Parents Asked To Cooperate in School Census

Supt. Chas. E. Silk this week appealed for help in enumerating scholastics in the Knox City school district.

All children who will be six years of age and who have not reached their 18th birthday on Sept. 1, 1958, should be counted in the annual school census this month.

"However, there will be a number of homes in the district which cannot be reached by this method," the superintendent said.

Parents who do not receive a blank but who will have a beginner in school next term were asked to call either Supt. Silk's office or the offices of E. A. Youngblood, high school principal, or Mrs. E. F. Branton, elementary principal.

A definite count is needed, since the district will receive \$82 per student from the state. Besides, Supt. Silk said, it will save further signing of forms and red tape, which is necessary if the child is not listed on the census rolls.

Student Counselor Speaks at Meeting Of Lions Club

S. C. Musser, student guidance counselor for Knox County schools, was guest speaker at the Wednesday noon meeting of the Knox City Lions Club.

The speaker, employed on a cooperative basis to serve all the schools, was introduced by County Superintendent Merick McGaughey.

Musser said there are only 79 student guidance counselors in the state, while every county is entitled, under the Gilmer-Aiken school law, to from one to three. He attributed this to a shortage of counselors as well as to a lack of knowledge, on the part of school trustees.

A guidance counselor, he continued, tests students' abilities and their likes and dislikes, and advises them on choosing a vocation.

Musser gives four tests. A preference test indicates a student's likes and dislikes, but not always what he excels in, and an aptitude test shows what the student knows about certain fields. He also gives the same type test that colleges give, to determine a student's grade level, and an IQ test.

Heavy Rainfall Points Out Need For Farm Terraces

The heavy rains that fell in the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District last year pointed out the need for a system of terraces on many fields and the need for enlarging terraces in many of the existing terrace systems, technicians at the SCS district office in Knox City said this week.

The winter months and early spring are ideal times for constructing new terraces or enlarging old terraces on row crop land. A terrace system properly installed will reduce the length of the slope, intercept the flow of water at frequent intervals and allow it to be removed from the field with a minimum of erosion damage, or in some instances water that would be runoff can be held on the land and absorbed by the soil.

Records from the Spur Experiment Station show considerably greater yield per acre on land terraced and contour farmed in comparison with straight row farming. The yield per acre of lint cotton on terraced and contour farmed land amounted to 188 pounds, and 117 pounds on land with straight rows. These are average yields covering a 26-year period.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation program offers assistance to farmers with construction of new terraces or enlarging old terraces. The cost share is \$105.60 per mile on constructing new terraces and \$66 per mile on enlarging old terraces. If assistance is desired on installation of this practice, farmers should obtain an approval from the ASC office before work is started. Technical assistance for layout of terraces may be obtained from SCS technicians assisting the Wichita-Brazos district.

Church Convention To Stress Evangelism

Rev. Floyd Bailey Sr., pastor of the Knox City Foursquare Church, says the program for his denomination's 35th annual convention to be held January 29 to February 6 at the organization's headquarters in Los Angeles, Calif., is to be built around the theme of "Evangelism—Our Unfinished Task."

According to the local minister, who is also division superintendent of the Foursquare churches in this area, Dr. Rolfe K. McPherson, president of the Foursquare movement and son of its founder, the late Aimee Semple McPherson, will officiate at business and public meetings during the eight-day event. He adds that the convention theme will be emphasized in seminars, clinics, panel discussions and workshops planned for the more than 1,000 delegates expected to attend.

"The Foursquare denomination has more than 700 churches in the United States, and some 721 mission stations around the world," Bailey said.

Legionnaires are expected from the 777 posts in the state. Department Commander Warren G. Moore of Tyler, who will preside over the conference, said this will be the first time the conference has been held away from Austin.

Two candidates for National Commander of the American Legion will address the conference at the Sunday sessions. They are Truman Wold of North Dakota and Howard Kingdom of Ohio.

Other members of the Knox City post are expected to attend part of the conference.

State Methodists To Conduct Religious Census

Great numbers of unidentified and potentially Methodist families are expected to be located Sunday, Jan. 26, when active Methodists in all sections join forces to take one of the most complete surveys ever attempted by the denomination on a state level, according to Quay Farmer, director of the year-long Tell Texas About Christ evangelistic campaign which was launched on New Year's Eve.

Farmer says that the census takers will be seeking information concerning persons with no church preference, Methodists who have no relationship to a church in the city where they reside and persons who are not members of a local Methodist church, but have some relationship to a church because one or more members of the family take part in Sunday school or other church activities.

Preparation for the census has been in progress since December. Texas is divided into 47 Methodist districts and six annual conferences. Each district superintendent and his committee have set the area of responsibility for each church or circuit in each district. They have attempted to clearly define boundaries so that each geographical area of the state will be completely covered by Sunday, Feb. 2, when the census will be closed.

Local church commissions on membership and evangelism have planned and will direct the campaign for their own congregations with assistance from such church organizations as Methodist Men, the woman's society of Christian service and the Methodist youth fellowship. Uniform census cards will be used.

This is also the time for a nation-wide Methodist census.

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for November, 1957, totaled 213 manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers in this area as compared to 194 listings in 1952—an increase of 9.8 percent for the period.

According to the Reference Book all the growth was in Knox City, with a 24.6 percent increase and in Munday with a 16.4 percent increase. Other communities in the county showed a decrease.

The Reference Book lists only manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers. It does not include some of the service and professional businesses such as barber and beauty shops, stock and real estate brokers. Thus the figure for businesses in Knox County would actually be higher than the 231 quoted above.

Mr. Hemphill also added that during the past year 121 changes were made in the Reference Book listings of Knox County businesses, including 42 names added, 32 names deleted, and 47 changes in rating of continuing businesses. The Reference Book contains approximately three million business listings for over 50,000 communities in the United States. It is published every six months to keep listings current. During the past sixty days nearly 63,000 new names were added and nearly 60,000 names were removed. Credit ratings were changed during this period on more than 100,000 business concerns.

Using the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book listings as a guide, it is interesting to review what has happened in six Knox County communities during the past five years:

- Knox City—61 listings in 1952, 76 in 1957, an increase of 24.6%.
- Munday—79 listings in 1952, 92 in 1957, an increase of 16.4%.
- Goree—23 listings in 1952, 22 in 1957, a decrease of 4.3%.
- Abilene—11 listings in 1952, 10 in 1957, a decrease of 9.1%.
- Gilliland—5 listings in 1952, 4 in 1957, a decrease of 20%.
- Truscott—9 listings in 1952, 9 in 1957, a decrease of 33.3%.

Reed Named to State Baptist Committee

DALLAS. — S. N. Reed has been named a member of a special survey committee appointed to work with a Chicago management consultant firm in studying every phase of Texas Baptist work.

The 9-month survey will include the denomination's program of institutions, agencies, state mission programs, departments of work and administration.

The 25-member committee met in Dallas Monday, Jan. 13, to determine the scope of the study. Purpose of the survey, leaders said, is to project a master growth program parallel with Texas' population and industrial expansion. The study will include the need for new churches, schools, hospitals and benevolent homes.

The Baptist General Convention of Texas now has assets of about \$441,697,239. The total includes \$314,882,949 worth of property owned by individual churches and \$126,815,190 in schools, hospitals and homes operated by the convention.

Texas Baptist gave a record \$76,036,548 to their churches in 1957. The denomination includes 3,784 churches and 1,504,211 members. It owns and operates 11 colleges and universities, eight hospitals and four children's homes.

The special survey committee, appointed by BGCT president E. Hermond Westmoreland, Houston pastor, and Executive Board president Carl Bates, Amarillo pastor, will review the firm's final report and recommend action.

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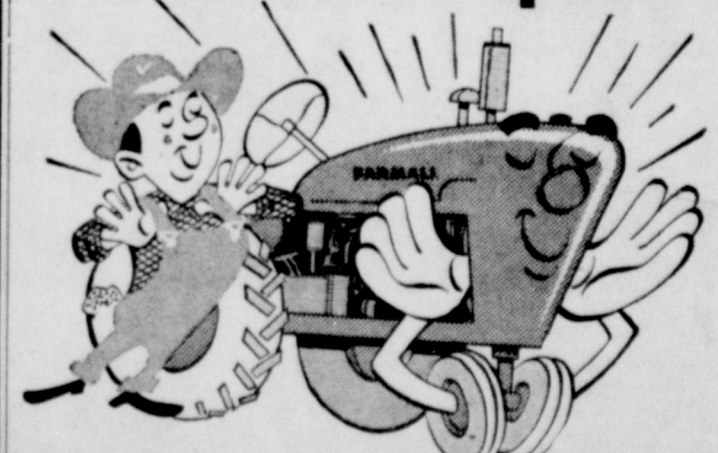
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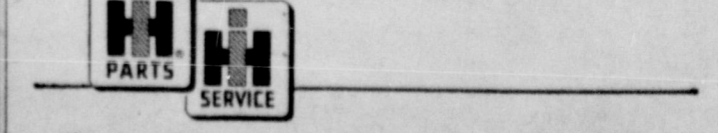

Stockmen Cautioned About Moldy Grain

Many areas of Texas received heavy rains during the season last fall. As a result, there is increased danger of mold in feed grains with possible serious illness or death of livestock, warns C. M. Patterson, Texas Extension Service veterinarian.

While all moldy feed is not necessarily poisonous, Patterson says that farmers will be wise to determine whether they can safely give such feed to their animals. He suggests testing questionable grain for about two weeks by giving it to one or two test animals of low value.

Signs of mold intoxication in cattle include depression, loss of appetite, staggers, and pale mucous membranes, points out the veterinarian. Signs in swine include depression, stiff gait, poor appetite, loss of weight, and a stance with head lowered, back arched, and flanks tucked up.

Animals should be removed from a field where there is moldy feed as soon as symptoms are noticed, advises Patterson. A veterinarian should be called immediately because some symptoms of mold intoxication are similar to those of other diseases.

Anything that can be done to keep livestock away from grain or forage which has been on the ground too long and has not been proved safe to use will pay dividends in animal health, for this
