Clonts Family Plays Santa For Former Residents

One of the happiest stories to develop this past Christmas season started here in Knox City when the Joe Clonts "decided to do some house renovation before the holidays. Under the rug of a small closet they found a considerable number of government Series E bonds. Examination showed the bonds to be the property of J. T. Pryor (who with his wife had lived in the present Clonts house in 1952 & 1953.)

The problem then was to find the present address of Pryor as he was remembered by a few people here as an employer of some oil well drilling company and had likely moved many times since leaving here. Mr. W. E. Clonts made many inquiries and finally wrote Boyce Cox in Graham. Mr. Cox worked in the Knox City during our "oil boom" days of 1952 to 1955.

Luckily, Mr. Cox remembered the Pryors and knew that Pryor had a brother living in Midland. Mr. Clonts then wrote to Midland telling the brother that he wanted to contact J. T. Pryor to return some mislaid bonds.

The letter was forwarded to Pryor's present address: Sulphur Springs, and just this week Mr. Clonts received a reply with the instructions to forward the bonds. Apparently the Pryors had never missed the bonds.

A quick estimate of the present worth of the bonds (including 20 years interest) showed them to be worth nearly a thousand dollars.

Our hat is off to the Clonts family for taking the time and trouble to locate the Pryors. Maybe they could operate a Missing Persons Bureau on the side.

FINAL RITES FOR FIRE VICTIM HELD TUESDAY

Funeral services were held for Willie M. Warren, 66, Tuesday at Smith Funeral Home Chapel at 2 p.m. Rev. Floyd Bailey, Foursquare pastor, officiated.

Mr. Warren apparently died in a fire at his home, 15 miles west of Knox City at approximately 5 a.m. Monday, when the building was destroyed.

Sheriff Dub Holler of King County, where the mishap occurred, was on hand for the inquest Tuesday morning, assisted by Texas Ranger Homer T. Melton.

The body was not recognizable and Sheriff Holler said they ruled the remains as that of Mr. Warren and that the fire was an accident.

Mr. Warren, a worker on the Frank McAuley Jr. farm, lived alone in a home located west of Knox City and just inside King County.

The blaze was first discovered by John Crowover who was enroute to Canyon with his son-in-law Joe Smith. They looked for Mr. Warren before driving to the farm of J. B. Ferguson to call Mr. McAuley, who then notified the proper authorities. The roof of the building had already collapsed, however when Crowover arrived.

Survivors are two sons, J. C. of Odessa and Willie R. of Knox City; four brothers, Tommy, Clarence, Hess and Vaudie Lee all of Milo, Okla., a sister, Mrs. Clara Ellis of Ardmore, Okla., and five grandchildren.

F.H.A. OFFICE NOW OPEN

The Knox City office of the Farmers Home Administration is now open for business in the Masonic Lodge Building, formerly occupied by the Smith Funeral Home. The office opened last Monday, January 3rd.

Mr. Joe T. Boone is the County Supervisor for Knox County and will be in charge of the local office. Mrs. Mamie Watson is the clerk for the new office. The office will be open five days a week, and Mondays will be set aside for Mr. Boone to discuss the various loan programs with applicants.

The office is authorized to make loans to farmers when unable to secure credit through normal sources at reasonable rates and terms. Loans include those to rural residents to build houses, and in communities less than 5,500 population, loans may be made to build houses in town. Also included are operating loans to farmers and real estate loans to buy or improve farms such as soil and water development or irrigation wells. Other type loans are available to communities or groups to finance recreational facilities or community water and sewer systems.

Another program is the Economic Opportunity Program which is available to low income rural individuals or associations for agriculture and non-agriculture purposes.

Mr. Boone is a graduate of Texas Tech, Lubbock, and moved here from Paris, Texas. He has been with the FHA for eight years. His wife, Mary Ann, and four children Lisa, 7, Brett, 5, Kelley 2, and Kristi, 1, have

moved here with Mr. Boone and are living in the house recently vacated by the Larry Waggoners on Eighth Street. They are members of the Lutheran Church.

Mrs. Watson is a former resident of Knox City, having lived here in 1960-1962. She moved here from Brownfield, where she worked with the FHA approximately four years. She is living at 401 East Seventh Street.

Mr. Ralph W. Dent is the District Supervisor with headquarters in Haskell. His office covers 16 county districts with 10 county officers under him.

Mr. Lester J. Cappleman is the State Director, located in Temple, Texas.

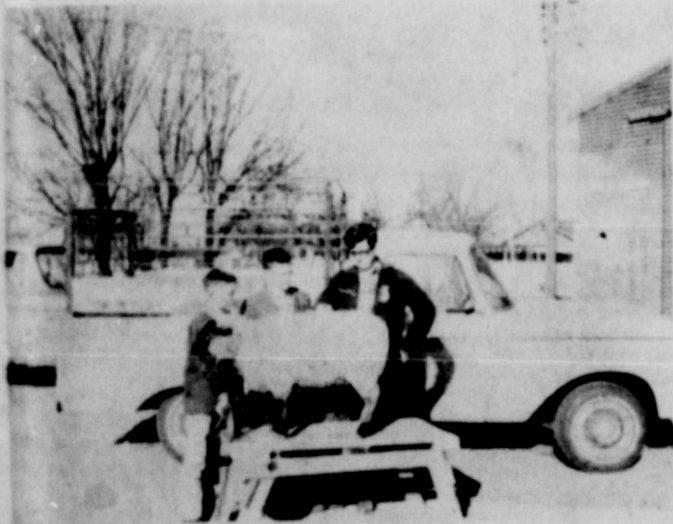

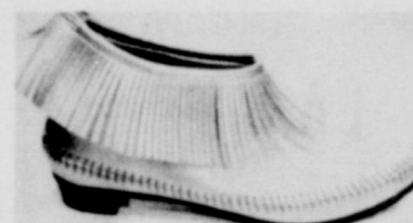

Lots Of Water Can Cause Damage

We are all aware of the great amount of work that goes into planning and constructing a new modern highway system where it is known that great numbers of multi-wheeled vehicles will travel over the same place time after time. Without the planning and construction of these modern systems it would be impossible for but a few vehicles to pass without doing great damage to the soil over which they must pass.

So it is with water reports Wesley Robbins technician with the Soil Conservation Service in Knox City.

When large amounts of water pass over the land without some preparation being made for it, then great amounts of damage may be done to the soil. In preparing for the passing of these large amounts of water, grassed waterways have become one of the most frequently used methods for taking this water to a safe disposal area.

Grassed Waterways are needed on many farms in the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District to dispose of excess water from terraces, diversion terraces, fields or may be outside water that comes across a field to a safe disposal area.

Most waterways require some shaping before they can be seeded. They are shaped, if possible, to keep as much water as possible out of them until the establishment of a permanent vegetative cover.

There are two popular methods of seeding a permanent type vegetation in waterways, one is to a summer or warm weather plant such as Bermudagrass, Dideoats Grama, K. R. Bluestem, Johnsongrass or some other accepted warm season plant. These must be planted in the spring of the year when wind and water erosion is at its peak. To protect the young plants from wind and water erosion a dead litter of forage sorghum, red top cane or mulched cotton burrs may be used.

The Forage sorghum or cane is planted in the spring of the year and allowed to make as much growth as possible, "but is kept from making a seed crop by mowing or shredding," one growing season prior to the seeding of the permanent vegetation. The dead litter crop will protect the young plants from damage by wind and water until they become established.

The second method is the planting of a cool season plant such as Western Wheatgrass. This is planted in the fall of the year, between Sept. 1st. and Nov. 1st, when wind and water erosion is not considered to be as dangerous and therefore does not need the protection of a dead litter crop. The waterway should be well established in a protective cover before any water in large amounts is allowed to pass through it.

After the waterway is established great care should be taken to protect it from over grazing, being used for a road or turnout for turning farm equipment around. Practices such as these will destroy the vegetation and defeat the purpose of a waterway.

One of the services provided by the Soil Conservation Service is to assist landowners in the establishment of a waterway. Cost-share assistance for a waterway is provided by the A. S.C.S. office and the Great

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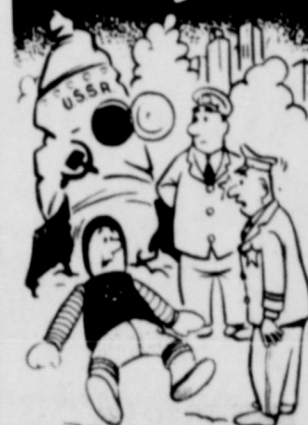
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
