item of legislation".

I Have Opposed:

1. Monopoly. It crushes the weak and destroys all hope for equality of opportunity for small business and individual citizens.

2. Abuses existing in our Banking laws. An independent board under complete Government supervision

should control the issuance of credit coin money and regulate its value, as provided in the Constitution.

3. The further issuance of tax exempt interest bearing bonds. This annual interest burden now nears a billion dollars. The President last year urged discontinuance of this program. If this policy is not stopped there will soon be but two classes—one the owner of all wealth and the payer of no taxes; the other the tenant class—paying taxes on what they owe and consume in order to support the Government.

4. Further concentration of wealth. I have offered legislation to check same and to force wealth to pay its just portion of the tax burden.

### Committee Assignments

I have been assigned to one of the 12 Major Committees of the House the Naval Affairs Committee. The records show that this committee is recognized as one of the great Committees of Congress. During this Administration it has worked out much important legislation of vital interest to the general welfare of the Nation. Because of my work I have been assigned to several important duties, one of which made me Chairman of the Committee considering all private bills, dealing with Naval Affairs.

### Special Committee Assignments

I was named on the special investigating committee to investigate aircraft purchases for the Navy and was specially selected to investigate the income tax returns of all concerns selling the Navy aircraft equipment. Because of the disclosures I made in investigating the income tax returns under the direction of the President, the records show that I furnished the Congress information upon which they acted in abolishing the right of all corporations to file consolidated income tax returns, concerning which Senator Borah says:

"I have talked with practically all of the experts as to the advantage which the consolidated returns gives to large corporations and I am informed that it is an advantage in the matter of taxes which, under the provisions of this bill, would amount to some \$300,000,000 a year".

### Counsel For Patent Committee

Last year I was requested by Hon. William I. Sirovich, Chairman of the Committee on Patents to act as General Counsel for the investigation of pooling of patents and cross licensing agreements. Last Fall I went to New York and spent several weeks making such an investigation. Of my work on this Committee, Chairman Sirovich in part said:

"Your unselfish devotion to your work and the fine cooperation that you have extended to our Committee is very deeply appreciated by me".

One of the greatest abuses now existing in the Nation is the monopolies created and existing under our patent law. As a result of our ef-

orts legislation has been recommended correcting these evils.

### The President

During my brief service in Congress it has been my privilege and pleasure to cooperate with our great leader in the White House, the Honorable Franklin D. Roosevelt in his efforts for relief, reform and recovery. This Administration has no doubt made mistakes but I agree with the President when he said that if he could be right 75 per cent of the time he would feel that his Administration has been a success. Certainly whatever mistakes have been made by this Administration have been made in trying to do something for the common people. It is well known they are the ones this Administration has tried to serve.

### They Will Be Done

My entire legislative record has been one of fighting for the rights of the common people and opposing all legislation for the benefit of the special privileged class. This has caused their bitter opposition. We found this in the Campaign two years ago. The Power Trust announced after the passage of the Wheeler Rayburn bill their bitter opposition to those who voted for this legislation.

I have always favored legislation providing the greatest good for the greatest number. I believe in the Democratic slogan "equal rights and opportunities to all special privileges to none". If my record of service rendered meets with your approval, I will greatly appreciate your support and influence in the coming campaign.

I have been delayed in returning home to make an accounting of my stewardship because of important legislation pending here. I have stood by the guns and have fought for your rights and if my record of service rendered meets with your approval I trust that you, my friends, will stand by me and reward honest faithful service rendered.

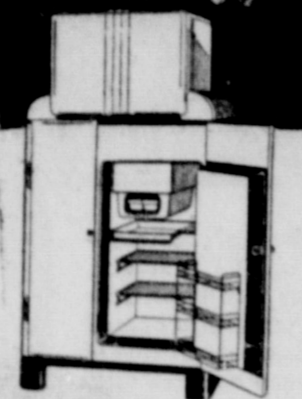
