Unidentified Negro's Body Found On Burnett Ranch Near Benjamin

Sheriff Homer T. Melton said Wednesday that the Negro man found dead on the Burnett Ranch near Benjamin Monday had not yet been identified, but that officers are tracing several leads and hope to have an identification within a few days.

The body was found by Bruce Burnett while riding over the ranch. Burnett first discovered an undershirt hanging in a tree and under the tree was the Negro's body. Melton said apparently the undershirt was placed in the tree as a signal, and that the Negro's shoes were off and his clothes loosened as if he were ill before death.

An autopsy performed on the body showed no evidence of foul play, but still unexplained is the man's presence in the pasture, about a mile from the nearest road.

According to the sheriff, the man was probably near 25 years of age, and had been dead about ten days.

A name found stamped on the dead man's clothing proved to be the name of another man, who has not yet been located, Melton said.

Melton was assisted in the investigation by County Attorney Carl Patterson.

Mr. Banner, 78, died Thursday morning following a lengthy illness.

Mr. and Mrs. Banner were early-day residents of Knox City, where he was manager and buyer for the Knox City Mercantile Company. He moved from here to Corpus Christi where he lived until recently.

Immediate survivors are his wife, a daughter, Mrs. J. D. Hardin of West Columbia; and a son, C. R. Banner of Corpus Christi.

O'Prys Open New Dry Cleaning Shop

Mr. and Mrs. E. A. O'Pry will hold "open house" at their new cleaning and pressing establishment Saturday, Sept. 13.

The O'Prys, former owners of City Cleaners, purchased the lot just east of Holcomb's Garage on the Munday highway, and erected a 25x80 foot concrete block building. The building has been plastered and boned white inside and out.

All new equipment is being installed this week, Mr. O'Pry said. The fixtures will be in a natural finish with a "western" effect. The building will have fluorescent lighting.

Refreshments will be served from 5 to 7 p. m. Saturday, and everyone was invited to visit the plant either during those hours or earlier in the day. The shop, which will be known as Service Cleaners, will be open for business Monday.

Oil Notes—

Location is being prepared for the Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 J. A. Dunnam, about 1.4 miles north of town. This is an offset to the company's No. 1 Sam Ferguson, a Palo Pinto producer. It is on the Abe Watson tract, where the royalties are held by Mr. Watson, Curtis Coates and Sam White.

Another new location, in the west part of the county, is the Humble No. 1 McFadden Estate, a 6,500 foot wildcat southwest of Truscott.

Official potential of the Mid-Continent Petroleum Co. No. 1 George Buchanan, four miles east of town, has been announced as 147 barrels of 32 gravity oil daily, pumping through perforations at 5,785 to 5,795 feet, in the Bend conglomerate.

A mile west of O'Brien, the Geochemical Surveys No. 1 S. N. Reed has been abandoned at 5,660 feet.

Another failure was the Frank Wood & Associates No. 1 Gillespie, 12 miles south of Guthrie in King County. The wildcat was abandoned at 6,590 feet, in barren lime.

Skelly-Oil Co. has staked the No. 1 L. E. Hughes as a Katz Field project 13 miles southwest of Knox City, in Stonewall County. Slated depth is 5,300 ft. The Southwest Natural Production Co. No. 1 Kempner Estate, on the Knox-King County line west of town, is drilling below 3,140 feet.

The Continental Oil Co. No. 4 Alma Orsborn, in the King county portion of the Katz Field, was completed this week as a pump-out, producing from perforations at 5,103-25 feet. The same company staked location for the No. 6 Orsborn in the same area.

J. T. Gilpin, Knox County PMA administrator, said Wednesday that the county office in Knox City had received one order for federal-aid hay, but in view of the many inquiries received earlier in the week, he expects orders to come in fairly fast when stockmen learn that application blanks are ready and orders are being accepted.

The order received Wednesday morning was for twenty tons of mixed hay at \$32.00 per ton, delivered here. Cost of legume hay is \$36.00 per ton, and grass hay is \$28.00 per ton, Gilpin said.

Knox and Haskell counties are both among the 73 Texas counties declared a drouth area last week by President Truman, on recommendation of the Housing & Home Finance Agency. The recommendation followed an exchange of charges and counter-charges between federal officials and Texas' governor Allan Shivers, who had asked for the federal aid some weeks earlier.

Raymond H. Foley, Housing & Home Finance administrator, contended that the application, which Shivers admittedly made reluctantly, was incomplete and that the Agency had to spend a great deal of time getting the information required by law.

The Housing & Home Finance Agency has been allotted three million dollars for the disaster relief program under Public Law 875. The funds will be used as advances for reimbursement to the Dept. of Agriculture for use in meeting, if necessary, any unrecouped portions of the cost of procuring, transporting and distributing the cattle feed.

According to Gilpin, a rancher or farmer in Knox County can apply at the PMA office in Knox City, and the order will be forwarded to the state office. He will not be permitted to order more than a 30-day supply, but can reorder from time to time. A deposit of \$5.00 a ton is required with each order, and the balance when the hay is received.

On the Fort Worth market, legume hay has been selling at \$50 to \$55 per ton and grass hay at \$39 a ton, with prices running higher in West Texas due to additional transportation charges.

Gilpin urged farmers and ranchers needing hay to place their orders as soon as possible. He believes delivery of the hay will be fairly quick.

Cotton Burrs May Be Returned to Land

County Agent W. C. Pallmeyer this week reminded Knox County farmers that according to a recent ruling by Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White, cotton burrs may be returned to the land.

For several years all burrs have been burned because of the pink bollworm infestation. The infestation is no longer heavy enough in this area to warrant restrictions, according to White.

When returned to the land, the burrs help build up the organic matter, Pallmeyer said.

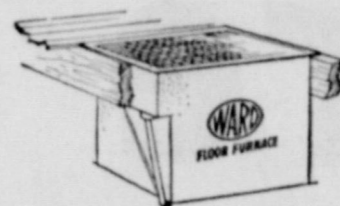
