Plane Crash Sunday Injures Crop Duster

Bob Loyd of Haskell was injured Sunday when the dusting plane he was flying crashed on the Sidney Hester farm near O'Brien.

Loyd, a duster pilot for eight years, suffered a severe facial cut.

The accident occurred about 6 a. m. Sunday. According to eyewitness reports, Loyd was making his turn at the end of a run when the plane apparently stalled out. The plane, a Piper duster belonging to Worsham Flying Service, was badly damaged.

Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Branton will observe their fiftieth wedding anniversary Sunday, August 12 when their only child, Mrs. Bill Clarke, will honor them with "open house" at her home.

Mr. Branton, a young man of 20, met Willie Abel, a 16-year-old girl, at a community picnic in Cross Plains in 1904. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Abel who lived in the Oakland Community, which was not far from his home in the Long Branch community, both in Eastland county.

The two began seeing each other rather often until he left Eastland county for the Cliff Community in Haskell county to work as a carpenter and on farms.

The couple married August 12, 1906, and Mr. Branton brought his bride directly to the Cliff Community. Later that year they moved to the Knox City area.

Cicero Watkins, a Methodist preacher and an uncle of the bride, performed the marriage ceremony in the middle of the road at the Amity Church in Eastland county, where an all-day singing was in progress. Witnesses were those attending the singing, including a Miss Ethel Haynes who later became Mrs. B. B. Branton, sister-in-law of G. A. She is better known here as Mrs. Ethel Branton, who owns and operates the Hospital Cafe.

Mr. and Mrs. Branton have lived in the Knox City area since that time, except for a year and a half in Eastland county where their daughter, Loree, was born in 1911, and a year in Imperial Valley, Calif., where they moved during the big drought of 1918 to "pull bolls" to make payments on their farm west of Knox City, now

Service Station Robbed at Guthrie; Two Men Nabbed

Two men robbed the Phillips 66 Service Station at Guthrie early last Thursday morning, leaving Charles Hensley, 16, bound and gagged.

The robbery occurred about 2 a. m. Thursday, when Hensley was alone at the station. The robbers took slightly over \$100 from the cash register.

The robbers eluded roadblocks set up by officers from Motley, Cottle, King, Knox, Baylor and Dickens counties, but were caught Friday morning at Hobbs, N. M.

Returned to King County by Sheriff Dub Hollar, the two men were charged with armed robbery. They were Earl Barton, 20, and Bobby Ray Music, 20, both of Ft. Worth. When taken into custody they were driving a 1956 Ford convertible, stolen in Ft. Worth.

The hijacking at Guthrie occurred about an hour after a man was beaten to death and robbed at a Crosbyton service station, on the same highway, but the two crimes were not connected, officers said.

Lynn Tankersley Gins First Bale At O'Brien Gin

The O'Brien Cooperative Gin Co. turned out its first bale of 1956 cotton Saturday morning. The premium bale belonged to Lynn Tankersley of Knox City, and was produced on the S. L. Stanley farm in Haskell County, which Tankersley farms.

The bale of 2,320 pounds of seed cotton was gathered off eight acres. It produced a 580-pound finished bale. Bert Davis, gin manager, said the cotton graded strict middling 31-32, an exceptionally good staple length for this area.

The cotton was irrigated once after it came up.

Three bales were ginned at O'Brien Tuesday and another five were expected Wednesday from the farm of John Reed, west of Goree, Davis said.

Roberts Quits City Police Job

The city council, at the regular meeting Tuesday night, voted to accept the resignation of City Policeman Alvin Roberts. The resignation was effective immediately.

Roberts had been city policeman since May of 1955, when he replaced Lewis Floyd.

Mayor Barney Arnold said this morning that the position of city policeman is expected to be filled by next week.

In other action at the meeting the council passed two ordinances recently requested by the State Insurance Commission. Passage of the ordinances, which will be published next week, will earn a reduction in the key rate for fire insurance.

One is a Fire Marshal's Ordinance and the other a Fire Zone Ordinance, which will regulate the type of buildings erected in the fire zone.

County School Board Annexes 1,882 Acres To Knox District

The Knox County School Board annexed 1,882 acres of land to the Knox City School district in a meeting held recently in Benjamin.

The territory, which was detached from the Munday school district, includes land owned by the Howell Estate, J. J. Mills, O. A. Parker, Mrs. Philip Colehour, W. H. Freeman and J. J. Foshee.

Signers of the petition, which was presented to the county board in May, were Mr. and Mrs. Joe W. Warren, Mr. and Mrs. H. F. Newbrough, O. A. Parker, R. D. Parker, Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Mills, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Freeman, Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Collins, Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Stone, Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Hollis, Mary Lou Foshee and J. J. Foshee.

The amount of property valuations, based on the county and state renditions, is \$30,030.00.

At the same time, the county board assigned to the Knox City district 1.2185 percent of the Munday district's bonded indebtedness, to be paid annually.

All was peace and harmony at the Knox County Democratic convention, held in Benjamin Saturday, with only one dissenting vote being cast on any issue.

While gubernatorial candidate Price Daniel polled more votes in Knox County than Ralph Yarborough in the first primary, loyalist Democrats apparently favoring Yarborough were in firm control of the convention. A resolution was passed that, without calling Daniel by name, condemned him for supporting Eisenhower and for cross-filing in 1952.

Local Woman's Cousin Killed In Plane Crash

Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Reese were in Ft. Worth Tuesday to attend funeral services for her cousin, Henry West, who died in an airplane crash during the week end.

Mr. West was piloting a Beechcraft Bonanza for a honeymooning couple, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Keller, who were also killed. The plane crashed on a salt flat 35 miles north of Port Mansfield and three miles inland from Laguna Madre.

A Raymondville crop duster sighted the wrecked plane, scattered over a 150 foot area. More than 50 aircraft had searched after the plane failed to arrive at McAllen on a flight to Monterrey.

Funeral services for West were held at University Baptist Church in Ft. Worth Tuesday afternoon. Immediate survivors are the wife and two sons.

Lorraine Man New Assistant Coach

W. W. Lang, Jr., who in July accepted a position as assistant athletic coach of the Knox City Schools, recently submitted his resignation, and the resignation was accepted at the regular meeting of the school board Tuesday night.

To replace Lang, the trustees elected Bob Johnson of Lorraine. Mr. Johnson is a graduate of McMurry College, Abilene. He lettered four years as a halfback in high school football and three years as a halfback on the McMurry Indian team. Two of those years, while at McMurry, he played halfback while Les Cowan, head Greyhound coach, was playing end. Johnson has coached all athletics at Lorraine the past two years and resigned to come here to "work with the backfield and Cowan."

The county is allowed three votes at the state convention, so each delegate will have only a half vote. All votes will be cast as a unit, however.

The resolutions committee approved, and the convention adopted, resolutions condemning all democrats who defected to the Republican party in 1952, endorsing Lyndon Johnson's request that all delegates be loyal democrats, and asking that the party's candidate for governor be instructed to support the party's nominee for president.

Another resolution asked that the delegation to the national convention be formed into an active campaign committee to work for election of the Democratic nominee for president.

A third resolution was not recommended unanimously by the resolutions committee and drew the only dissenting vote. The resolution pointed out that the prolonged drought is proving disastrous to Texas farmers, and asked for a platform calling for price supports at 90 percent of parity, provisions for disaster aid to agriculture, an increase in market news service, promoting greater agriculture research, and use of state and national advertising mediums to promote sale of farm products.

L. V. Patterson, Munday delegate and president of the Knox County Farm Bureau, objected to the provision calling for 90 percent of parity.

Farm and Ranch Notes

Roy B. England, County Agent

The cabbage looper infestation appears to be spreading to new fields of cotton every day, and attempts to check this worm have not been altogether successful. Presence of the cabbage looper can be noted by the appearance of ragged leaves on the cotton plant, and if the plant is shaken vigorously, a number of worms may be shaken off.

The Extension Entomologists recommend Endrin at the rate of 1 qt. per acre for control of heavy infestations. However, this is a relatively expensive poison, and in many instances control of the looper can be obtained by the use of DDT and BHC in conjunction with bollworm control. While DDT alone is sufficient for bollworm control, the BHC is necessary to slow down the work of the cabbage looper.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments to be Voted on at an Election to be Held on Nov. 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 15-a, requiring medical or psychiatric testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of trial by jury where the person under inquiry has not been charged with commission of a criminal offense.

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows: "No person shall be committed as a person of unsound mind except on competent medical or psychiatric testimony to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of person of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered by a judge of either the County or Probate Court of the county where the trial is being held, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties or other subdivisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machines in such manner that each voter shall vote on the machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 23 proposing an amendment to Section 9 of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas so as to provide that the Commissioners Court in each county may levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund purposes, permanent improvement fund purposes, road and bridge purposes and jury fund purposes so long as the total of these tax rates does not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year, and providing further that the Commissioners Court shall not incur any outstanding bonds or other obligations providing for the necessary election and form of ballot, and providing for the necessary promulgations and publications.

Section 2. That Section 9, Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the tax provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes, provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year, and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the roads provided that a majority of the qualified property tax payers of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote with the majority of the qualified voters of the county to exceed Fifteen Cents (15c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in the county. And the Legislature may enact local laws for the maintenance of the roads and highways, without the notice required for special elections. This Section shall not be construed to limit the powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Sections of this Constitution."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to an election to be held on the first Monday after the first Monday in November, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Commissioners Court in each county to levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes so long as the total of these funds does not exceed the maximum tax rate of Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year and to incur any outstanding bonds or other obligations."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be included in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

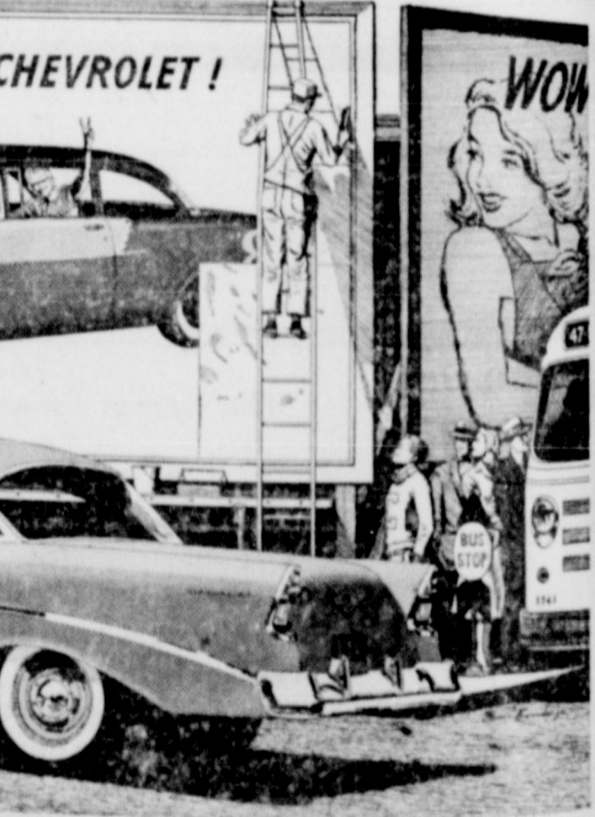
