**Crossbred** Steers **Bring Good Price** 

McGREGOR - A study here shows that crossbred steers can bring just as high a price at the market place as straight bred steers.

There has been a stigma associated with crossbreds in the past - and almost invariably they would bring less than a comparable straight bredanimal.

But no more, says Walter Kruse, of Texas A&M University's Livestock and Forage Research Center.

Kruse marketed 26 crossbred steers this spring that brought an average of \$23,25 per cwt. He sold 30 Hereford Steers that brought \$23,24 and 4 Angus steers that brought \$22,96.

"There was no significant difference in price whether the animal was straight bred or crossbred," said Kruse.

The highest price paid per pound was for a Hereford steer that brought \$24.30 per cwt.; the lowest price per pound was a Brahman cross at \$22,10 per cwt.



In 1958, monthly cash benefits were extended to dependents of disability insurance beneficiaries. Recognizing the need of disabled workers under age 50, and their dependents, Congress extended monthly cash benefits to this group in 1960.

Probably the most important change in the 1965 social security amendments concerning disability was the new definition of disability.

Under the old law, a person could become eligible only if he was disabled for a long and indefinite period. Now a person can qualify if his mental or physical impairment which prevents him from doing any substantial gainful work has already lasted or is expected to last for at least 12 months, or is expected to result in death. # **Horse And Buggy Measurements In** The Space Age

B. R. WINCHESTER Science Department

The Chemistry Students in Knox City High School are busy learning basic measurements that students in three-fourths of the world learned in early elementary school.

Yes, our system of measurement is as out-dated as the old horse and buggy. Each of us has learned twelve inches equals one foot, three feet equals one yard, and sixteen ounces equals one pound, and were frustrated in the lack of logic found in this system of weight and measurement.

Over one hundred years ago metric system was devised that was very simple and logi-

cal. This system is used in all areas of science and many areas of industry today. This measurement system is based on units of ten. The basic length measurement is the meter. The basic weight measurement is the gram. Any measurement larger or smaller than these units are 10, 100, or 1000 times larger or smaller.





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
