Water Petition Interest Running Above Average

According to Chamber of Commerce manager Mrs. Doris Crowover, response is unusually good toward the circulating Municipal Water Authority Petition. The petition requests the legislature's permission in allowing citizens of Knox City to have the option to become members of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority.

The Legislature will not convene until after January 1, thus permitting more time for interested individuals to sign the petition.

Prompting the interest in the current petition is concern for the alarmingly increasing

amount of nitrate in area water. The rising content could be of dangerous consequence.

According to the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, there is no method of economically removing excessive amounts of nitrate from water, and the Department recommends the use of alternative sources of water that may be used with safety.

Should permission be granted by the legislature, Knox City will have the privilege of voting in the Miller Creek project. Overall costs are estimated at five and one half mil-

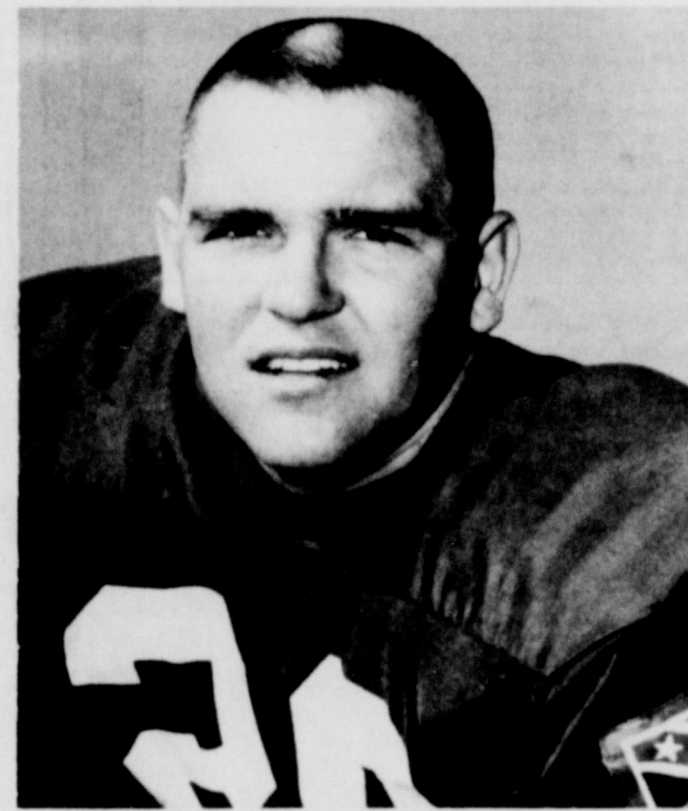
After 18 holes of play, luncheon will be served and first and second place prizes will be awarded for low gross and net. There also will be prizes for the winners in the driving and putting contests.

Better economic conditions, full development of area potentials in agriculture and industry, was the purpose and scope of the program of the Rolling Plains Committee, at a meeting in the High School Auditorium in Munday last week.

"Hard-core" facts of possible achievements of this area, were outlined by a number of speakers. The subjects varied from range planning, brush control, better quality of crops

through experimentation with seeds and grasses, control of insects, and sanitary conservation of foods.

The Munday area, through efforts of its Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, and working in close liaison with local farmers and businessmen, was recognized for its efforts in expansion. However, as pointed out by Herbert Partridge, local farmer and employee of General Mills, we are not utilizing more than one-half of our potentials.

Dr. H. O. Kunkel, Dean of Agriculture, Texas A&M University, commented on the work of the Rolling Plains Committee. The first such area organized was the Blackland Area of Texas. Since, others have been formed. He said the re-

sults are dramatic of what can be done by people working together.

In speaking of the Research Center to be located here, Dr. Kunkel said there would be four professionals, plus a number of non-professionals on the staff. The technology, is something that can't happen overnight, but better operations would result in a follow-up of the future developments.

One small community within the Rolling Plains Area has put ideas to practice with rewarding success. Dr. Arch Andrews, in speaking of the achievements of Windthorst, said "we have a group of people there that doesn't care too much who gets the credit, they just want to know who gets it done." He also stated, "There are people there that still believe in hard work."

The Rolling Plains Committee launched on the subject of "getting kicked off" in program expansion. It was agreed that local people were more

familiar with their problems, and sub-committee work in each locality was essential. The District Office would be available to help with any problems or procedures anywhere within the 28 county area.

Officers elected, for next year, were: Jim Humphreys, of Dickens County, Chairman; Dr. Arch Andrews, of Archer County, Vice-Chairman; Norman Brints, Area Farm Management Specialist, of Vernon, as Secretary.

Tentative plans for the next meeting of the Rolling Plains Committee is to be in Monday next April.

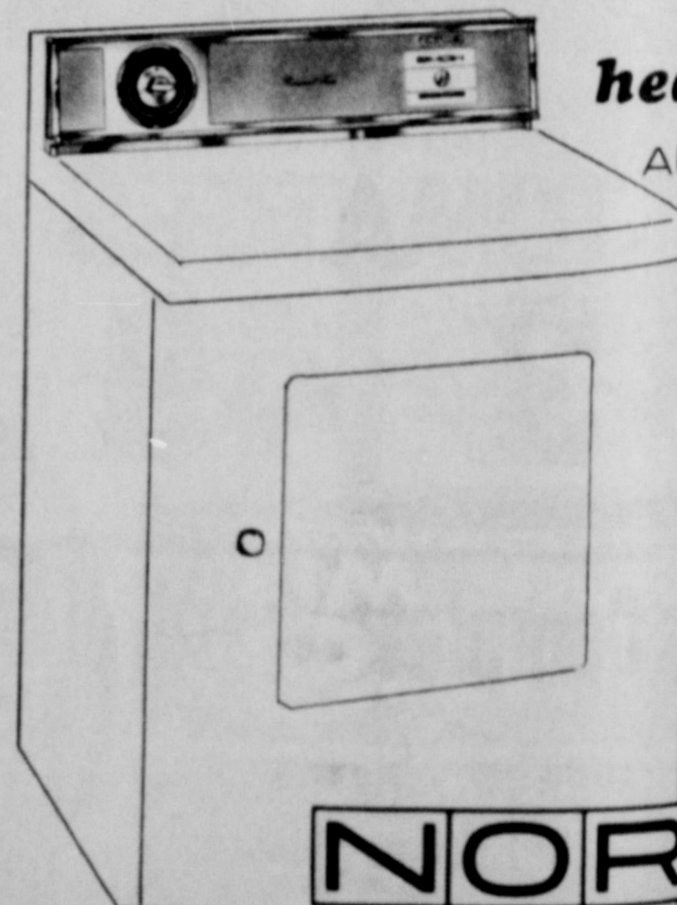

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

Editorial

Newspapers Serve As Watchdogs For U.S.

In Czechoslovakia, communist totalitarianism has destroyed its most feared enemy — the free press. Newspapers and broadcasters in that country are now forbidden to make any news reports that "could be considered as criticism" by the Soviet-led occupation forces.

In the United States, nearly 11,000 newspapers serve as watchdogs of the public interest. The editors are free to report the news and comment on it as they see fit. With the free press looking over its shoulder, government from the City Hall to the White House has to put its best foot forward, and outright oppression of the people becomes impossible.

For various reasons, freedom of the press in the United States has been criticized and proposals put forward to limit its ability to report the news. Different explanations for this have been cited including national security and the question of whether pretrial reporting of crime news makes it impossible to get an impartial jury. In debating the latter point with a member of the legal profession, the managing editor of The New York Times has said, "... We newspapermen do not believe that a law degree makes a man more honorable than a degree in journalism. ... I have absolutely no doubt that the free press in America has prevented and corrected far more injustice than it has committed."

This about sums it up. The action taken in Czechoslovakia is another reminder of the role played by the free press in preserving the freedom of any society, including our own.

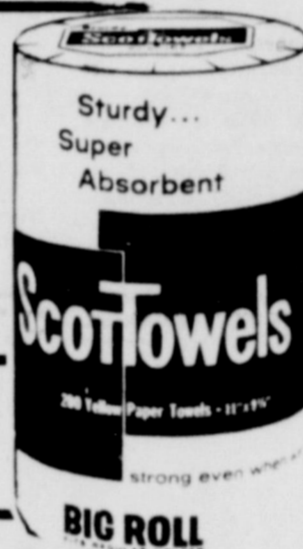

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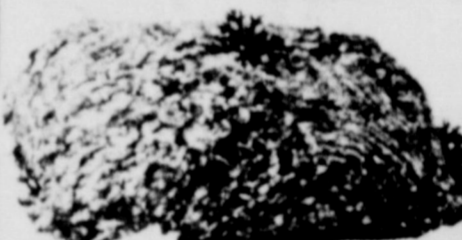
