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### ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

Austin, Texas July 3. The Texas State Department of Health has joined the Government and other organizations in the use of letters to designate phases of their work, according to Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. The letters used at this time are F F F and they stand for fingers, files, and food—the three most common methods of transmitting intestinal diseases.

The three Fs are generally responsible for the spread of typhoid fever, Diarrhea, dysentery, and enteritis. Drinking water is considered a food and as it is used by all ages, great care should be exercised to assure one that their supply is pure. If uncertain the water should be boiled before used for drinking purposes. Surface water and shallow wells are always to be suspected unless proven otherwise. Your city or county health officer will be glad to advise you on the proper method to use in chlorinating your water supply.

It is during hot weather when the most complaints are received on account of diarrhea and dysentery, and parents should do their utmost to prevent it. The chief causes include impure milk, water, contaminated foods or wrong diet. If diarrhea develops the feeding should be stopped or generally diminished and a physician called. Carthartol should not be given unless the doctor prescribes them.

The three Fs are the three sources of danger to the baby. Flies carry disease germs to the baby and its food. Fingers and hands that are not thoroughly washed before preparing baby's food are likely to be germ carriers also. All milk and water intended for the baby should be boiled for five minutes and then carefully covered and kept in a cool place until used.

### CHEVROLET FIRST MONTH AT WORLD'S FAIR

First month's production of Chevrolet cars at the Chicago World's Fair, General Motors building assembly line totaled 486 units, according to information released by Dudley Praser, assembly line manager.

By actual count, 648,107 people have visited the exhibit to watch the building of Chevrolet cars, an increase over the first 30 days last year.

Retail sales of Chevrolet cars in General Motors building are materially higher than last year also. It was reported.

The Chevrolet World's Fair assembly line employs 175 workmen selected by merit from the Janesville, Kansas City, Norwood and Flint assembly plants. They work six hours a day, six days a week, according to the NRA automotive code. The line operates from 1:30 in the afternoon till 9:30 at night, except Sunday.

**BARUCH—picks up pen**  
My old friend Bernard M. Baruch, has shaken off all of his business connection and will devote the rest of his life to writing his memories. They ought to make interesting reading. A native of South Carolina, son of a Jewish surgeon in the Confederate Army, "Bernie" Baruch made himself one of the most powerful figures in finance, as well as one of the richest men in this country. When the war came, he was one of the first to volunteer his services to President Wilson, and as chairman of the War Industries Board and general financial and business adviser to the Administration, he played a part in the war as important as that of any general in the field.

If Mr. Baruch will set down all that he knows about the "inside" activities which have occupied his life, it will be one of the most important books ever written.

**HOUSES—cost too much**  
Most houses cost too much. Every body who has given serious study to the subject of housing agrees to that. Better houses can be built for less money, and the day is coming when everyone will realize that. I don't know how long it will take before one can buy a house as one buys an automobile, all ready to set up and live in, but many folk predict that is coming soon.

If automobiles were built with as much waste of time and labor as goes into most houses, the cheapest car would cost \$50,000 or so.

On the other hand, many houses cost little enough. I read the other day of a family in Serbia that built itself a new house for 16 cents. That was all the money they spent, and it went for window-glass. The men-folk of the family quarried the stone, cut the wood, did all the work and built a bigger house for a growing family.

Some of my country neighbors have done almost the same thing. Good houses, too, they have constructed with their own hands. That was the way almost every house in America was built, in the pioneer days, and some of them are still livable. My own farm home, built in 1785, is good for another hundred-years or more. I think we are going to see a return to simple and less expensive housing for everybody.

TWO RULERS TO FORE Inevitably Jerusalem came under the conquering power of Rome...

Rome passed from a nominal republic into an empire, Cesar Augustus was Emperor and Herod (beneficiary of the brave Maccabees) reigned in Palestine when Jesus was born.

The policy of Rome was tolerant local customs and even local prejudices were not greatly intodferred with and Jews were permitted to carry on their worship and, to a large extent, the internal affairs of their government as they chose under their own rules.

CHEVROLET ROTARIANS' CROSS COUNTRY DRIVE Seven Stockton, Calif. Rotarians led by A. H. Patterson established new unofficial records in their trip to the International Rotary convention at Detroit.

Making the journey in two Master Six Chevrolet sedans, the party covered the 2225 miles from Stockton to Chicago in 29 hours and 54 minutes, according to Patterson, who drove the pace car.

The 1,047 miles of the journey, from Stockton to Rawlins, Wyoming, was made in 19 hours and 24 minutes, despite rain, snow, wind, and cloudbursts from Battle Mountain, Nevada to Rawlins.

In the entire journey from Stockton to Detroit, only four quarts of oil were added, two to each car, and not a drop of water was added to either. Patterson attributed his unusually fast time to knee action, stating that without this feature it was very doubtful if the cars could have negotiated the long grind, much of which was over unfavorable roads and detours, at such high speeds.

Following the convention here, four of the party took delivery of new Chevrolets in Flint and returned to the West Coast by different routes. Those making the trip were Patterson, Paul Weston, Dr. C. D. Hollinger, Edward De Simas, Harry J. Bruton, Richard Holt, and Woodruff Patterson.

mon, idealizing the reigns of these great kings. They were sure that some day another king of David's lineage would sit on the throne in their sacred city and they even found in Micah a verse which some imagined to mean that their king would be born in Bethlehem.

But thou, Beth-lehem Ephratah, thought thou be little among the thousands of Judah, yea out of these shall he come forth unto me that is to be ruler in Israel; whose goings forth have been from of old, from everlasting.

It is necessary to have this little historic background in order to understand why there were two rulers simultaneously in the days of Jesus Herod the King, whom Jesus characterized as "that fox," and Pilate, the Roman governor; and why the Jewish crowds, fired by patriotic enthusiasm, sought to take Jesus, "Son of David," by force and make Him their king; and why, when He refused, they melted away from Him and allowed the shouts of "Hosanna" of Palm Sunday to be drowned out on Friday by the shout of "Crucify."

As nearly as scholars can figure it out, Jesus was born about 4 B. C. Christian chronology was not fixed until the sixth century, and our subsequent study of Roman records indicates that a mistake of about four years was made. Assuming the date 4 B. C., therefore, we now approach the nineteenth hundredth anniversary of Jesus' thirtieth birthday.

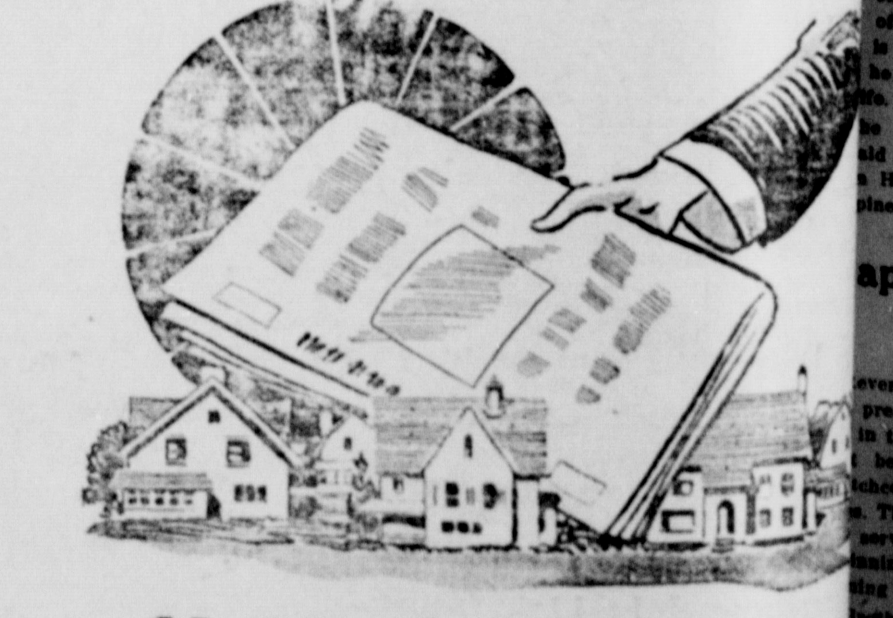
