Mrs. C. C. Hoge Named Co-ordinator for Cultural Resources Inventory Here

Mrs. C. C. Hoge, Chairman of the Knox County Historical Survey Committee, has been designated as the local coordinator for a cultural resources inventory to be taken in Knox County as a part of an official statewide survey now being conducted by the Texas Fine Arts Commission, according to John Ben Sheppard of Odessa, chairman of the newly-created state agency.

"We are indeed grateful to Mrs. Hoge for undertaking the completion of our survey in Knox County," Sheppard said. "This is a unique undertaking in Texas; nothing of its kind has ever been attempted in the State of Texas before."

The purpose of the survey, Sheppard explained, is to determine both the quantity and quality of cultural activity both by organizations and individuals now

going on in the towns and communities in our state. "We plan not only to catalogue the various organizations active in the fine art fields in Texas, but to identify individual artists, authors and craftsmen, and the location and identification of local public and private works of art and collections," Sheppard said. When tabulated the results of the statewide survey will be used by the Commission to develop an overall plan to utilize the cultural resources of the state to meet the needs of the greatest number of persons possible. The survey results will also permit the Commission to publish a "Who's Who" in the arts in Texas, a calendar of cultural activities and events, and a list of available talent, performing arts groups and exhibits, and to develop pilot projects that would assist in the development of the arts in Texas.

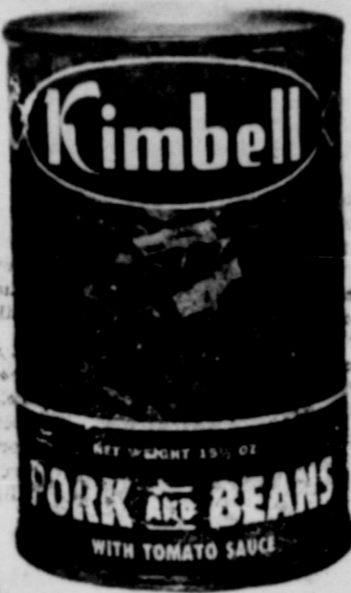

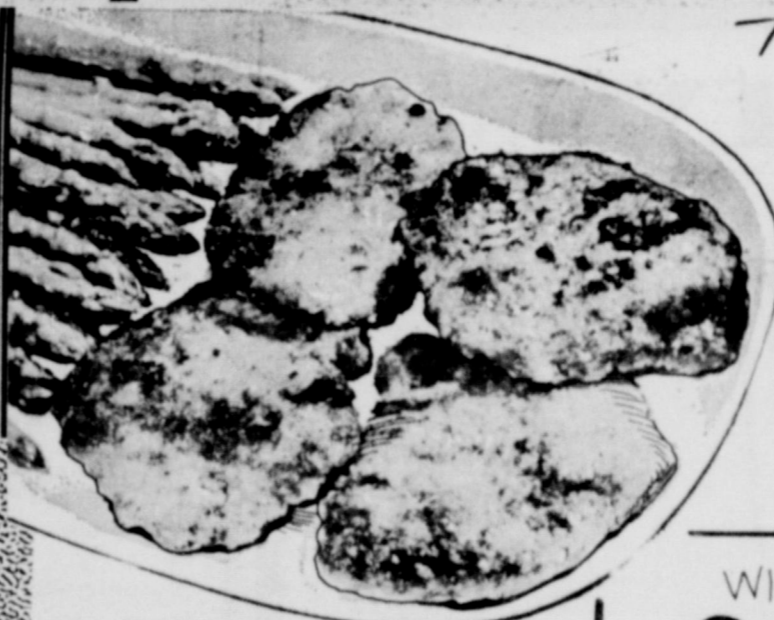

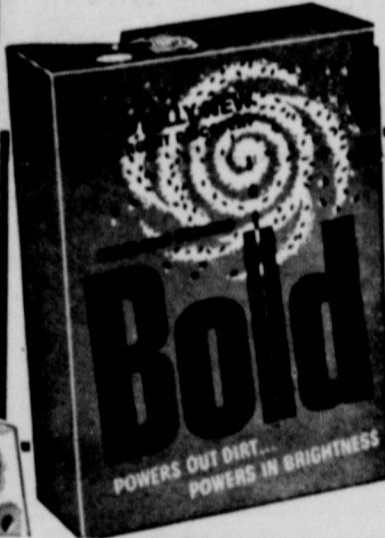

Order people in the five-county area serviced by the Vernon Social Security office who have paid doctor bills but have not yet claimed their medical doctor bills insurance payments are invited to have their claims checked by the Vernon Social Security office before mailing them to the medicare carrier, according to Edwin Draughon, manager.

"In the first six months of the medicare program some benefit payments were delayed because the applicants did not include all the necessary information with their claims," he said.

Mr. Draughon believes that most people will need this help only the first time they make a medical insurance claim. "The Medicare Handbook which is given to all beneficiaries, explains how to make the claims," he said, "and the form is relatively simple, but most people can use some advice the first time they apply. We're glad to offer assistance, and we believe we can help many people to avoid some delay in their payment."

Mr. Draughon noted that the medicare claim may be made either by the patient or by the doctor, if he accepts assignment of the insurance. If the doctor applies for the medicare payment, he bills the patient only for any part of the \$50 deductible.

Under the other method of payment the doctor bills the patient, the patient pays the bill, and then the patient sends the completed request for payment form to the medicare carrier. A statement from the doctor showing the treatment given and the charges already paid by the pa-

tient must be furnished either on the request for payment form or in a separate receipted bill. In the Texas area, medicare doctor bill insurance is handled by Group Medical & Surgical Service, Box 22147, Dallas, Texas 75222.

The same simple one-page request for payment form is mailed to the doctor. Doctors' offices, accustomed to filing out insurance forms, should have no difficulty providing the few items of information requested, Mr. Draughon noted. But handling of forms received directly from medicare beneficiaries is sometimes delayed because some essential item of information has been omitted.

If the beneficiary leaves out his medicare identification number, for instance, it is impossible to verify that he is signed up for the doctor bill insurance, or how much of his deductible amount has been paid. Some elderly people with failing eyesight are unable to make legible entries. And some do not get adequately itemized receipts from their physicians, or forget to enclose the receipts with their claims. If the request for payment form is incomplete or improperly filled out, the medicare carrier has to write back to the beneficiary, thus delaying the payment.

"The Social Security office does not make the decision or pay the claim," Mr. Draughon said. "The law requires that the payments be handled through the selected medicare carriers. But we can answer general questions about medicare and help people in the five-county area get their appli-

## 5 Accidents Investigated In Knox Co.; 1 Person Injured, \$1,830.00 In Damage

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 5 accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of December according to Sergeant Frank Jirek, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person injured, and an estimated property damage of \$1,830.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the calendar year 1966, shows a total of 60 crashes resulting in 4 persons killed, 37 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$49,080.00.

"When the final reports are tabulated, we will find that more people were killed in Texas traffic accidents during 1966 than in any prior year in the history of this state," the Sergeant stated. The final count is expected to be about 15 percent more than the 3,026 traffic deaths in 1965. This increase should be a challenge for every individual to put forth his best defensive efforts to prevent accidents during 1967.

The veteran Patrol Supervisor cautions all motorists to beware of ice spots at bridges, underpasses and in shadows. Reduce speed before you reach these slippery areas.
