## Hounds Down Rochester 34-0 Play Bobcats Friday, 8 P.M.

Knox City Greyhounds defeated Rochester 34-0 at Steer Stadium last night. The Hounds' English start, scored a season's opener. The score came in the quarter on a 43-yard pass from Mike Lankford. PAT failed and half-

back Charlie Lieb came through with a TD on a 65-yard run setting the score 12-0. The PAT by Newton was good and the Hounds gained another point, 13-0. Early in the fourth quarter Lieb dashed 20 yards and Newton added the extra point and the scoreboard read 20-0. With 9:50 remaining in the game, the KC Greyhounds added another 6 points on a 31-yard pass from Newton to brother Phillip. The 178 pound halfback came through once again on a good PAT making it 27-0.

The final TD, made by freshman Nefro Gonzales when he scampered around right end for 17 yards, plus a good PAT, tallied 34 points for the Greyhounds. The Knox City team will journey to Rule this Friday night for a contest with the Bobcats on their home field. The Rule team is rated above average and offers the Greyhounds somewhat of a challenge.

## O'Brien Man Gin First Area Cotton For Season

O'Brien resident Clyde W. Covey was again responsible for the season's first bale of cotton. The 2,080 pounds of burr cotton were brought to the O'Brien Coop Gin Saturday afternoon and ginned Monday afternoon about 4:00 o'clock.

The hand-pulled cotton produced a 541-pound bale and 940 pounds of seed. It was gathered from approximately six acres in a 25-acre plot belonging to R. T. Carney just south of the O'Brien Baptist Church. The dryland cotton, Northern Star 38-5, was planted May 11 and received very little rainfall, Mr. Covey said. Those who pulled the bolls told Mr. Covey they believed that they had pulled less than half of the cotton on the six acres.

This is the second time Mr. Covey has had the first bale of cotton, the first being in August of 1966. Gin manager Samuel Tankersley said that the first bale always receives free ginning and that a premium also will be awarded Mr. Covey.
