# Hounds Defeat Trojans

Knox City's Greyhounds defeated the Windthorst Trojans Friday night in Greyhound Stadium 29-0.

The Hounds ended their first possession with an interception, but after a punt by the Trojans, the Hounds turned their second possession into the lone score of the first half when Jerry Stamps raced into the endzone on the fifth play of the series. Al Bateman kicked the extra point for the Hounds.

The next possession of the Trojans ended in a punt which was run back by Charlie Flye, but to no avail, as the Hounds had an illegal block.

Punts were exchanged into the second quarter until Stamps intercepted a Trojan pass and set the Hounds up at the Trojan 29 yard line, but the Hounds were unable to make paydirt this time.

The half ended in Trojan's possession, with the score 7-0 for the Greyhounds.

The Trojans received the kickoff in the second half, and on their third play from scrimmage, Greyhound Robert Watson stole an attempted pass and returned it for a TD. Again, Bateman followed with the extra point kick.

On the Trojan's second play following the kick Bateman recovered a Trojan fumble.

On the Hounds' first play Flye ran in for another Greyhound TD, which Bateman followed with one more extra point kick.

An interception of a Greyhound pass ended a series of punt exchanges by the two teams. The Hounds again forced the Trojans to punt and Flye made a 90 yard return into the endzone for the Hounds. Ricky Bishop ran over for two extra points.

The game ended with the ball in Greyhounds' possession, following an interception by Greyhound Kelly Robinson.

Greyhound quarterbacks hit 4 of 10 passes for 34 yards, having two intercepted.

The KC rushing game totaled 178 yards. Both backs, Flye and Stamps, gained about 90 yards.

The Greyhounds now have a 4-1 season record, and Windthorst is 1-4 for season play.

## Absentee Voting To Begin Oct. 15

The absentee voting period for the November 5 General Election begins next Wednesday, October 15, and will continue through Friday, October 31.

Those persons who expect to be absent from their county of residence only on the day of the election may vote by personal appearance during regular office hours at the County Clerk's office.

Those persons who expect to be absent from their county of residence both during the time for voting by personal appearance and on election day can make application to the county clerk requesting that an absentee ballot be mailed to them at an address outside the county.

In addition, those persons residing within the county but unable to vote on election day due to sickness, physical disability, religious belief, or incarceration for less than a felony, can also make application requesting that an absentee ballot be mailed.

## Hosts Seed Cleaning Workshop

The purpose of the workshop was to introduce the producers to the harvesting and cleaning methods in use at the Center and to allow the exchange of ideas among the producers relating to their experiences in harvesting and cleaning.

Participants were able to observe actual harvest and cleaning techniques as Center personnel demonstrated the use of several types of equipment on Selection-75 Klein-grass, one of the most popular species of grass to the group.

This grass is in production at the Center and has been released cooperatively by the Soil Conservation Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations.

Also on the agenda was a slide presentation showing grass harvesting and cleaning equipment in use throughout the area. Most of this equipment was either designed by

an individual or involved altering conventional machinery to perform a specific job.

The workshop concluded at 4:00 p.m. with the explanation by Center personnel of the seed certification program in Texas.

## KC Superintendent Heading Up Committee

Knox City Superintendent W.R. Baker, who is executive committee chairman of the Texas Association of Concerned Taxpayers, was in Abilene Wednesday of last week to attend a meeting of the executive committee.

Included in business was the selection of three possible new names for the Association.

The name change was suggested to avoid confusion with the Texas Association of Taxpayers. The first choice for a new name is Texans for Equitable Taxation. Other choices are Texas Association for Equitable Taxation or Citizens for Equitable Taxation.

Also at Wednesday's meeting held in the Regional XIV Education Service Center eight articles of incorporation were accepted. They had been prepared by Hamlin attorney Jack Willingham.

Baker said the articles probably would be ratified at the committee's next meeting October 22 in Abilene.

Proposed membership fees were set at \$200 for institutions and \$10 for individuals. Baker said that as soon as the name of the organization is approved and the articles of incorporation ratified "we'll start going after membership."

The association was formed in July for the purpose of "promoting fiscal responsibility in government and reform of ad valorem taxation so as to provide equitable taxation of all classes of property and reduce the ad valorem tax burden on the real property of Texas, and in furtherance of this purpose to conduct research and furnish pertinent information to the executive branch and legislature of the state of Texas and advised and consult with governmental entities and agencies as may be proper and necessary to accomplish such purposes."

Baker reported that response to the new organization has been widespread, coming from opposite ends of the state.

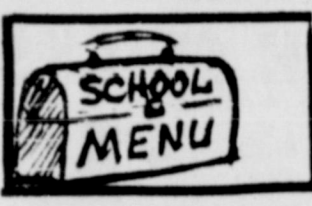

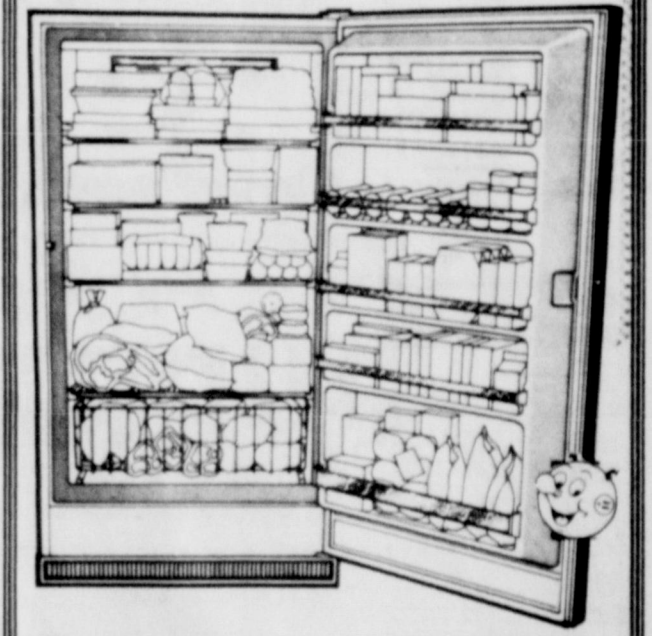

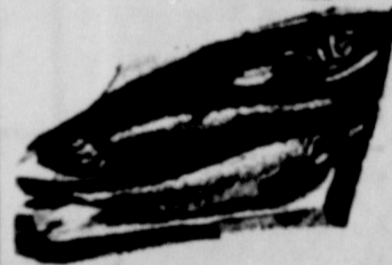
