The annual 4-H Fat Calf Show held ut Munday last Saturday was a huge success in every detail

The Chamber of Commerce and bus iness men of Munday served a chuck wagon dinner to over 300 visitors, exhillitors and members of the different livestock judging teams from Haskell, Foard, Knox and Baylor counties.

The high point of the show was the selection of the Grand Champion steer which was owned and fed by Stanley D. Glover and bred by the League Ranch. This steer was of extra quality and finish and weighed 990 pounds. Mr. Scofield, the judge of the show and other visitors thought this steer would ne close to a Grand Championship at Wichita Falls on March 9

The Reserve Championship award was won by Carrol Fred Glover, with a calf that weighed 950 pounds, and was also bred by the League-Davis ranch of Benjamin.

The Blue Ribbon calf of the junior division was fed by Fred Lewis Cren shaw, Benjamin, and bred by the Mc-Faddin ranch of Benjamin. This calf was of extra type and quality and weighed 760 pounds. Army Advises How To Secure Used Trucks

How to proceed in spot negotiation purchase of trucks which the Army considers uneconomical to repair for its own use is explained by John C. Massenburg, regional director of the Office of Defense Transportation.

The prospective buyer first must obtain from an ODT district office nearest the point of sale a letter indicating a Certificate of Necessity will be is sued for the vehicle.

The prospective buyer may use the letter as a permit to view the vehicles to be sold. If one is selected, he will complete the deal through the ODT.

A Proclamation By The President

In response to the appeal of the National Red Cross, the people of the Nation are rising to meet the needs. These needs are set before us at least in part by the following Proclamation by the President of the United

WHEREAS the war has entered a decisive stage requiring the fullest measure of individual sacrifice:

WHEREAS the American National Red Cross is an auxiliary to the United States armed forces and, as such, is providing indispensable service to our troops throughout the world as well as to their families at home;

WETEREAS these war time activities, including the collection of lifesaving blood for the wounded, recreation work in military hospitals, provision of aid to families of service men, shipment of food parcels to war prisoners, production of surgical dressings, operation of over seas clubs and recreation centers, and recruitment of army and navy nurses, all combine to save countless lives, restore hope, and provide comfort for our

WHEREAS through its vast network of local chapters, this agency of our people simultaneously conducts an extensive program of training and community service, while continuing with traditional efficiency to lessen the distress of those overwhelmed by disaster; and

WHEREAS this agency is wholly dependent upon individual support and personal participation and is issuing it's 1944 appeal to the entire citizenship for a minimum war fund of \$200,000,000;

NOW, THEREFORE, I. FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, President of the United States of America and President of the American Red Cross, do hereby designate the month beginning March 1, 1944 as "Red Cross Month" and earnestly beseech my fellow Americans to observe it by opening their hearts to this humanitarian appeal in order that we may keep the Red Cross at the side of our fighting men and their dependents in their hour of greatest need

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington, this the 19th day of February, in the year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and fourty-four, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and bixty-eighth.


