State Primary Saturday Finds Most Candidates In County Unopposed

Knox County citizens will go to the polls Saturday to participate in another State Primary that, although not evidencing the usual amount of interest, should bring out our full voting strength.

It is the duty of every citizen so qualified to exercise the voting franchise whether in time of war or peace. While fewer of the offices are contested this year there are still many important places on the ticket that need to be decided.

Possibly most interest is centered on the congressional race with the incumbent, Ed Gossett, making a bid for reelection against George Moffett, presently serving as state senator for this district. Both men are well known and liked over the district and it remains for the ballot count to decide the victor.

Locally, the race for Commissioner of this precinct offers a three-way struggle between Ray Willis, seeking reelection, and E. L. Park and Wm. Griffith. In the race for county offices, the bid for County Treasurer will be decided between Bob Burton, the incumbent, Walter Snody and N. S. Kilgore.

Charlie Blount's withdrawal from the District Attorney's race simmers the choice down to one man. Thos. F. Glover, Sheriff L. C. Floyd goes in unopposed as does Earl Sams, Tax Assessor-Collector. Judge Claude Callaway of Crowell does not have an opponent for the State Representative office of the 114th District.

Right or wrong, win or lose, go out Saturday and vote for your man anyway. It takes public expressions in the form of votes to keep a democracy like ours alive.

Charlie Blount Quits Attorney Race For Government Position

Announcement was made Tuesday by Charlie Blount, candidate for reelection to the office of District Attorney, that he had resigned the office he now holds and had withdrawn from the race for reelection to accept a position with the Federal government at Lubbock.

Mr. Blount's withdrawal automatically nominates Thos. H. Glover as the Democratic nominee to this office since he was the only candidate on the ticket with Mr. Blount. Herbert Sams had announced for the office but had withdrawn some time ago.

Mr. Glover was a caller at the Herald office Wednesday and stated that although he felt certain the nomination was his, it was his hope that voters would complete the ballot by striking out Mr. Blount's name and thereby assuring him of a majority.

Mr. Blount's resignation and withdrawal, Mr. Blount stated that he had accepted a position as Enforcement Attorney for the Federal government and would probably be stationed in the Lubbock district.

"The decision was not an easy one to make and before doing so I talked with many of my friends over the district before deciding to do this," Mr. Blount said. "I want every resident of this district to know that I appreciate their past favors and consideration and the assurances they gave me for reelection this time, but I believe they will be happy that I had this chance for advancement," he concluded.

City Will Sponsor Waste Paper Drive

Mayor C. C. Hoge announced early this week that a citywide salvage campaign for waste paper, rags and discarded clothing would be put in progress here starting at once. He stated that an urgent appeal had been received from the state salvage headquarters for the needed material in order to keep the war effort going.

Residents are urged to bring their salvage to the City Warehouse in the rear of the City Hall where it will be loaded on trucks and hauled to the nearest salvage depot. If as much as 1000 pounds is collected in any locality, a truck will be furnished by the City to haul it to the warehouse.

Ernest Goodson Dies Of Heart Attack; Services Held Here

Stricken suddenly of a heart attack as he was driving from work to his home in Haskell Saturday evening, Ernest Goodson, 54, died enroute to a hospital there. Mr. Goodson had operated a farm southeast of Knox City, in Haskell County, for several years. He was the father of Mrs. E. H. Tankersley, Jr. of Knox City.

Funeral services were held Sunday at 5:00 o'clock at the First Baptist Church with Rev. Shade Stephenson of Goree and Rev. J. S. Tierce of Rochester, officiating. Burial was in the Knox City cemetery.

Mr. Goodson was born in Mississippi, December 28, 1890. He came to Texas at the age of seven. In 1917 he was married to Miss Floy Isham in Comanche County and moved to Haskell County in 1926 where he had resided up to the time of his death.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Floy Goodson, and one daughter, Mrs. E. H. Tankersley, Jr., of Knox City; his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. N. D. Goodson; four brothers, Orin, Otis, Floyd and Clarence Goodson; three sisters, Mrs. John Collins, Mrs. Aubrey Collins, and Mrs. Jessie Coates of Knox City. Several nieces and nephews also survive.

Ed Gossett Answers Charges of Opponent In Speech Here Tues.

Next Rodeo Show Will Be Friday, Sept. 1st

At a meeting of the directors of the Knox City Rodeo Association held Tuesday night, it was decided to present another rodeo performance here on Friday, Sept. 1. Plans were made for two shows to be presented on that day, one in the afternoon and one at night.

Arrangements are being made to install lighting equipment on the grounds with a view of having night performances to care for the crowds that cannot be accommodated at the afternoon show.

Additional features will be added to the program for this performance. Steer riding and cow milking, and a specialty act of some kind will be presented. Definite plans will be worked out at a meeting to be held Tuesday, August 1.

B. B. Campbell Says Plans Ordered For Three Post-War Dams

B. B. Campbell returned Tuesday night from attending a directors meeting of Brazos River Reclamation and Conservation District held in Mineral Wells at the Baker Hotel, July 17.

Since this was a regular quarterly meeting of the board of directors, reports from all committees were heard and much new business was put up for discussion that is of interest to this section of the state.

"Among the items up for discussion was an attempt to get the State Parks Board to return to the District a portion of the several thousand acres of land donated to the Park Board for park purposes but for conditions that exist the Park Board is unable to comply with the terms set forth in the deed, hence the directors feel it for the best interest of all concerned for the Park Board to return a portion of this land to be used by folks that have a jalopy and a Washington Pole and the District only furnish water and sunshine at no extra cost," Mr. Campbell said.

Another thing that was of great interest to people living in the flood districts of Texas, where the worst flood since 1900 had occurred in May of this year, was an agreement by the directors and S. W. Stewart of the Ambursen Engineering Corporation of New York for plans and specifications for the construction of three flood control dams, one on the Leon river, one on Little river and the Cordova Dam, located on the Brazos. Construction work on these dams will begin as soon as a fund are available.

Mr. Campbell reported that the financial condition of the District is in top condition, having \$550,000.00 in government bonds. The District has purchased \$10,000.00 worth of bonds for Knox County in the past two War Loans.

Early Hegari Grain Making Double Crop

The new variety of Early Hegari which was planted for the first time in Knox County by 68 4-H Club boys is holding prospects for an abundant harvest, according to R. O. Dunkle, County Agent.

Olen and Anson Ray, 4-H Club boys of Benjamin who have five and one-half acres of Early Hegari which was planted on April 17, is already mature and the estimated yield is 2,000 pounds per acre.

A few farmers around Benjamin and Brock are purchasing this seed of the Ray boys to make late plantings on wheat and oat stubble land. This Early Hegari will make two crops of mature seed in the same year. Many farmers who are planting summer grain crops to provide late forage think that seeding may be done as late as August 1.

Congressman Ed Gossett spoke to a large crowd of Knox County folks in Knox City Tuesday night. Answering last week's charges made by his opponent, Mr. Gossett stated:

"During his 14 years' service in the Texas legislature, the distinguished state senator has naturally made many mistakes, but I shall not attack his record. After all, men are to be judged by their batting average. It will never be my practice to spring surprises upon the people during the closing days of any campaign. The senator is not attacking me for any vote or act during the last four years. Instead, he is about to flood the district with a malicious and misleading circular attacking me for two votes cast during my first months in the congress.

"His efforts in this regard are inconsistent with his reputation for integrity. The senator does not attack me on recent or domestic issues, as he might well do, for I have made some mistakes. Instead he drags out an old rerring called the fortification of Guam when he knows congress never voted against the fortification of Guam, but rather to strike a \$5,000,000 item for harbor dredging when he knows congress made no mistake in this matter and when he knows the action of congress in this particular probably saved many American lives.

War-Anxious People

"Nevertheless, he wants a war-anxious, war-weary people to believe that in some way their congressman has not done everything humanly possible in the war effort. These votes were aired out through two past elections and are fully understood. The people, I am sure, will deplore and resent a last minute effort to prey upon war emotions. Anxious hearts now wait in terrible anxiety. Any effort to play upon the heartstrings of the people in a time like this for political gain is reprehensible.

"As your congressman, I have helped to pass hundreds of vital measures in support of the war effort. The chief concern of every honest heart at this time is to get the war successfully over as quickly as possible, with a minimum loss of American lives, and then to do everything humanly possible to see that it doesn't happen again.

"At this time your congressman is a recognized leader in efforts to remove the greatest stump in the path of effective U. S. participation in world peace efforts, i. e., to change the constitutional requirement of a two-thirds vote of the senate to ratify treaties. All agree this provision defeated American adherence to the League of Nations and has hampered our effective participation in world affairs.

Recognized Leader

"On the domestic front your congressman is a recognized leader in fighting for political and economic equality for the people of Texas and the South. I have fought and will continue to fight against yankee politicians who seek to break down all forms of racial segregation. I have voted to apply anti-racketeering laws to labor unions, to suspend the 40 hour week and outlaw strikes in time of war. I was the author of an amendment to deny federal salaries to communists and have voted to kick communists from the federal payroll. I have worked and voted to have increased labor costs figured into farm parity. Because of these votes and my fight for the unorganized folks of the country, I have been blacklisted by the CIO and other radical organizations. My opponent has the blessing of the organizations and has remained absolutely silent about their activities. I want the people of the 13th district to know these facts.

Only Issue

"During these critical days personal ambitions are wholly immaterial and unimportant. The only issue in this campaign is who can best serve at this time in this particular job. The state senator did not resign to run for congress. He still has two years to do on his four-year term as state senator. With 14 years' experience in the state legislature at Austin he certainly knows the ropes there. He can serve the people better in Austin than any new man who may replace him. On the other hand, I have just got my teeth cut on my job as your servant in Washington and can serve better there than any new man who (Continued on back page)

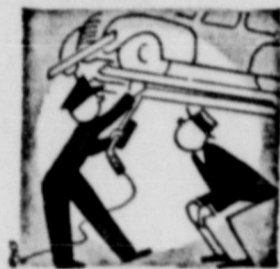

County Has Good Record of 1131 Men In Military Service

According to the latest tabulation of registrants under the National Selective Service Law, Knox County has a total of 1131 registrants, age 18 through 44. J. A. Wilson, clerk of the Knox County Local Board furnishes the following information as to the classification of these registrants:

141 in Class 1-A—Subject to induction.

15 in Class 1-A(L)—Qualified for limited service only by pre-induction examination.

915 in Class 1-C—Inducted or enlisted in military service.

61 in Class 2-A—Industrial deferment in support of war effort.

90 in Class 2-B—Employed in war production.

363 in Class 2-C—Deferred for agricultural employment.

9 in Class 3-C—Now employed in agricultural work, (this classification is discontinued, registrant so classified are subject to reclassification)

6 in Class 3-D—Dependency deferment (Hardship cases).

4 in Class 4-D—Ministers of the gospel.

307 in Class 4-F—Disqualified for military service (all reasons).

In the age group 38 through 44, there are 607 registrants classified in the same manner as the above with (41) added to identify the registrant as having passed his 38th birthday.

There are 944 registrants, age 45 through 64, for a grand total of 3465 registrants under Selective Service in Knox County.

A breakdown of the registrants in military service reveals the following facts and figures:

822 registrants have been inducted into military service under Selective Service Regulations, while 170 registrants have entered military service by enlistment. We find the average age of this group of 922 registrants to be 23 years and 7 months. A total of 98 discharges, for all reasons, have been recorded. The average age of registrants discharged is 25 years, 6 months and 22 days.

By subtracting the men discharged from registrants remaining in active service, we find the average age of our registrants in active military service, at this date, to be 23 years, 5 months and 23 days. This calculation is based upon the age of the registrants on the date of his entry into military service. This is considerably below the average age of all men in military service as announced by the War Department a few weeks ago.

Knox County has official credit for 139 men in military service, who are not required to register under Selective Service. This includes all men who were actively connected with the military forces when Selective Service was instituted and young men who have since enlisted before reaching registering age.

This makes a grand total of 1131 Knox County men, who are, or have been in active military service since May, 1940. This is more than 10 per cent of the total population of the county.
