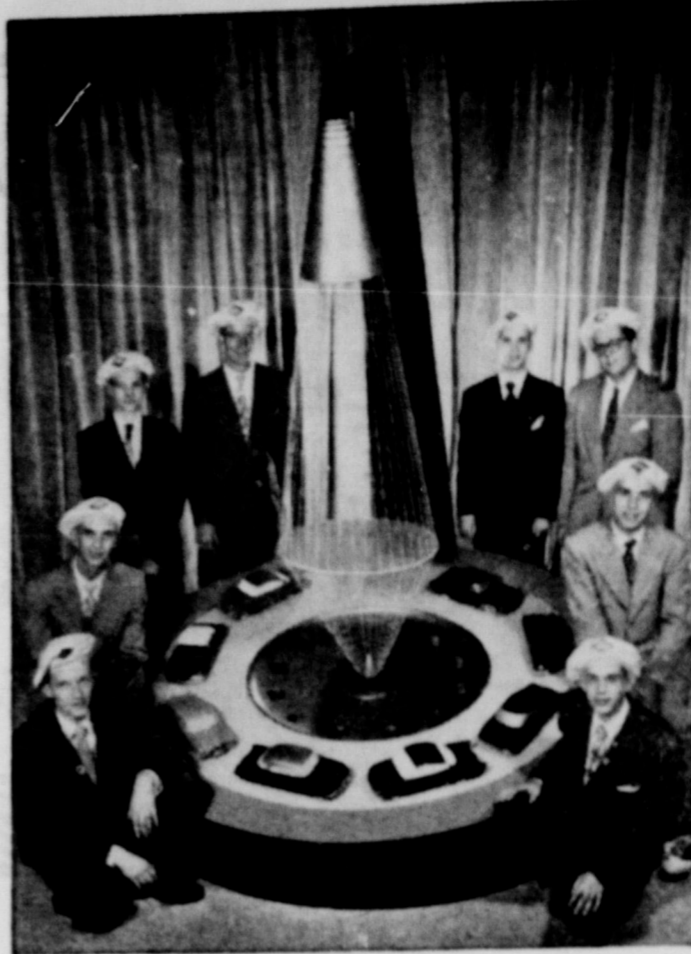

18-YEAR-OLDS MAY REGISTER AT LOCAL POSTOFFICE

AUSTIN, Sept. 29 — Boys who reach the age of 18, required to register with the nearest draft board, can register in Knox City with Jeff T. Graham or Mary A. Thompson.

The nearest draft board is Local Board No. 82, Benjamin, which has jurisdiction over Knox, Baylor and King Counties.

A local board is maintained for the three-county area because one board can take care of it under the present circumstances and thus help keep down the cost of government.

Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said today that "people should appreciate the services these registrars are rendering to the people of the Knox City area. They are doing this job without pay as a patriotic service to the country."

All males are required to register under the draft law on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter.

Maximum penalties that can be applied for failure to register is \$10,000 fine, or five years in prison, or both.

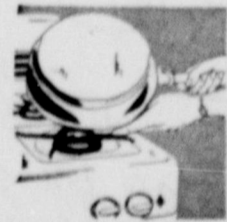

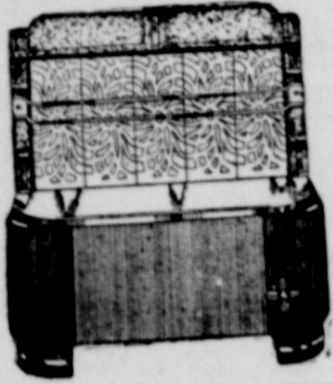

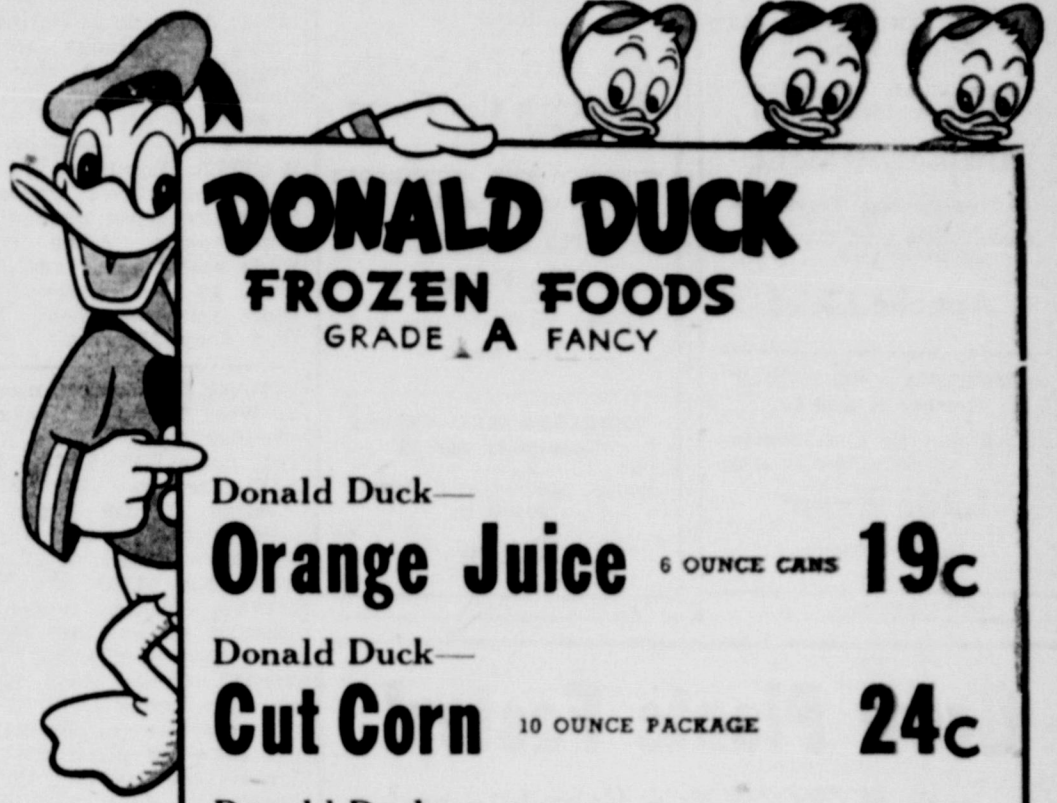
