White said the department is conducting the survey at the request of the Governor's Energy Council. The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will supervise the interviews and compile the

dential. We encourage farmers to participate." White said. 'This survey will be the first giving us the facts we need to direct our activities to make sure farmers have the necessary inputs for agriculture.'


