

Cotton Promotion Termed Success Greyhounds Win Friday Nite

Knox City's Cotton Promotion Week was termed this week as "highly successful and pleasing". A total of 376 persons visited the Needlework display at the American Legion building during its two-day opening and 130 attended on Saturday at the Agriculture and Chemical Display in the Cobb Building.

An approximate crowd of 300 was present for the Saturday night Cotton Dress Revue presented by Mrs. Paul Clayton as fashion Commentator.

Serving as master of ceremonies and presenting various awards was Paul Clayton.

Music, appropriate to the occasion was provided by the Knox City Stage Band and organ music provided by Caldwell Music Co. of Abilene.

Named as first place winners in the Cotton Poster contest among county schools were Phil Cook, Fred Cook, both of Gilliland for first and second prizes, respectively. Third place went to a trio of Munday boys. Donald Ray Jones, Johnny Polk and Gary Howrey for their combined efforts on one entry. Ivie, an instructor at the University of Texas, was offered Monday, September 19, at 2 p. m. at St. Mary's Cathedral with Rev. Harold Zink, CSC, officiating.

Mr. Ivie, 54, brother of Mutt Ivie of Knox City, died from injuries suffered Friday in a two-car collision near Sealy.

He had lived in Austin for the past nine years. He had been on the faculty of Kilgore Junior college before joining the faculty at the University of Texas.

Ivie was educated at Cisco Junior College, Kilgore Junior College, Odessa College, Stephen F. Austin College, Midwestern University, Texas A&M University and the University of Texas.

A member of St. Mary's Cathedral, he was director of the Third Order of St. Francis and was a member of the Holy Name Society. He was past president and area governor of the Texas Toastmasters International Club. He also was a member of the Rotary Club of Austin. Ivie served as supervisor of the Petroleum Extension Service Technical Schools held throughout North and South America and the Middle East. He was noted for his work in the petroleum industry in electrified lease operations.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Grace Ivie of Austin; two daughters, Mrs. Michael Dean, Austin, and Mrs. George Budcr, Christiansted St. Croix, Virgin Islands; three sons, Jerry Graham of Jefferson, Dan Graham of San Marcos, and Lt. Walter William Ivie Jr. of Fort Riley, Kansas; his father, the Rev. W. R. Ivie of Cisco; four brothers, Wilbourne Ivie of Midland, Paul Ivie of Winters, Marshall Ivie of San Antonio and Mutt Ivie of Knox City; and five grandchildren.

Clyde Covey Brings In First Bale At O'Brien

O'Brien Co-Operative Gin Co. of O'Brien announces its first bale of cotton for this year, brought in at 4 p. m. Wednesday, September 14 by Clyde Covey. The bale weighed 1855 pounds and ginned 435 lint.

Mr. Covey used 38-5 Northern Star Cotton Seed and grew the bale on the R. T. Carney farm Northwest of O'Brien. His ten acres of dry land cotton was planted May 26th, and he expects to harvest 4 more bales from this plot.

The O'Brien Co-Op Gin begins its 30th ginning season under the new management of S. J. Reeves, Jr., after the retirement of S. N. (Sam) Reed. Records are incomplete as to how many bales have been processed by the gin, but its biggest crop was in 1962 when 25,999 bales passed through.

At the meeting of the Knox County Gun Club Thursday night, the club decided to have an all-club shotgun contest on Sunday, September 25, at 1:30 p. m.

The main event will be a clay pigeon shoot for a hunting vest. Other shotgun events are also scheduled for other prizes.

The public is invited, but the contests will be limited to club members and their families.

The club also decided to sponsor a sight-in day to be held October 9th as a public service.

The range will be open to the public, with qualified members available to help anyone sight in rifles and pattern shotguns.

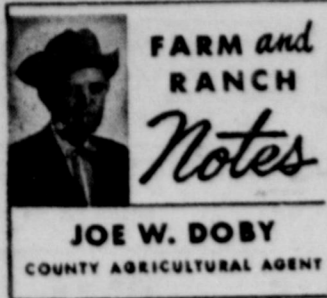

FARM and RANCH Notes

JOE W. DOBY
COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT

Agriculture is looking good in Knox County. Anytime there is plenty of moisture, everything is on the upswing. The cotton crop is carrying a good load. If the boll weevils will feed on the squares and leave the bolls alone, the outlook is promising. Irrigated cotton is experiencing some boll rot and need dry, sunny weather. The regrowth of cotton in the tops will pose a problem.

The late grain sorghum this year on dryland will make the best crop if nothing happens. Guar prospects are excellent. The growth on guar is fantastic and the residue that will be returned to the soil this year will be tremendous.

Wheat prospects are excellent at this time with all the moisture in the subsoil. Dry weather is urgently needed, however, to get the fields worked so the moisture and nutrients can be saved. Volunteer wheat and weeds are making excellent growth.

The demand for stocker cattle is very strong and likely will continue with the prospect for good wheat pasture. There is a growing interest in swine production in Knox County as the price stays good.

A field day of particular interest to farmers and ranchers of Knox County is scheduled for Friday, September 30 at Teaxs A&M University's Texas Experimental Ranch.

The field day begins at 9 a.m. with guided tours of the ranch. Points of special interest on the tour will be deferred-rotation grazing systems now being tested and brush control research demonstrations.

After a barbecue lunch-free lunch tickets given to the first 100 non-residents of Baylor and Throckmorton Counties—a report on current research will be given by Dr. W. J. Waldrip, range scientist at the A&M experiment station.

Dr. R. E. Patterson, Dean of the College at A&M, will report on the recently proposed brush control research program for Texas. Ranchers, legislators and research scientists are backing the brush control research plan.

Also on the afternoon program is a report on Agricultural Programs in Congress by Graham Purcell, U. S. Congressman from the 13th district.

The Experimental Ranch is located 100 miles north of Throckmorton and 20 miles south of Seymour on U.S. 183 and 263. The public is invited.

These crashes resulted in six persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$1,240.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1966 shows a total of 38 accidents resulting in four persons killed, 24 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$34,680.00.

September 1 marked the beginning of the 1967 motor vehicle inspection period. As in previous years, the period will end on April 15, 1967. Motorists are urged to have their vehicles inspected in the routine visits to garages and thereby eliminate the necessity of having to wait in line at a later date for an inspection sticker.

Farm And Ranch News

A program of interest to all ranchers will be held in the Court house at Benjamin, Wednesday, September 28, at 2:00 p.m. Mr. L. M. Maddox, Extension Animal Husbandman, will present a set of slides on "Judging Cattle for Functional Efficiency." This is the judging method made famous by Dr. Jan Bonsma, world famous animal scientist from South Africa. The slides were made when Dr. Bonsma was visiting professor at Texas A&M last year.

Dr. Bonsma found that the barren cow, the cow who skipped calving, the cow that produced a calf each year, had definite external characteristics that told her true story. The thing for the rancher to do then is to learn these points. That is the purpose of this presentation.

Everyone interested in cow and calf production is urged to attend. The program will last about an hour.

Steve Baty, Gilliland, son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Baty, took second place with his Sears Foundation gilt at the area Sears Swine Show held last Saturday in Wichita Falls. Steve is ten years old and a member of the Gilliland 4-H Club. This is his first project.

Jacky Miller also of Gilliland, son of Mr. and Mrs. Obb Miller, took ninth place with the County 4-H boar.

Cotton promotion week has just been completed in Knox County. The businessmen have done their part in promoting cotton and now the farmer and ginner have a very important part to play. Cotton's biggest asset in competing with synthetics is its fine inherent quality. To destroy that quality is to destroy the cotton industry.

Important basic guidelines for preserving cotton quality in harvesting and ginning include: (1) Properly timed application of Harvest Aid Chemicals. (2) Keep moisture and trash low in harvesting. (3) Avoid overdrying in ginning. (4) Avoid overmachining in ginning. (5) Emphasize bale value, not grade alone. (6) Keep contaminants out of cotton.

The fiber that matures on the stalk is the strongest and best

quality. Harvesting should not be done when moisture in the seed cotton is over 10 percent.

The major damage in ginning is fiber breakage and the major cause of breaking is ginning at low moisture levels. Cotton should be ginned at 6 1/2 to 8 percent moisture content. Cotton should not be worked mechanically at the gin any more than necessary. Fiber breakage reduces staple length and staple uniformity.

All forms of foreign material should be kept out of cotton. Colored items of clothing, for example carelessly dropped in a trailer of seed cotton can cause extensive losses. Such items are shredded and scattered throughout a bale in ginning. These show up in textile products with costly results. The cloth has to be sold as seconds or contaminated sections cut out.
