KC Plant Center Has Argentina Visitors

The Plant Material Center hosted six visitors from Argentina Wednesday of last week, according to plant manager Jacob C. Garrison.

Among the visitors was Nicolas Mulcahy, vet medic, who holds the master's degree in agriculture from Texas A&M University. COYOTE CONTROL TRAINING MEETING

"Texas Plant Disease Handbook" is available to interested individuals. The handbook was prepared by plant pathologists for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and contains disease descriptions and approved chemical control recommendations for all major crops and ornamentals.

Information on the handbook is available from the County Extension Office or from the Extension Plant Pathology Section, Plant Sciences Building, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

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Co. Fuel, Fertilizer Survey Set For June 17

AUSTIN—Thirty-two Knox County agricultural producers will be interviewed on their use of fuel and fertilizer as part of a Texas Department of Agriculture survey to help determine the state's energy policy.

According to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, the comprehensive Texas Farm Fuel and Fertilizer Survey will also provide information for agricultural and research needs.

The survey will begin June 17 and end July 1. It will involve nearly 1,500 farms and ranches selected at random from respondents to an earlier survey on acreage and productions. Participants will provide information on their use of fuel and fertilizer for production and marketing of crops, livestock and poultry.

For this survey 55 counties were chosen at random from the State's 15 crop reporting districts.

White said the department is conducting the survey at the request of the Governor's Energy Council. The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will supervise the interviews and compile the results.

Specially trained personnel will personally interview farm and ranch operators or others knowledgeable about the operation such as foremen or managers. Persons to be interviewed will be notified and facts about individual operations will be kept confidential.

"We encourage farmers to participate," White said. "This survey will be the first giving us the facts we need to direct our activities to make sure farmers have the necessary inputs for agriculture."

FREQUENT REFRIGERATOR DEFROSTING

If your refrigerator seems to need defrosting too often, one cause could be poor air circulation.

Check the flap on the chiller tray located under the freezer section. This flap is designed to control air flow; directions for its placement are usually written on the flap.

Also check the placement of any large pans of food items in the refrigerator and see that they do not block circulation.
