

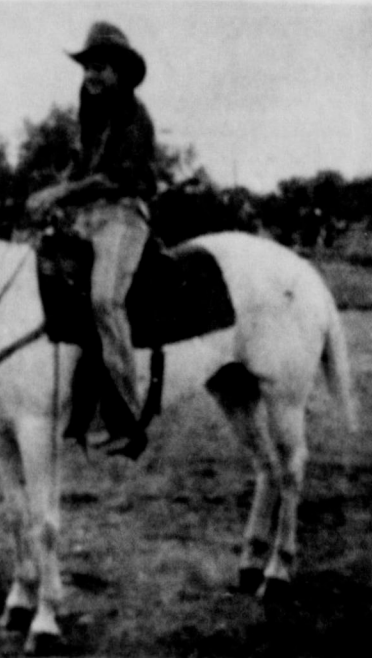

Six Screwworm Cases Confirmed In Knox County

Six confirmed screwworm cases have been reported in Knox County through June 23. Confirmed cases have been reported from the herds of the following live stock owners: Lee Urbanczyk of Munday, Lee Smith, Knox City with 2 cases, Vernon Buckley, Knox City and Truman Cypert and J.C. Watson, both of Goree.

Producers are reminded that it is important to mail samples of all suspicious screwworm larvae from livestock and pets. As long as we have the screwworms here the more cases confirmed at the Mission Screwworm Laboratory, the greater the possibilities of more sterile screwworm flies released in the area to aid in combating the problem.

Wound treatment and livestock spraying for fly control on regular intervals are important for helping to control the screwworm. For further information on controlling the screwworm MP-691, Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry are available at the county agent's office.

Several locations in Knox County have free sample mailing containers available. There are Knox City Grain, B. & C Chemical, and Carl Bradley at Knox City; Dr. W.H. Stewart, DVM, Gene Wood Tractor Sales and Knox Prairie Seeds, Inc. at Munday; Co-operative Grain Elevator at Truscott and Producers Cooperative Gin, Goree; Rhineland Coop Gin and the county Agent's office.

Larvae collecting and mailing instructions are enclosed in the containers.

The Hawkins purchased the brick motel and cafe on December 10, 1964, from E.H. Tankersley Jr. and during the years, the cafe has been leased out to several different parties but the Hawkins continued to operate the motel. The R.C. Smiths have assisted in the operation of the motel for the past five years.

The Roddys are no strangers to Knox City as they formerly owned the cafe and motel.

W.J. and his wife, Janie, leased the cafe building upon its completion from the late Roy Tankersley and ran the motel for seventeen months for him until they purchased it. They owned and operated the two establishments from 1957 until late 1960 when they moved to Harlingen. Since that time they have also owned businesses in Merkel and Seymour. W.J. remarked that they had had their share of moving around and were ready now to "settle down" and make Knox City their home. The couple's three children, also, who have "grown up" since they moved away. Jimmy Groves Receives M.D. From Harvard

James Elton Groves, son of Mr. and Mrs. L.E. Groves of Scurry, was awarded the Doctor of Medicine Degree from Harvard University at Cambridge, Mass. on Thursday, June 15, 1972.

Approximately 4400 degrees were awarded at the 321st Commencement of Harvard University.

Following the traditional Commencement Exercises in Harvard Yard, candidates received their degrees in special ceremonies held at the individual Schools or Houses with which they were most closely associated.

Jimmy will enter a residency program in psychiatry at the Massachusetts General Hospital, Boston, Mass.

He is one of seven members of the Class of 1972 entering residency programs in psychiatry and urology. 152 members of the class at Harvard Medical School will take internships in 22 states and the District of Columbia at a total of 54 institutions.

The Groves are former residents of Knox City and still maintain their home here.

Five men will be chosen from this group of twenty-five, and then the two winners picked from the five by a specially selected committee chosen by Mrs. Johnson.

DPS Estimates Loss Of 58 Lives During Holiday

The Texas Department of Public Safety estimates that 58 lives will be lost in traffic accidents during this year's 4th of July Holiday. "Operation Motorcade" will begin at 6:00 p.m. Friday, June 30, and will run until midnight, Tuesday, July 4.

Major C.W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Lubbock Region of the Department of Public Safety states, "All available personnel will be used in an effort to keep the highway deaths at a minimal. We will be on the lookout for violations of the traffic laws; especially we will be alert for the speeding driver and the drinking driver." Speed and DWI are the two largest contributors to traffic fatalities. Major Bell reminds all motorists that "each driver is responsible for keeping control of his vehicle in order to avoid colliding with another vehicle, a pedestrian or any fixed object. No one wants to be responsible for the death of another. Let's make our streets and highways as safe as possible. We all could drive twice as safe as we usually drive, so let's make an all-out effort and make this 4th of July a safe, happy holiday. Not a holiday that turns into a mourning." Do your part. "Drive Friendly," the Texas way.

WHAT ARE YOU RELIGIOUSLY ?
"Preacher, don't talk to me about your religion. My daddy was a—, my mother was a—, so I am a— and I'll die a—."
How many times have you used or heard such an expression? Did you know that such an expression is not new to this world? It is used in our Bible during the days of Jesus. Did you know this idea about religion was one of the leading causes of confusion in the first century?
The word "tradition" originally came from a root word meaning "to give up; transmit." Historically it meant "a surrender". Now we use it to mean, "the oral transmission of information, beliefs, customs, etc., from ancestors to posterity without written memorials; also, a belief, practice, etc., so transmitted." Webster's New Collegiate Dictionary.
If you or I so tenaciously hold on to tradition, think how foolish we can be. It means we give up without a challenge. It means we surrendered whether right or wrong.
Although tradition is not all bad, notice what Jesus told religious people it could do for them, Matt. 15:1-6: (Then came to Jesus scribes and Pharisees, which were of Jerusalem, saying, Why do thy disciples transgress the traditions of the elders? For (vs. 3) But he answered and said unto them Why do ye also transgress the commandments of God by your traditions? For God commanded saying, Honour thy father and mother, and, He that curseth father or mother, let him die the death. But ye say, Whosoever shall say to his father or his mother, It is a gift, by whatsoever thou mightest be profited by me; and honour not his father or his mother, he shall be free. Thus have ye made the commandment of God of none effect by your tradition. (vs. 7) Ye hypocrites, well did Isaiah prophesy of you saying, "This people draweth nigh unto me with their mouth, and honoureth me with their lips; but their heart is far from me. But in vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men."
The apostle Paul wrote most of our New Testament and admitted in Galatians chapter 1 that he had been wrong by depending on "the traditions of my fathers." After being made to know the will of God, he changed his entire course of life and left those traditions held so dear to him.
However we know not all tradition is bad, because this same apostle Paul told the Corinthians in 1 Cor. 11:2, to keep the traditions delivered to them. Also he so instructed the Thessalonians in 2 Thess. 2:15, "hold the traditions ye have been taught."
How do we know "daddy was alright, mother was alright, so I am alright and I'll die alright"?
As Jesus said in John 5:39, "Search the scriptures." Do search the scriptures with an open mind. Accept what you find and don't accept what you can't find.
