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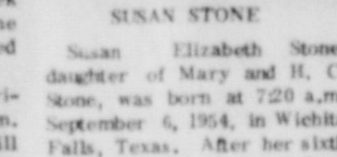
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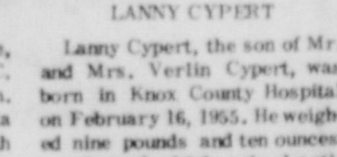



## Program Reopening Termed Victory For Farmers

Protest petitions, court action, and political pressure paid off for farmers this week when the Farmers Home Administration announced the reopening of the Disaster Loan Program. Hundreds of farmers in over two hundred Texas counties who suffered crop losses as a result of drought between January 1 and June 19 of 1972 are now eligible to apply for the \$1,000 Disaster Loan at a low interest rate with a forgiveness provision.

Texas Farmers Union president Jay Naman of Waco hailed the announcement of the program reopening as a "great victory for farmers." Naman said that farmers were successful in accomplishing the reopening of the important program because of their organized efforts using political pressure and court action. "Hundreds of family farmers who were stricken by disaster last year will now have a new lease on life and will be able to get the financing that they need to continue farming," Naman said.

"Farmers Union never gave up when President Nixon announced the cancellation of the Disaster Loan Program. Texas farmers organized petition campaigns to show the Administration and members of Congress the need to restore the program. Minnesota Farmers Union coordinated successful legal action that was brought by a group of farmers in that state against the Secretary of Agriculture and Farmers Home Administration officials. The court action plus the organized political effort of all farmers was responsible for the restoration of the Disaster Loan Program.

"We urge that all farmers eligible for a disaster loan

make application at their county Farmers Home Administration office before the May 8 deadline. We want to be sure that all farmers who suffered losses from disaster circumstances to take advantage of the program," Naman said.

### Texas Number Nine... Commercial Vegetable Outlook... Citrus Crop Up Again.

Texas continues in the top 10 states in dairy production and number of milk cows, according to a report titled "1972 Texas Dairy Statistics". The major dairy section of Texas is located in the eastern half of the state.

Total receipts to dairymen during 1972 amounted to about \$250 million.

The top 10 counties in milk production in Texas are Hopkins, Erath, Wise, Grimes, Johnson, Tarrant, El Paso, Parker, Bexar, and McLennan. The top 10 counties in cow numbers are Hopkins, Erath, Wise, Grimes, Johnson, McLennan, Parker, Tarrant, Harris, and Comanche.

Texas' dairy producers—about 4,000 of them—are included in 10 federal milk marketing orders.

And as costs of production continue for the dairyman this year, he is expected to be caught in a cost-price squeeze which may force some dairymen to liquidate their herds.

Production of milk in Texas during March, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service' notes, is up four per cent from a year ago.

Milk production in Texas per cow averaged 860 pounds, which is 30 pounds above a year earlier.

WEATHER conditions have curtailed commercial vegetable plantings in the Lower Rio Grande Valley and are also delaying harvesting.

Cabbage harvest has been slowed due to rains. Acres for harvest during the spring quarter will be above previous years because of some carryover acreage from the winter quarter.

Excessive rains and freezing weather have reduced acreage planted to canteloupes. Crop progress is two to three weeks behind schedule. Harvest is expected to begin about mid-May. The crop at Laredo is making good progress with harvest to start in May.

Carrot harvest has been delayed, and the supplies of carrots during April-May are expected to be above normal.

The spring tomato crop is later than normal. No volume is expected from the Valley until May. In East and Central Texas, rains have delayed transplanting and as a result the crop will be later than normal.

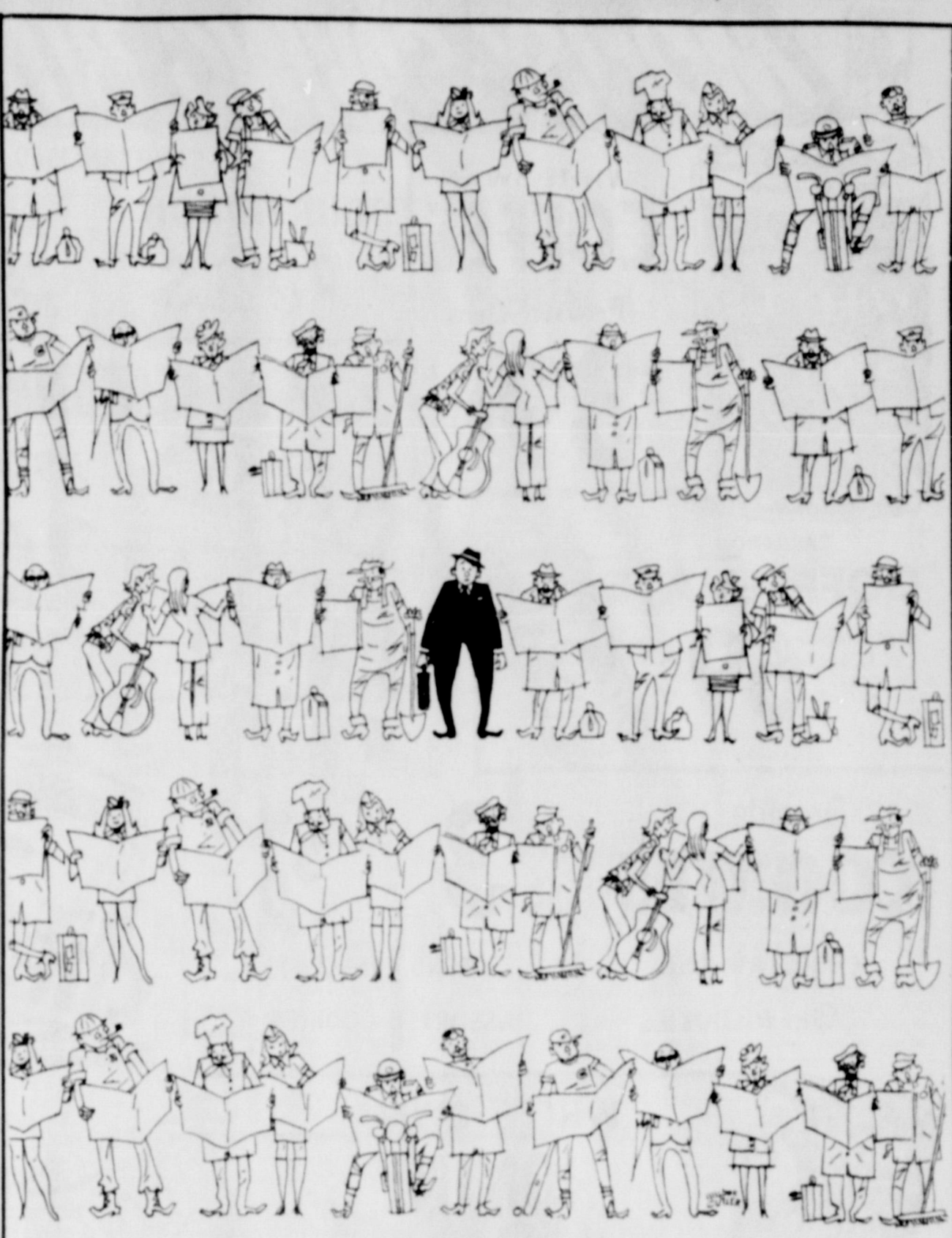
Increased acreage of sweet corn is expected in the Winter Garden area and the High Plains. Heavy rains in the Valley prevented growers from planting a normal acreage.

Replanting of the watermelon crop was necessary in the Valley and coastal bend areas of Texas. The crop is two to three weeks behind normal. The Winter Garden crop is making good progress.

CITRUS producers are enjoying a good season. Based on April 1 conditions, the 1972-73 citrus crop is estimated at 18,400,000 boxes, this is 23 per cent above the production of the previous season.

Citrus trees remain in good condition, although some erratic blooming has been noted in some groves.

Harvesting of grapefruit and Valencia oranges is slowing, but supplies will be available throughout May at harvest lags behind schedule.

## Additional 13,000 May Be Eligible for SS Benefits

This year, an additional 13,000 people—disabled children and their mothers—may be eligible for social security benefits totaling about \$7 million dollars, according to Henry

Chustz, manager of the Vernon social security office.

These additional payments are due to a change in the Social Security Law relating to childhood disability benefits Chustz said. The 1972 amendments permit the payment of childhood disability benefits when the disability begins before age 22, rather than before age 18 as under the old law. Life styles have changed so that many children do not have regular earnings until their early twenties. Disabilities occurring in this age group usually force the child's dependency on his parents for support. This new provision gives the childhood disability beneficiaries protection that has been much needed.

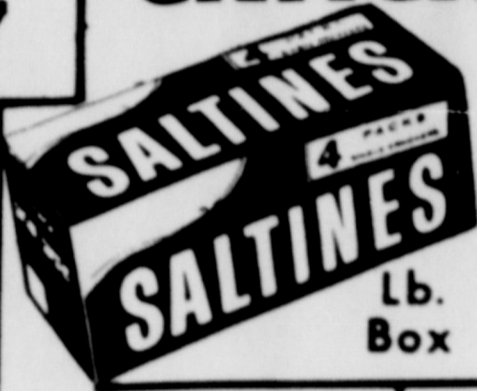
