This refers to the three most troublesome early-season insects—overwintering boll weevils, thrips and flea hoppers. The meeting will take place at 8 p. m., June 26, at the City Cafe in Knox City.

Stamford's Chuck Brownfield Wins Top Honors Over The Weekend In Knox City Invitation Golf Tournament

Chuck Brownfield, 17-year-old youth from Stamford, won the crown in the championship flight of the Knox City Invitation golf tournament Sunday.

The recent high school graduate turned in rounds of 35, 35 and 34, six strokes better than defending champion Moss of Pecos. Mike Ratliff of Vernon had begun the round on the 20th hole tied with Brownfield at even par 70. Moss was one stroke back, but birdied the 341-yard par four 19th hole to catch Brownfield. Ratliff scooped his tee shot on 19 and finished with a bogey five.

Brownfield sent home a 45-foot birdie putt on the par three after both Moss and Ratliff knocked their tee shots out of bounds. Moss finished with a six; Ratliff a five. Brownfield picked up a three-stroke lead in two holes. It was clear sailing the rest of the way as he carded a one-under 34 for his final round.

Jeff Graham of Knox City was over in a sudden-death playoff with Don Mitchell of Stamford for the consolation championship. Graham had tied Mitchell at 75 for 18 holes when he sank a 35-foot putt on the final hole. (Only the championship flight played 27 holes.) Mitchell came up with 3 holes to win.

Other first flight championship honors went to Rob Ferrell of Vernon, who carded a two-over 72. John Dickey, Weatherford was four strokes back at 76. C. E. Williams of Knox City won the flight consolation with a 74.

Dan Dean of Merkel barely nudged Jack Golden of Seymour with a 74 for the second flight championship.

The annual tourney opened Friday at the Knox City Country Club and Harold Preston of Lorraine shot a three-under par 67 to take medalist honors in the pro-am.

The top team in the pro-am preliminaries was led by Jeff Graham with Max Johnston of Haskell, Ed Barnett of Wichita

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

Streams In Desert Places

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Home Demo. News

Home storage situation can be improved by following a few simple rules.

Rule one is to place items where they are used most. For example, in cooking, mending, or stamp collecting, it makes sense to put the needed materials in the most convenient location.

The second rule is to store articles together which are used at the same time. For example, writing supplies should all be in one

place—not a typewriter in one room, paper in another, and pencils hidden away in yet another place. In a relatively large work area such as the kitchen, which has several separate activity centers, some supplies such as salt and measuring spoons might be duplicated to save steps.

Take a look at your storage patterns. When you unpack your groceries, do put all the canned and packaged goods together in one cupboard, or do you consider where they will be used first? In preparing rice, macaroni and oatmeal, boiling water is needed. Do you store these things near your range or are they some distance away?

There are exceptions to this guide, however. For example, utensils such as pressure cookers or canning equipment may be used first at the sink. Since they are not frequently used, though, they can be stored in a more out-of-the-way location. Arranging items so that they are easy to reach and put back. Store items at a convenient height, one row deep and unstacked, if possible. Packaged goods should be arranged so that labels are clearly visible. Heavy items may be lifted more easily if they are stored at, or slightly below, elbow height.

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

There will likely be a few in the county to yield more. The April hail storm apparently cut yields by a large percent, although the plants appeared to recover better than expected.

Knox County Vegetable Production Variety Demonstration Plots are to be harvested and graded Wednesday and Thursday June 21-22. The 1967 demonstration was grown on the Herb Partridge farm, Route 1, Munday.

Dr. Jack Kyle of the South Plains Research and Extension Center will bring digging equipment and likely one or two other personnel from Lubbock. Dr. Larsen, Homer Blackhurst and Bruce Perry will also get to Knox County in time to work with the harvesting and grading of the experimental potatoes.

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


