

more than sixty percent higher than the seven year median, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a statement concerning the use of gamma globulin for protecting very young or frail children from an attack of this perennial childhood disease and its often serious complications.

"If you have a child less than five years old who has been exposed to measles, your family doctor may recommend giving him gamma globulin, Dr. Cox advised. "Through city county or state health departments, doctors can obtain gamma globulin free to be used as they think advisable. fants and children, whose health makes it inadvisable for them to suffer an attack of measles, may postpone the disease if gamma globulin is administered within eight days from the time of exposure."

The State Health Officer emphasized the fact that gamma globulin cannot give a child permanent protection against measles and added that the protection is ordinarily of about hree weeks duration. However, there is no limit to the num ber of times it can be used and a baby who is protected by it now can be protected by it again in June of July. Gamma globulin can go on shielding him against measles until he is old enough and strong enough to stand an attack without serious consequences



LEGAL NOTICE

Penal Code-

Art. 695. Whoever shall leave the carcass of any animal which died in the actual possession of such person, on any public road or highway or within 550 yards of such public road shall be fined not -less than five nor more than one hundred dollars

Art. 696. No person shall use or maintain any dumping ground or dump trash, refuse, debris or permit the same to remain nearer than three hundred yards of any public high-way of the State of Texas.

Any violation of this act shall subject the offender to a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than two hundred dol-
