The purpose of the meeting was to determine if seed and Plant Materials could be preduced here at the Knox City Plant Materials Center for use on Texas Parks and Wildlife

Sim Oelfinger, Biologist, and David Riskind head of the Natural Resource Department for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department represented the Texas Parks and Wildlife Depart-

Arnold Davis, Plant Materials Specialist for Texas, and Jake Garrison, Manager of the Knox City Plant Materials Center represented the Soil Conservation Service.

At the conclusion of the meeting Arnold Davis and Jake Garrison toured the Rare Plant Center at the University of Texas. The function of the Rare Plant Center is to collect seed and vegetative materials of plants that are near extinction and propagate them so that they can be reestablished in the area of adaptation.

Three plants were brought to the Knox City Plant Materials Center, making a total of elgrowing here. They are Texas Pistachio, Wrights pavonia, littleleaf leadtree, anacua, or-Wrights anesicanth, guajillo, cat-claw, and two rare hibiscus.

It is hoped that some day in the near future a rare plant Arboretum can be established here at the Knox City Plant Materials Center, Garrison

Bad Weather Halts Harvest

Sample receipts remained slow as unfavorable weather continued to halt cotton harvesting in the area serviced by the Munday Cotton Classing Office, reports Sidney Ferrell, Officer-in-Charge, According to the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, gathering operatins are approximately 90 percent complete.

Quality statistics for the week ending Jan. 26, 1973 showed little change from the previous Seven percent of the cotton was classed as Strict Low Middling (41), compared to 9 percent the previous week. Thirty-four percent was Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) 34 percent was Low Middling Light Spotted (52) and 14 percent was in the Spotted grades. Thirty-seven percent of the cotton classed was reduced in grade due to bark or grass, down one percentage point from the last week. The staple length showed 20 percent staple 30, 53 percent staple 31, and 24 percent staple 32.

The micronaire readings continue to be reasonably good with 71 percent reading in the desirable range of 3.5-4.9 Twentynine percent read 5.0 and above.

The Pressley fiber strength tests conducted by the USDA's fiber laboratory at College Station shows that the average strength for the week was 77,000 pounds per square inch, compared to 76,000 pounds per square inch the previous week.



FUEL SHORTAGE RELIEF SOUGHT

AUSTIN-Greater oil and ras production to pare down Texas energy shortages is the aim of companion bills introduced in the Texas Legislature them. The measures would liberalize

unitization requirements for oil and gas fields so as to increase production of oil and gas re serves, according to sponsors of the legislation, Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon and Rep. Dave Finney of Ft. Worth.

They said the legislation would help accomplish one of Gov. Dolph Briscoe's goals: To get the maximum recovery from reserves as one of the means to solve the energy shortage.

A major obstacle, aside from technological aspects, preventing the tapping of part of the 98 billion barrels of Texas oil reserves has been an obsolete oil-gas unitization law that requires 100 per cent agreement from operators and royalty owners in a field to unitize, the lawmakers said. The requirement has been so restrictive that only one of every 10 Texas fields now operates as a unit.

Under terms of the Hightow er-Finney proposal, a consent majority of 75 per cent of all interests would be required.

It is believed that several billion more barrels of fuel can be tions, the legislators said.

Under the new social security law, increases will go to 89 percent of the 35 million widows who get monthly payments based on their late bushand's social security records. About 2 out of 5 widows will get 21,2 percent more than they were getting. About half will get increases ranging from about I percent to 21

The 21.2 percent increase will be paid to women who started getting widows benefits at 65 or later. They women whose deceased husbands did not take retirement benefits until age 65 or over or had died before becoming outiled to retirement benefits. Previously, a widow's benefit could be no more than K20 percent of the amount that would have been payable to her bushand age 65.


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
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
