Texas Employment Commission Needs More Interviewers

G. B. Purcell, office manager of the Texas Employment Commission, Wichita Falls, said Wednesday that competitive examinations are being held for Farm Placement Interviewer, Class II, with the Commission.

The positions to be filled, Purcell said, are seasonal during peaks of agricultural activity in specified areas. Employment will be temporary and intermittent, and it is possible the interviewer will not work more than six months a year. Beginning salary is \$270 per month.

A candidate must have been a resident of Texas the past five years, and must have a high school education or equivalent with one year in agricultural work which has provided experience in employing workers. A written examination will be given.

Farmers With Emergency Feed Loans May Apply for Additional Amount

Farmers and ranchers who have already made applications for emergency feed through the Farmers Home Administration may apply for more feed even though their present sixty-day supply is not exhausted, according to John Atterbury, member of the County PHA committee.

The application must be made before Tuesday night, Feb. 15, when the county committee will meet to approve applications.

Other members of the committee are August Schumacher and M. H. Jackson.

"Since the deadline for applications was set for Feb. 15, many farmers are under the impression that if they have already applied for emergency feed loans, and their sixty-day period is not up by Feb. 15, they cannot make another application," Mr. Atterbury said. "This is not the case, however. If you have applied for assistance and even have fifty days left of your sixty-day period, you can make another application before the deadline."

Deadline for Filing For City Office Set for March 5

The deadline for filing as a candidate in the city election will be March 5, 30 days prior to the election, Mayor Guy Glenn said this week.

The election will be held Tuesday, April 5.

Due to the fact that Knox City changed to the aldermanic form of government and elected three aldermen in a special election in July, the terms of all city officials will expire in April and the offices will be filled in the election, Mayor Glenn said. Ordinarily, only the terms of Glenn and Alderman Jack Coats would expire.

Other aldermen at present are Buddy Angle, who was held over from the city commission, and Ode Green, Doyle Graham and Fuller Shannon, who were elected in July.

Also to be elected is a city judge, an office now held by Loyce Teague.

Candidates for any of the offices must file their names with the mayor by the deadline, March 5.

Outlook for Pork in '55 Not Bright, County Agent Says

The outlook for pork producers is not too good, but with home grown grain and good management, producers in Knox County should be able to make a reasonable profit on hogs to supplement other farm income, County Agent W. J. Bryan said this week.

After declining for two years, production of hogs was expanded in 1954 because of higher prices received. The 1954 pig crop totaled 90 1/2 million head, an increase of 13 percent from a year earlier. The spring pig crop in 1954 was up 13 per cent and the 1954 fall pig crop was 14 per cent larger than 1953. "This large production," Bryan said, "helped to bring about a decline in hog prices."

Bryan added that Extension Service specialists predict a continued production increase, but at a slower rate, in 1955. It is estimated that the 1955 spring pig crop will be 5 percent larger than the spring pig crop of 1954.

Considerably more hogs will be slaughtered and more pork pro-

duced in the spring and summer of 1955 than in the past year because of the 14 percent larger fall pig crop in 1954. This will mean a larger supply on the market and should tend to keep prices lower in the spring and summer compared with the high prices in the spring of 1954, Bryan said.

Later in 1955, the increase in slaughter and the pork supply should be narrowed. "Prices for hogs in the fall of 1955 may not be much below those of last fall," the county agent concluded. "Let's hope so, anyway."

F. H. A. Loans to Texans Total More Than \$46,000,000

Nearly twenty thousand Texas farmers and ranchers received financial aid from the Farmers Home Administration during 1954. These are families who were unable to get financial assistance from banks and other private credit sources.

More than 46 million dollars was loaned to these farm people. This was announced this week by Walter T. McKay, State FHA Director. On the other hand, Texas farmers and ranchers paid off loans with the FHA totaling \$36,539,147.

This is a remarkable achievement, McKay pointed out, in view of the growth which plagued most of the state this year.

One of the major programs set up by Secretary of Agriculture Benson to provide relief to farmers and ranchers in drought disaster areas is the Emergency Loan Program.

Procedure for emergency loans was worked out recently at a meeting attended by Senators Price Daniel and Lyndon Johnson and Congressmen George Mahon, J. T. Rutherford, W. R. Poage and O. Clark Fisher, and members of the staff of the National

Administrator. This procedure is in keeping with the intent of the law in making emergency livestock loans, and will permit the ranchmen to retain a percentage of their ewe lambs or heifer calves, depending on the nature of their operations, to replace cull breeding animals so the herd will be maintained at the property level.

In addition to the Emergency and Special Livestock loans, the FHA lends money in its regular program to farmers operating family type farms for operating expenses, equipment and livestock purchases, for the development of soil and water resources, and for farm purchases, farm enlargements from appropriated funds, giving special preference to veterans.

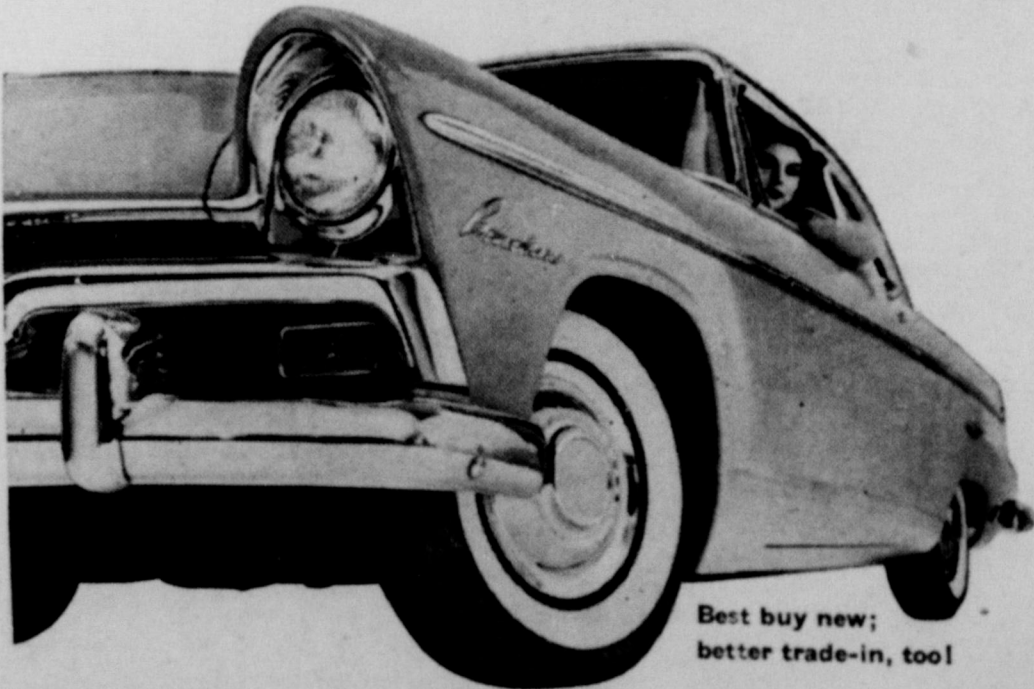

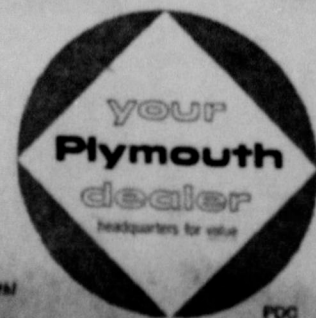

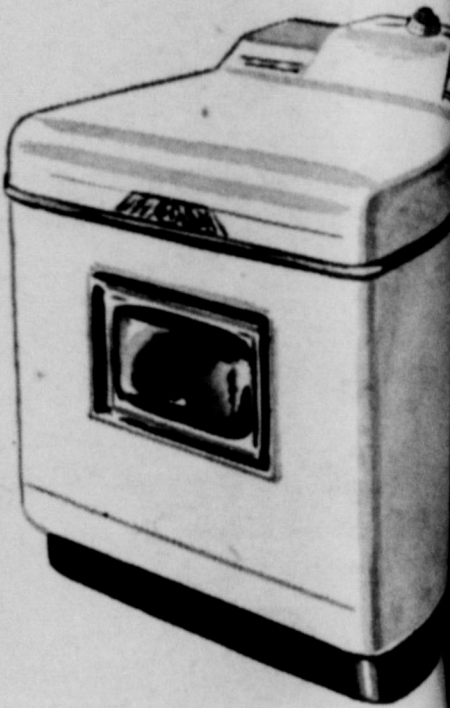
