

DPS Investigates Accidents

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1975 shows a total of 56 accidents resulting in no persons killed and 19 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for October, 1975, shows a total of 543 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 283 persons injured, as compared to October, 1974, with 502 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 215 persons injured. This was 41 more accidents, one less killed, and 68 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time

The traffic deaths (18) for the month of October, 1975. occurred in the following counties: Five in Parker; two each in Stonewall, Castro, and Randall; and one each in Baylor, Crosby, Lamb, Palo Pinto, Wise, Armstrong, and






