J. T. Gilpin, manager of the Knox County ASC office, said applications for the assistance will be taken at the ASC office here and at the FHA office in Seymour. Both offices will begin taking applications immediately.

Farmers may also graze land that has been put in the Soil Bank acreage reserve program, Gilpin said. Under present rules, grazing will be allowed until September 1.

Age Limit Lifted On Salk Polio Shots

Anyone in this area can now have the Salk polio vaccine

Henry A. Holle, state health commissioner, announced Tuesday the removal of all age restrictions on the use of commer cial polio vaccine in the state, effective immediately.

Previously only persons under 20 and pregnant, women have been eligible to receive shots of the protective vaccine.

Knox City's two drug stores Wednesday reported a total of 360 shots in stock at the present time. A spokesman in the health department said "there is plenty of vaccine available all over Texas now."

The state health commissioner said 16 percent of all cases of paralytic polio and 29 percent of polio deaths in Texas this year have occurred among persons above 19 years of age.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section I. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another Section, to be designated as Section 51-c, which shall read as follows:


