I think this might be the year for the K. C. round-ballers to come up with some of the blue chips. Our personnel this year has one of those combinations of balance and control that makes them hard to beat. We have four seniors on this year's club, all of which will share the honor as captains of the 1972-73 Houndettes Team. Belya Penman 5'5" guard, two year returning letterman, has the most varsity experience of our starting guards, Yokonda Bradford, 5'6" guard, two year letterman, will probably draw the assignment of guarding the big girl on our opposition this year because of her good rebounding control under the basket, Debbie Burt, 5'6" guard, two year letterman, has quick moves, and will have to contain the faster girls we will be meeting. Jan Guim, 5'6" two year letterman, the only senior forward, our leading scorer from last years squad, plays point and will be responsible for setting up our offense, Denise Grindstaff is a junior, one year letterman, very good outside shooter, capable of breaking game open with her outside touch. She also has best percentage from the free throw line so far this season, and Temi Baker's of-

5'8" first year letterman, strong around the basket. She will also work at guard end for us. Mandy Lankford, 5'3" freshman, will see lots of action at guard this year. It is her first year of the varsity, but she is gaining experience every game. Kary Kent, 5'3" soph. forward, was another member of the Jr. Varsity last year but will help out on our bench strength. 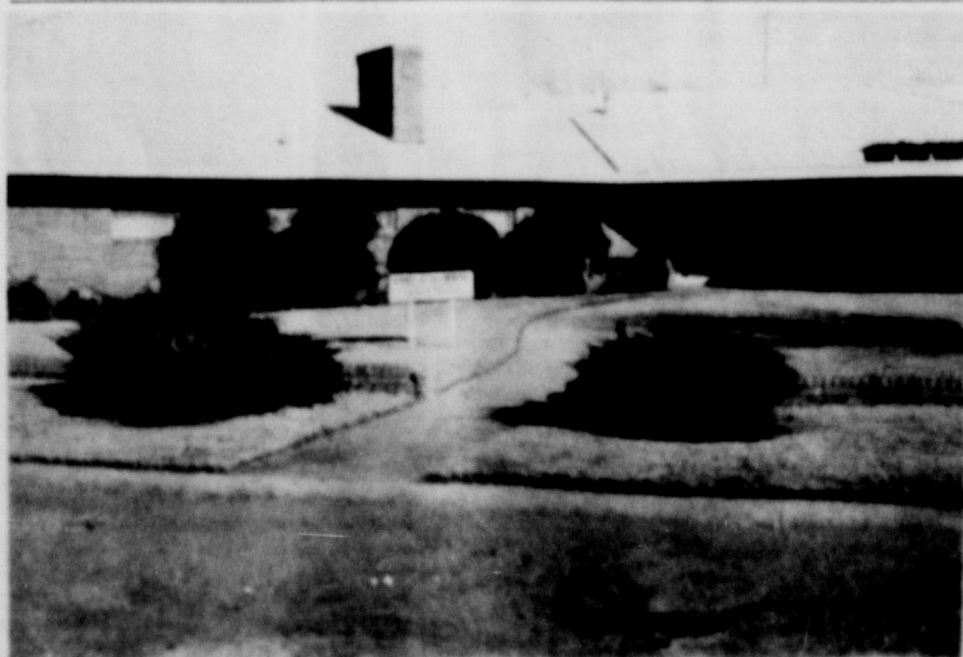

O'Brien Bulldogs Win Spot In Semi-Finals

The O'Brien Bulldogs downed the Ira Bulldogs Thanksgiving night at Knox City by 76-30 to win a bi-district title. Things did not look good for O'Brien as the clock had only ticked off eleven seconds when Ira scored to take the lead 6-0. O'Brien allowed an Ira recovery of the ensuing kickoff an O'Brien's 3 yard line. However, the O'Brien defensive charge resulted in an Ira fumble which Rayland Hayes recovered. At this point the Bulldogs of O'Brien got control of things and began to click. The Bulldogs marched from their own 1 yard line and nine plays later Louis Conn carried in from the 1 yard line. O'Brien recovered the kickoff and took only three plays to score as Darryl Del Hierro followed good blocking in from 10 yards out. Again O'Brien recovered the kickoff and only took three plays to eventually pop Del Hierro 20 yards up the middle with good blocking. On all three occasions Hayes made the PAT good and O'Brien now led 24-6. The O'Brien defense held Ira for four downs and O'Brien scored on the fifth play as Louis Conn carried for 12 yards behind good blocking. Hayes converted to

end first quarter scoring at 32-6.

Ira had far from given up and scored on the second play of the second quarter to make it 32-14. Ira held O'Brien on the next series, blocking the O'Brien punt and taking over on the O'Brien 4 yard line. The score was 32-22 as Ira scored from the 1 on third down.

O'Brien popped back as Louis Conn found outside option for 25 yards and 6 points, Hayes failed to convert and O'Brien led 38-22. Ira pulled up to within eight points of the Bulldogs three plays later. The O'Brien defense, being very ineffective the first half of the second quarter finally rose to the occasion as this would be the last occasion for Ira to score. On the ensuing on side kick by Ira, Arly Watson, a lineman hauled in the ball and scampered 40 yards for a score. Hayes converted for the PAT to give O'Brien the lead at 46-20. Before half time O'Brien scored as Louis Conn rambled behind blocking, for 27 yards. Del Hierro converted and the halftime scoreboard read 54-20 in favor of O'Brien.

On the fourth play of the second half O'Brien scored as Del Hierro hit Conn for a 38

yard T. D. Del Hierro converted to make it 62-20.

On the next possession Del Hierro found blocking from Hayes, Conn, Bert Gutierrez, Mague Rocha and Watson to pop 47 yards up the middle. Del Hierro converted to make the score 70-20 and the game ended as Louis Conn found Mague Rocha open for a 45 yard scoring play.

The O'Brien defense, erratic at times was led by Jaime Rocha followed closely by Rayld Hayes who also had a fumble recovery, Louis Conn who also had an interception and Henry Washington. Others who had a good night defensively were Arly Watson and Danny Del Hierro.

The Bulldogs now face the Mustangs of Marathon who sport a 26 man roster and winning record of 51 out of the last 52 games. The Semi-final game is scheduled at Lakeview Stadium in San Angelo on Friday night Dec. 1 at 7:30. This is a real challenge for the Bulldogs as each individual must be working hard to come up with a better team effort, defensively and offensively than they have shown in any previous game this year. The Bulldogs aim will be to come up with four quarters of aggressive, errorless football.

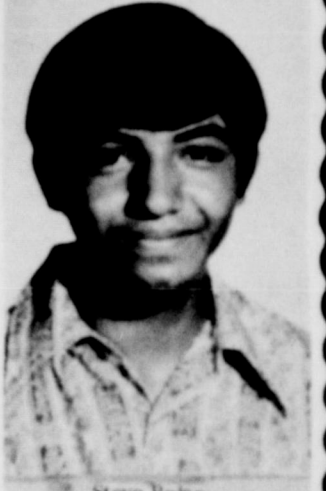

Bad Weather Halts Cotton Harvest

Sample receipts dropped sharply as unfavorable harvesting weather halted harvesting in all of the areas serviced by the Munday Cotton Classing Office, reports Sidney Ferrell, Office-in-Charge. According to the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, harvesting is approximately 21 percent complete.
Quality statistics for the week ending Nov. 24, 1972, show little change from the previous week. Thirteen percent of the cotton was classed as Strict Low Middling (41), 43 percent was Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) and 20 percent was Low Middling Light Spotted (43). Twenty-five percent of the cotton classed was reduced in grade due to bark or grass. The staple length showed 31 percent staple 31 compared to 19 percent the previous week. Fifty-one percent staple 32 was down 9 percentage points from the last week, and 14 percent staple 33 was down 3 percentage points from the previous week.
The micronaire readings continue to be reasonably good with 78 percent reading in the de-

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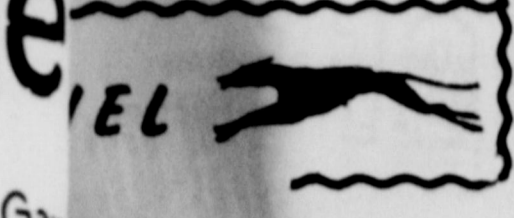
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Cheering Group News

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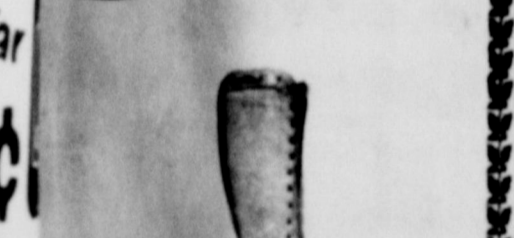

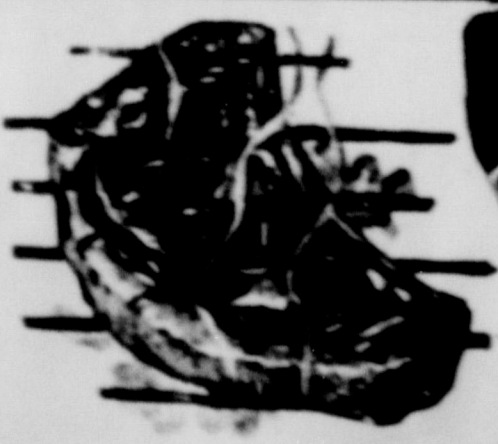
