prised to learn that finding the runway was quite easy. They were told to consider the fresh mound as an old type hand fan and look for the handle located (plug) and get a distance half the radius of the mound in front of or just to the side of this and probe. Care should be taken to stop the probe when the runway is hit without making a hole in the bottom or the grain will fall in the hole instead of on the floor. Remember the probing location is not in the mound as this was the area excess soil was removed from the runway and has been plugged by the gopher.

Munday Receives FHA Grant Check

Munday - "It is a real pleasure to be here in Munday and to participate in such a worthy project as your storm drainage system," said Mr. J. Lynn Futch, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration in Texas, as he addressed a large group in the Munday High School Cafeteria Tuesday, December 3 at 2:00 p.m.

Travis Lee, President of the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, welcomed the crowd and introduced Mayor Jim Reeves. Mayor Reeves introduced Joe Boone, County FHA Administrator, who gave brief introductory remarks about Mr. Futch. He said that Mr. Futch was appointed to his position in April of 1969 and had 17 years experience in agriculture credit business.

"We seem to hear a lot about rural development these days," commented Mr. Futch. He stated that only a few years ago the main interest seemed to be in the big cities. For this reason concern has grown steadily in rural development as the big cities became over populated. There are several agencies in the Department of Agriculture such as the SCS, Extension Services, Forest Service, ASCS, etc. that are concerned with rural development. "But, we feel that of all of these agencies, the FHA is the action agency and more closely related to rural development," said Futch.

Mr. Futch said he felt that one main area of interest to this region would be the farm programs. He said that Texas has the largest operating farmer loan program in the U. S. within the agency which is a fact to be proud of. Last year they loaned \$30 million in operating loans and also farm ownership and service programs. The FHA recommended to Congress to increase the operating loan fund nationwide from \$275,000,000 to \$350,000,000. Texas has received approximately 10% of the \$275 million and with the increase they could possibly receive \$35 to \$40 million.

In community service programs such as water systems, storm sewers, sewage disposal plants, etc., the FHA has made loans to over 600 areas in Texas. The FHA recommended to Congress an additional \$50 million on a nationwide basis. Mr. Futch stated that these were very conservative increases compared to the number of applications they receive. The FHA loaned between \$17 and \$18 million in Texas last year for community service programs.

Mr. Futch said that one of the largest increases had taken place in rural housing. "In the fiscal year of 1967, 4100 families were put into new homes. In the fiscal year just ended for 1970, 4600 families were placed in new homes and in the fiscal year of 1971, it is probable that over 7000

more people that they know meet requirements, thus saving time lost in investigating each request for loans. Also, the direct payment system will mean that home owners will send their payments to the finance office in St. Louis. This will save Mr. Boone considerable time at the first of each month.

Mr. Futch stated further that there had not been a shortage of loan funds in over two fiscal years. He said, "The shortage is in the administrative funds for personnel." It seems that Congress has stepped up the loans, but has been reluctant to step up the personnel to administer these loans. Futch said that they were operating with almost the same number of people as they were 10 years ago. He said that this was a very crucial point for the FHA if they are to keep up with the continual service for people. For this very reason the packaging program and the direct payment system were put into effect.

"It is not our intention to be in competition with private enterprise," stated Mr. Futch. In most instances private enterprise is essential to the survival of small towns. Mr. Futch said he certainly did not want the private enterprises in our area to think they were trying to compete.

In conclusion Mr. Futch said that it was a pleasure to work with small towns such as Munday which had such perseverance as was shown by the fact that loan and grant application was made in 1965. He said that the FHA could loan the money, but it was the ability and legwork of the county administrator, Joe Boone, and the community to get the work done. At this point in the program,

Mr. Futch presented Mayor Reeves the check for \$100,000 which will assist in funding the storm drainage system. Mayor Reeves extended his appreciation and thanks to the FHA and to all who had a part in this accomplishment.

Coffee and doughnuts were served by the Munday Chamber of Commerce at the close of the program.


