KNOX CITY BUSINESS MEN LOOK FOR GOOD YEAR IN 1938

The editor made a survey of the different business men of the town this week and all were able to interview expressed the opinion that the coming year will be much better from a business standpoint than the year just closing has been.

The majority of them stated that the cotton yield was more than double that of one year ago and that the farmers had received or would receive about the same price as they received last year, however, the majority of the farmers have their cotton in the Government warehouses and have drawn and will continue to draw money on it for some time, which indicates that there will be some money coming in during the spring and summer which will no doubt stimulate business.

The local bank has more than one half million dollars on deposit and their loans are small in comparison to the deposits and there is not much demand for loans at the present time however this bank will take care of all legitimate business during the year and will care for the farmers from time to time.

Some merchants complained that business was not as good the past fall as they contemplated but the majority of them are satisfied with the business they received and are looking forward to an increase during the year 1938.

The farmers are all happy over the recent rains and are looking forward for the time to come when they can begin plowing and getting ready for another crop. It is not known at this time how many acres will be planted in cotton as this depends upon the sign up program of the Federal government. All in all Knox City and her citizens are looking forward for the year 1938 to be more successful than the past year has been.
