Clifton W. Brannon, famed Longview evangelist, will be the principal speaker at a Haskell Baptist Association Brotherhood meeting, to be held in Munday June 7.

This meeting is expected to attract 500 men of this area. A picnic style dinner will be served by the Munday Baptist Brotherhood, beginning at 7:00 p. m.

Brannon's phenomenal rise from a Georgia farm boy, left with the responsibility of caring for his widowed mother and six brothers and sisters, to a successful corporation attorney, winning four out of five cases which he argued before the supreme court, tops even the accomplishments of many great men.

Brannon's career as a lawyer was very colorful, and he was only 26 when he appeared before the U. S. Supreme Court for the first time. When he decided to give his full time to evangelistic work he resigned as Secretary and General Counsel of R. G. LeTourneau, Inc., President of the Tournealayer Housing Corp., Vice President of Texas Casualty and Insurance Co., and Director of Lone Star Steel Co., largest steel mill in the southwest.

## Schedule Announced For Junior Boys Baseball League

## Funeral Held at Throckmorton for Local Pastor's Father

W. E. Parmenter, 92, died in Hamilton Hospital in Olney Friday after a months illness.

The deceased was the father of Rev. C. W. Parmenter, who has been pastor of the First Methodist Church in Knox City for the past year.

Mr. Parmenter was born Sept. 25, 1858, near Orleans, Ill., and came to Texas at the age of 14 by steamboat and ox wagon. He settled near Randolph, Texas, and in 1882 married Ella Blackburn. She died in 1891 leaving two small daughters.

In 1892 he married Mary Sue Broiles. She preceded him in death and left three small children.

From 1904 to 1908, Mr. Parmenter was county tax assessor of Throckmorton County. He served as county agent in 1918.

He had been a member of the Methodist Church since 1889 and on the Board of Stewards for 58 years. He had belonged to the Odd Fellows since 1890 and had been a member of the Masonic Lodge since 1906.

Funeral services were held at the Throckmorton Methodist Church at 2:00 p. m. Saturday.

The Rev. Tilden Armstrong, pastor of the Throckmorton Methodist Church, and the Rev. R. L. Butler of the Munday Methodist Church officiated.

Children who survive, besides Rev. Parmenter, are Mrs. C. S. Protter of Wellman, Mrs. Sodie Buchanan of Breckenridge, Mrs. Hattie Lilly and Mrs. Rena Thompson of Throckmorton.

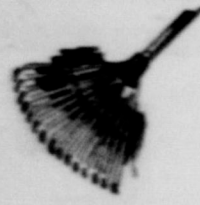

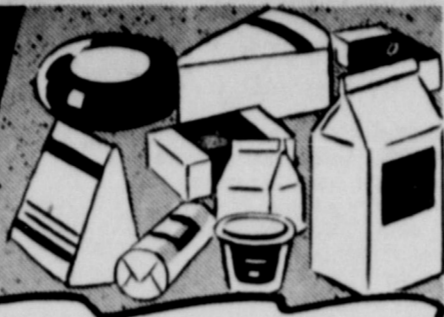
