In announcing for the legislature it is my belief that the candidate should let the people know where he stands so that the voter will not cast his or her ballot blindly. We are living in a period of time when wealth is in the hands of a few, monopolies, mergers, chains and combinations of industries are fastly destroying and making slaves out of the farmer and the working man.

Times have never been as hard in many years as they are now. There is as much wealth in the country as there ever has been but only a chosen few have it. I believe that every farmers child and every laboring mans child has the same right to a chance in life as the child of the man of great wealth, and I firmly believe that the very foundation of our existence depends upon helping the farmer first. I am in favor of a law which will give a farmer as much or more for the cotton than he raises on fifty acres as he now gets for one hundred acres of cotton.

Give the farmer something for what he has to sell and he won't have to borrow money at high rate interest and any second grade pupil has gone enough to know that if the farmer has money the town will prosper, therefore I say, help the farmer first.

Any three men that have the spending of thirty millions of dollars of the public money annually should be elected by the people. I favor a Highway Commission elected by the people, like the Railroad Commission is elected, and any time the people vote bonds to build roads for their children and grand children to be taxed to pay for, the contractor that is employed to do the work should be forced to adopt a wage scale for the men who work for him, commensurate with American standard of living. Any time that high-jacking, blood-sucking contractor hopes to rob his men and make local filling stations and boarding house make his profits he has a business getting our hard earned taxes. I favor a law that will prevent his vicious practice.

I believe that the penitentiary should stay where it is, under efficient management. It would cost too much to move it, and there is a probability that oil will be discovered on the present State owned lands. It has been my experience as a close observer that if steps are best taken to prevent crime by removing the cause, that there will be fewer law violations. What Texas needs is a few good laws with teeth in them, laws that will work in practice instead of in theory.

It has come to my notice that the horse racing (pari-mutuel) betting bill will be a subject for consideration at the next legislature. I would vote against such a measure. I am in favor of giving the old Confederate soldiers a competent pension, and if the money is available, of giving a pension to all old and indigent persons whether they were ever in a war or not.

West Texas should get her share of the taxes she pays into the State and the burden of taxation should be equalized. Taxes should be held to a minimum and the money we have efficiently handled. I have made my own way in this world and think I know what a dollar is worth and will be as careful of the peoples money as if it were my own. I expect to meet the voters before election time and any consideration at your hands will be appreciated, and if elected your representative, will try to act in such a way that you will not be sorry that you sent me to Austin.

C of C GETS WATER REDUCTION

The Knox City Chamber of Commerce met in regular session at the Club Cafe, Tuesday evening at 7:30 p. m. with 17 members present.

The C. of C. Civic Improvement Committee is working in conjunction with a like committee from the Study Club, offering rewards and prizes for the best kept yards during the coming summer. More detailed information will appear from time to time in the Knox County Herald. To promote more interest in the beautification of the yards and gardens the City Council has agreed to reduce the Over Plus water rate from 20 to 10 cents per 1000 gallons during the months of June, July, August and September.

Mrs. H. B. Sweeney in a talk gave a very enlightening review of the State Highway laws, explaining the necessity of a strict observance of such, as well as outlining the system of the newly appointed Highway Patrol.

The President On The Job

CONTINUED FROM LAST WEEK

Mr. Hoover, we are told is sensitive to criticism. I would put it differently. Dealing all his life in facts, he cannot tolerate lies. Remember that he is a Quaker, and the members of the Society of Friends have as one of their guiding rules of life the admonition of St. James. "Let your yea be yea and your nay, nay." Mr. Hoover is sensitive to misrepresentations. It makes him writhe to be lied about. But honest, friendly, constructive criticism he welcomes, when it comes from sources he believes to be sincere. My estimate of him in that respect is confirmed by men who are closest to him.

He swings back in his swivel chair, thrusts one hand into his trousers pocket and answers his visitor's questions without the slightest hesitation and with a degree of detail that is surprising. One gets the impression of a mind which functions like a well-oiled machine, silently, swiftly and with perfect accuracy. He has the facts there in his head, about details of Government and administration which most presidents would have had to refer to an assistant secretary of some department.

We talk about facts and their importance. The President has appointed a dozen or more commissions of experts for the purpose of finding out the facts about various governmental problems. There will be more such commissions. The facts which they gather and collate will save the President and especially save Congress a great deal of time and serve as a guide for intelligent legislation. There is such a mass of public business continually passing through the Congressional mill, so many details of administration being put up to the President, that the regular standing machinery of the Government has not the time for direct and thorough investigation of every legislative and administrative proposal.

Mr. Hoover has gathered some interesting facts about the growth of the President's job. When the Federal Government moved to Washington in John Adam's administration,

CONCHO GENERATING STATION BEING ENLARGED

With more than 100 men working full time, construction on the Concho Generating Station enlargement in San Angelo, Texas, which will more than double the output capacity of the plant, will be completed by April 10th, according to engineer reports of the West Texas Utilities Company.

The project which will, when completed, add 15,000 Kilowatts to the present 10,000 Kw facilities, entails the enlargement of the building and accompanying substation. The boiler room has been extended 25 feet by 115 feet and the switch room 40 by 50 feet. Included with the addition of the 15,000 unit are raw water filters, a water distilling tank, two boilers of 1,000 horsepower each, a steam turbine, and condenser all of which have been completed. The men, at present, are working on the various pipe connections in the building and are completing the piping system in the new mammoth spray-er pond.

The Russell Boyd Service Station is completing a Ladies Rest Room at the station this week.

In addition to this Mr. Boyd is making an inside wash rack and installing a high pressure grease gun. Read his advertisement in this issue of the Herald.

THE PRESIDENT ON THE JOB

Congress and all its attaches numbered 250 persons and the President to execute all of the laws then on the books, had a staff of 125. Today there are 3,000 persons on Capitol Hill, but the Executive departments, not counting the Army and Navy, employ 650,000 persons to administer the laws which Congress has instructed the President to enforce. Twenty times as many people in proportion to population are needed today to enforce the laws now on the statute books, as in Jefferson's day. Some of that is due, of course, to the growth of the nation. President Jefferson's administration granted only a dozen or so patents a year. But a lot of the burden upon the President and upon taxpayers is due to the huge list of laws which have only sentimental reasons for having been enacted.

One of the serious faults in our governmental system is the habit of legislation by emotion.

To illustrate: somebody had the emotional idea that it would be nice for the Government to provide free medical attendance and hospitalization for every veteran of any war, so long as he might live and regardless of the cause of his illness or disability. We are already taking care of every veteran whose disability can be in any degree traced to his military service. But this new project would make it incumbent upon Uncle Sam to take care of everyone in case of senile dementia, hardening of the arteries, pneumonia, small pox, ingrowing toenails or any other ailment which might attack any man who had ever worn a uniform, no matter if he had been in perfect health for fifty years after his military service.

President Hoover quite appointed a commission of physicians and actuaries. They started with the known facts of the present number of veterans, their probable average longevity and the probable incidence of disease of disability among them, and the present cost of hospitalization per patient per day. When they got all of those facts tabulated and projected it figured out that the scheme, over which it was extremely easy to sentimentalize, would cost the taxpayers of the United States somewhat more than Six Billion dollars at the lowest possible computation. And that was that, so far as that particular piece of legislation was concerned.

Mr. Hoover believes that only by finding out all the facts and shaping the Government's course by them can Governmental expenses be reduced and the burden on the taxpayers relieved. At the same rate of progression at which Federal expenses and personnel have grown in the past 100 years, at the end of another century everybody in the United States would be on the Government payroll.




