According to Democratic chairman Collins Moorhouse, almost one out of two registered voters made it to the polls Saturday for the Democratic Primary.

Lay Witness **Mission Set** At Gillespie

The Gillespie Baptist Church, located between Knox City and Munday, will host a Lay Witness Mission Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. May 10, 11, and 12.

A Lay Witness Mission is a weekend experience in which a local church or community. after proper preparation. invites a group of team members, that is, a group of laymen like themselves from various communities and they come together for a weekend of sharing and discussion and searching together for some of the answers that the church or community is seeking.

Team members are from a variety of denominations and from all walks of life.

According to the pastor. Ray Milhoan, Wayne Wilson from Ralls is the coordinator for the Lay Witness Mission and is a farmer. Thus far, approximately 20 persons from various parts of the state have accepted invitations to participate in the mission. These persons come at their own expense to share in an informal, conversational, everyday level, their experiences of the love of Christ in their lives.

Milhoan stated they will begin their mission with a covered dish supper at the church beginning at 6:30 Friday evening. Immediately following the meal, the servi-

In the race for County Judge, incumbent Sam E. Clonts received 950 votes to his opponent Clyde Boose's 472. Mr. Boose is from Munday.

Sam Leaverton of Benjamin was elected at the new Knox County Democratic chairman with 746 votes. M.L.Wiggins of Munday received 625. Mr. Moorhouse did not seek reelection.

Incumbent Bobby Roberson was returned as Knox County Commissioner, Precinct 2, with 327 votes. His opponent P.H.Pierce received 140. Both men are from Benjamin.

In the race for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 4, Jackie Baty of Goree defeated Billie J. Suttle. Baty received 156 votes to his opponent's 69.

Other races of local interest were those for State Senator. 30th District, and State Representative, 101st District.

Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls won the senate seat with 728 votes. His opponent, Charles Finnell received 601. Representative W.S. (Bill) Heatly won a commanding vote of confidence from voters in the county with 957 votes. while his opponent Max Courtney polled 396.

In state races, Governor Dolph Briscoe received 1021 votes, Farenthold 142, Posey 17, and Alexander 21.

For State Treasurer, Jesse James defeated Donald B. Yarbrough 845 to 420.

Bob Bullock defeated Hugh Edburg 883 to 284 for State Comptroller: John C. White was returned as Commissioner of Agriculture with 1066 and his opponent. Herbert A. (Peanut) Schroeder received 239.; and Mack Wallace was elected to the unexpired term as Railroad Commissioner with 874. His opponent C.A.Kelly had 392.

The referendum for parimutuel wagering on horse racing was defeated 876 to 476.
