## **Screwworm Eradication Fund Campaign Begins for Callahan**

fund drive for Callahan County started Monday and will conclude April 12, 1965. Callahan County's share of the \$300,000 which Texas livestock producers must raise is \$4,000.

The goal can be reached if every livestock owner will contribute on a basis of ten cents per animal unit. An animal unit consists of one dairy or beef animal, one horse, or five sheep, goats or hogs.

Livestock producers may leave their contributions at the First National Bank in Baird, the Peoples State Bank in Clyde, or the Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains. Donations may also be left with any vocational agriculture teacher or the county chairman, Judge Byron Richin to any of the above mentioned sources. Checks should be made out to Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation.

The program needs approximately \$1.1 million to operate through April, May and June. The Texas legislature has already voted \$250,000 and congress is expected to appropriate \$550,000 for the three-month period. These funds cannot be spent unless producer money is also made available.

The screwworm has been eradicated from the Southwest. This county had no cases in 1964 and only ten in 1963. If producers fail to make up the money needed, hundreds of cases are possible this year.




