The first of these is proper dressing, with empha sis on getting a good bleed. Care in dressing the fryer will go flavor, and will help keep the frozen fowl fresh. A quick chill also important in this proces as bacterial changes can take lace rapidly in the moist, war: body cavity. Cut the chicken in deces ready for frying before freezing.

Proper packaging is the next mportant step in freezing you fryers. Of course, cellophane bags scaled with a hot iron are best but cellophane paper may be use as second best. In case neithe of these is available, a heav waxed carton may be used. The chickens, cut and chilled, may al so be packed tightly in tin can and sealed. Glass jars are not recommended, as they are easily broken and hard to pack into the storage locker.

The packages should then be stored at zero temperature, and the temperature should not be al lowed to fluctuate more than degrees. Some locker plants are allowed to run at higher temper atures, even up to 10 or 15 de grees, and this practice cuts down the length of time the food will keep without getting rancid peratures, food may keep from months to a year, but the tem perature in the locker should b arefully checked at intervals.

If conditions are not such tha you can be assured of airtigh packaging and zero degree tem perature, some people prefer to lace the chicken in a leak-proo ontainer and cover with a brinsolution made with 1 teaspo Since the chickens are thor oughly cleaned, and already cut before freezing, the only prepar ation necessary when you get ready to cook them is to let

Undulant fever is usually ecquired by human beings as : result of consuming raw milk of raw milk products from cows in fected with Bang's disease,

Raw milk or milk products can consumed with safety only when they are known to be pro duced by cows tested and found to be free of Bang's disease. Pasteurization, of course, will kil the germs if present.

To lower the incidence of un dulant fever all dairymen are isked to cooperate with the State Department of Health by removing cattle infected with Bang's disease from their herds as soon as the disease is discov ered. Even if the milk is made safe for human consumption by pasteurization, infected cows are still a menace to health since they can transmit the disease to healthy animals and to their owner and other persons who handle them

"Undulant fever," Dr. Cox said "is one health menace we can eradicate in our State through absolutely safe milk supplie from dairy herds free of Bang'

"Unless a herd is known to be ree from this infection, only asteurized milk should be used o that the disease cannot be assed on to the consumer of nilk and dairy products."


Extension Service

Receives U. S. Funds WASHINGTON, D. C .- Financing of the U. S. Extension service program for 1945 on practically the same basis as in 1944 was assured here when the 78th congress in one of its last acts appropriated \$28,000,000

for this purpose. The amount was contained in the Deficiency Appropriation bill which provides that not less than 7 million and not more than 11 million dollars of the new funds are to be specifically earmarked for the use

of the Extension service. The bureau of the budget had originally submitted a preliminary estimate calling for continuation of the unspent funds left over from the calendar year of 1944, amounting to about 8 million dollars, to be available only until the end of the fiscal year June 30, 1945. Proponents of the program, however, declared this proposal unsatisfactory, asserting it would not provide adequate assurance to farmers that facilities would be available to obtain neces sary farm labor through the year.

THE ideal poultry house will provide plenty of ventilation, without drafts, direct sunlight, and be free from excess moisture and extreme temperatures.

The ideal house will also allow for expansion, unless small units are desirable. A 20 x 20 foot house will prove sufficient for from 100 to 150

The laying house should include proper roosts built over concrete or matched dropping boards; nests protected against the light, easy to clean; covered dry-mash hoppers, easy to fill and clean; curtains for open fronts, or movable windows running water, with sanitary drinking fountains.

In most localities, a poultry house, unless also used as a brooder house, may have one-fourth of its area in front, open, but protected by curtain

A south or southeastern slope provides the best location for a poultry house. In building a long house, solid partitions should be erected every 20 to 30 feet, to prevent drafts


