Lankford told the association that he had talked with Branham and that he offered to sell the near 12-acre tract for \$6,000. After much deliberation, the association settled on the sum of \$5,000 making available to Branham a \$1,000 forfeit with a 90-day option.

Bill Baker stressed the need for a constitution and by-laws to govern the association and Lankford appointed Leon Burkham and Joe Boone to work with Baker on the matter. John Crowover, Clifford Cornett, and Mrs. Buddy Angle were named on a nominating committee to submit names for a slate of seven directors from which officers would be appointed.

Memberships were set at \$300 each to be paid in full or in monthly dues after a nominal down-payment.

Cliff Swain and Bud Carver were appointed to inform bank

officials of the proposed purchase and plans of the association and also to discuss with them the probability of making short term loans to individuals seeking membership in the association.

The group submitted three names for the association which were put to vote and the name chosen was "Brazos Valley Recreation Association." One spokesman pointed out that membership in the association will not be limited to local citizens or even to residents of Knox County, but that people of the area are invited to purchase memberships and become a part of the association.

The next meeting of the Brazos Valley Recreation Association has been set for Monday night at 8:00 o'clock in the dining room of the City Cafe, Residents of Munday, O'Brien, Rochester, and Benjamin are urged to attend.

Separate divisions were held for boys and girls, and competition was according to University Interscholastic League ages as of September 1, 1968.

Over 750 boys and girls participated in the events, which included relays, dashed, pull-ups, and broad jumps, and 640 ribbons were awarded to the winners in the first four places.

Composite totals showed Knox City with 1434 (KC boys 809, KC girls 625); Munday 555 (Munday boys 197, Munday girls 358); O'Brien 461 (O'Brien boys 204, O'Brien girls 257); and Rochester 236 (Boys total only, as Rochester girls did not enter).

The first of its kind, an elementary track meet for both girls and boys in the first through the sixth grades was held at Greyhound Stadium here on Wednesday afternoon of last week.

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Residents To Vote May 29 On Miller Creek Project Issue

The Board of Directors of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority have officially set Thursday, May 29 as election day for residents of Knox City, Haskell, Goree and Munday to vote on the proposed Miller Creek project. One proposition will be for negotiating a water contract with the NCTWA for the purchase of water that meets the requirements of the State Health Department. The other is a tax and water revenue bond for a

reserve fund which would be for approximately a period of two years. Other towns in the authority have already paid into the reserve fund. It was explained that after the sale of water starts and revenue begins, no further tax would be necessary.

The \$1,500,000,00 HUD grant was extended twice previously and will expire June 1, 1969. The grant was approved to assist NCTWA in constructing a complete water system. However, it will not be renewed and if voters miss this opportunity, the allocation will revert to some other source. Officials say it will be "now or never" and that it is imperative that we go along with this project. Quality of our water as well as an adequate quantity for future years are of prime concern for the survival of our area.

The Herald will be bringing additional information each

week concerning this issue. It is very important that residents educate themselves in regard to the facts about our present water condition.

In a called meeting of the City Council here Monday night, officials reported that the minimum on city water would remain the same if local voters approve the purchase of water from the authority. Also, it was pointed out that the water would be state approved and filtered. Plumbing repairs would be much less over a period of years due to the lack of corrosion, and some residents would not have the sand and gravel in their water supply as is reported at times now.

A qualified voter must be a resident of Knox City who has rendered property for taxation.

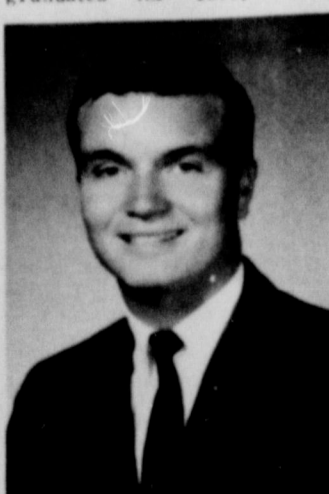

Wreck Near KC Friday Fatal To Tech Student

John Leo Minor of Lubbock, 23 year old Texas Tech student was killed about 4:15 p.m. Friday when a tire blew out on his late model foreign-built car, causing the vehicle to overturn several times. The accident occurred 15 1/2 miles northwest of town on State Highway 143.

Minor was alone and traveling south when his car apparently failed to negotiate a curve. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Mrs. Christine Hardin, justice of the peace from Guthrie, who ruled death due to multiple injuries sustained when he was thrown from the car.

Investigating officers included Highway Patrolmen Don Carmichael and Joe Hataway of Knox City, Sgt. J. W. Garner of Seymour, and Knox City Chief of Police David Woody.

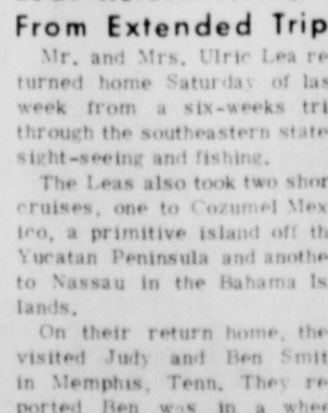
Minor's body was brought to Knox City in a Smith Funeral Home ambulance, and later transferred to Lubbock for funeral services.

WHEREAS, the aforementioned amendment provides that

said Authority shall contain all of the territory contained in the boundaries of the cities of Goree, Knox City, and Munday, in Knox County, and the city of Haskell, in Haskell County; and WHEREAS, in order to accomplish the purposes for which said Authority was created, it will be necessary to issue bonds payable from ad valorem taxes to be levied on all taxable property in the Authority and the revenues of the Authority; and

WHEREAS, an election should be held in the Authority for the purpose of authorizing the issuance of such bonds,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF NORTH CENTRAL TEXAS MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY:

1. That an election shall be held in said North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority on the 29th day of May, 1969, at which election the following PROPOSITION shall be submitted:

"Shall the Board of Directors of North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority be authorized to issue the bonds of said Authority in an amount not to exceed Three Million Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,400,000), maturing serially or otherwise from their date, for the purpose of providing a source of water supply for cities and other users for municipal, domestic, industrial, mining and oil flooding purposes as authorized by the Act creating the Authority, by constructing a dam or dams and all works, plants and other facilities necessary or use-

ful for the purpose of impounding, processing and transporting water to cities and others for municipal, domestic, industrial and mining purposes, and to levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the Authority for the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon, and to pledge all or part of the net revenues of any one or more contracts for the sale of water and such other revenues as may be specified by resolution of the Board of Directors, as provided in the law creating said Authority?"

2. For the purpose of said election, North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority is divided into four election precincts. All of the territory of the Authority contained in the City of Goree shall be known as the "Goree Precinct"; all of the territory contained in the City of Knox City shall be known as the "Knox City Precinct"; all of the territory contained in the City of Munday shall be known as the "Munday Precinct"; and all of the territory contained in the City of Haskell shall be known as the "Haskell Precinct".

3. (a) The election in the Goree Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Goree, Texas. Mrs. G. W. Weber is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge for said election, and she shall appoint an assistant judge and two clerks to assist her in holding said election.

(b) The election in the Knox City Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Knox City, Texas. Mr. Otis Harbert is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two clerks to assist him in holding said election.

(c) The election in the Munday Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Munday, Texas. Mr. E. H. Nelson is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two clerks to assist him in holding said election.

(d) The election in the Haskell Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Haskell, Texas. Mr. O. W. Tooley is hereby appointed as the Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two clerks to assist him in holding said election.

4. That said election shall be held under the laws governing general elections except as otherwise provided in the law creating said Authority. Only legally qualified electors residing within said Authority who own taxable property in said Authority and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote, and each elector shall vote only in the precinct of his residence.

5. That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code, so as to


Of the 647 persons attending, 312 were stockholders, 192 were wives of stockholders and 143 were other guests.



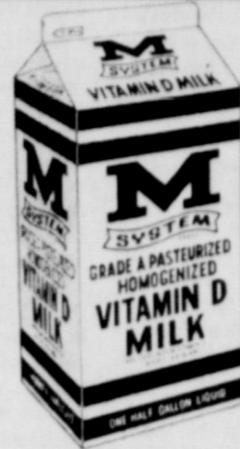

"Melanie Meddles"

A letter a day just might keep the doctor away, for what is more exciting than a letter in your mailbox? Unfortunately, in order to receive them we must also write the same amount. Have you ever wondered what people think of your letters as they read them?

Letters become the pleasure or the pain of the receiver. Some of the most boring moments of my life have arrived through the mail. Deliver me from the "How are you, we are fine" down through "The weather has been hot" down through "I'm nearly out of room, better close" type of letter. This is obviously a duty letter. Who is responsible for this dreary letter form? I think we can place the blame with high school English classes that teach, very properly, How to Write a Friendly Letter.

This is the kind of letter that makes you say, "Yes, I heard from her, but she didn't say anything." Many of these letters come from relatives or

friends who feel that they need to write a letter; if they feel that way about it, they shouldn't. Correspondence is similar to sewing, either be in the mood or don't bother.

I am turned off by people who sign off with childish initials, signifying something that always eludes me, S.W.A.K., even R.S.V.P. (Sorry, Amy). I am tempted to answer with my own mysterious code of letters picked at random, guaranteed to drive them crazy.

Nearly as bad are the people who write one tantalizing sentence "The cast is off Joanne's arm now" or "Ed is enjoying his shorter hours and the raise, but finds the new work a headache." An accident! A new job? What kind? You'll never know by the time you write to ask, they will have gone on to other things.

A cousin and I always began our letters by apologizing about the length of time since we had last written. We finally realized that two months must be our normal corresponding period,

quit talking about it and just wrote.

Personally, I can never say what I mean if I have to write a letter - my mind seems to be six miles ahead of the pen and when I try to keep up the scratching is unreadable. Give me a typewriter, erase the English rules, and I go mad, completely uninhibited.

It may be hard to read the things, single-spaced (to get more mileage from the stationery), no paragraphs - you don't talk in paragraphs, do you? - all mistakes and second thoughts left intact, subjects interrupted when another thought breaks the pattern. They may be a little tough for eyes, nerves and thought digestion, but so far, not many complaints.

My sister writes a funny, always interesting letter. Her formula is to jot down everything she wants to write about first, then she makes a first draft, makes corrections and copies it perfectly to mail. She and I do both use one writing method that works. We write everyone we owe within a few days time, then we tell them approximately the same things and later we can remember what we have already written. Each letter is still written naturally because you don't talk the same way to any two people and of course, your mother, a school friend, or a former neighbor wouldn't all be interested in the same news. You will be surprised how easy the letters are if you use this method, and by the time you've written the last one, your wording will be so polished and clever, it will be nearly as hard to mail that letter as it would be to put one of your children in the mailbox.

One friend writes an absolute book each time and I can hardly wait for them. If she puts up 14 day pickles, she tells about the garden plot, what kind of jars she saved for canning, about a neighbor who threw hers out after a week of fermenting because she thought they were

ruined, how her husband likes them and the ribbon she hopes to win at the State Fair.

A letter once arrived miraculously, considering the way it was addressed, at my parents' home. My brother, having acquired the high degree of wit and individuality of a college junior, sent his letter to "The red house beside the white house on Wildhorse Creek" and inside was a long letter which began "In case you get this..." I really think we fail to appreciate our postmen enough.

I have another cousin whose letters are worthy of framing. She begins "By some miracle I have 12 1/2 min. in which to write" making me feel so good to have been squeezed in and then gabs for four more typewritten pages. She says of her own letters "If there is anything I like, respect and admire it is someone who will not use paragraphs. Deciphering my letters is another matter, but anyone who cannot do so has no business getting in a position to hear from me. I am ADDICTED to parentheses, expecting the recipient (shrug) to read much between the lines from these asides."

Of all the interesting letters I get, no two are alike. As long as a letter reflects your familiarity, yet changing personality, I will be looking forward to it.

Please, please don't be formal with me. Tell me about your kids, your latest stabs at writing, recommend a good book (without the ending), tell me which movies not to waste time on, draw a picture of your new dress, include some gossip, tell me why you are so interested in your latest community project - I am very interested in the Why of you. Sometimes it is embarrassing to speak of your feelings, writing is the mental way of letting your hair down.

Don't wait to write until you have the time; when the mood hits, grab a piece of paper. Write a hospital patient on toilet tissue (reusable), that laugh might help him get well faster. Once I received a 16 foot long letter typed on adding machine paper!

Keep several colors of stationery handy for different moods, you can write a thoughtful letter, a dashed-off one, a zany one, at different times all to the same person. Your friendship will continue to grow, though you are miles and days apart, when your letters reflect your many-sided, yet familiar personality.

Now sit down and write someone a letter.

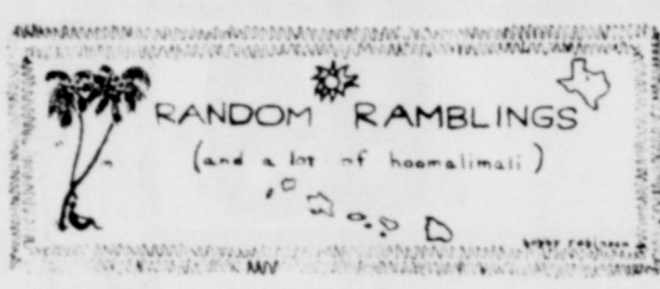
