Three False Fire Alarms Turned in

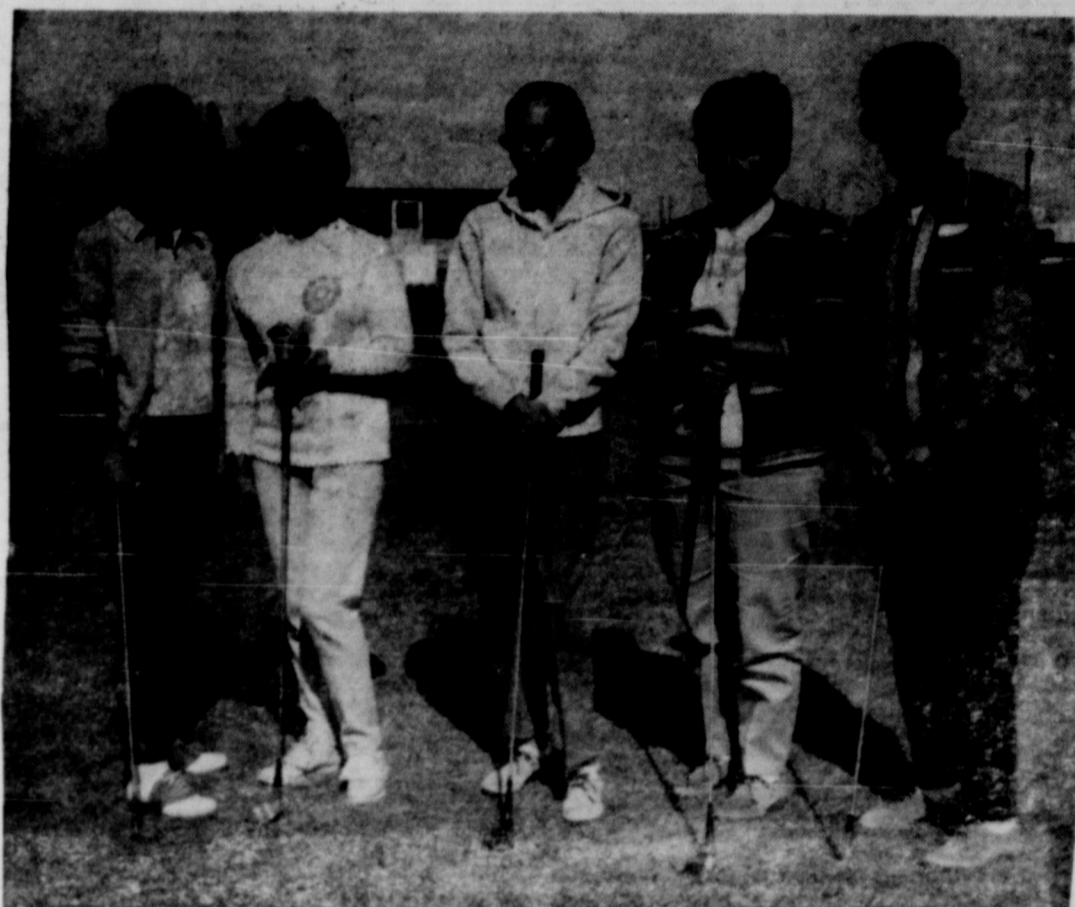
Members of the Knox City Volunteer Fire Department were roused from their sleep twice during the early Sunday morning hours, both times on false alarms.

Rolling Plains Cotton Growers Assn. Get Rulling On Skip-Row Planting

A ruling by the United States Department of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, concerning skiprow planting patterns and their effect on 1967 projected yields for cotton has aroused a protest from the Rolling Plains of Texas.

According to Charles Stenholm, executive vice president of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, the ruling is totally unfair and highly discriminating to farmers in the Rolling Plains and, if allowed to stand, will cause our 31 counties to lose up to 4 million dollars in price support and diverted acreage payments in 1967.

J. B. Cooper, Roscoe farmer and president of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Billy Whorton, Roscoe farmer and Stenholm were in College Station this past week where they met with the State ASCS committee regarding the inquiries involved in the ruling and then Copper and Stenholm joined Max Carrier, Fisher County farmer and District 3 director of Texas Farmers Union in Washington where the protest was furthered.

Cong. Omar Burleson of Anson and Bob Poage of Waco, Sen. Ralph Yarborough and other in Washington have been alerted to the problem and are working vigorously with the Dept. to avoid unjust penalty for the traditional skip-row area of the U.S.

The Dept. has ruled that skip-row penalties in effect for 1966 are also retroactive back through 1962-63-64-65. The ruling has the effect of saying that 2.2 cotton measured as 50 percent cotton in 1962 is no longer counted 50% cotton but is now counted 65% cotton in figuring 1967 projected

yields because this is the way it is measured today. (The Rolling Plains Cotton Growers has contended that the Department cannot change the rules of the game after the game has started. A measurement taken in 1962 cannot be changed today but only if the Department has acted fairly in making the retroactive ruling the Rolling Plains is still being unjustly penalized because we are no longer planting a predominant skip-row penalty pattern. We are today planting 2 & 4 cotton which has no penalty. When you consider this latter part, the ruling has the effect of taking pounds away from Rolling Plains farmers and giving them to non-skip-row farmers in other areas.

According to Stenholm, more and more people from the State office to Washington are beginning to appreciate the unique problem we have here in the dryland Rolling Plains because of adverse skiprow rulings. We have received assurance that new and full consideration will be given this new ruling and that a change will be made so the Rolling Plains cotton farmer will receive what is rightfully his in 1967.

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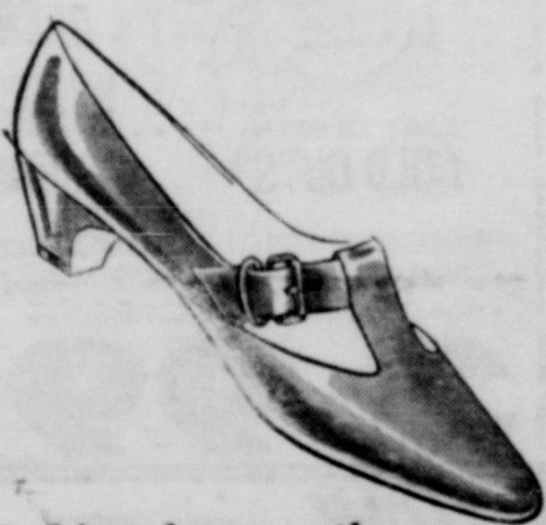
