## Funeral Held at Goree Tuesday for Buster Chamberlain

Funeral services were held at the Goree school Tuesday at 2:30 p. m. for Cecil R. (Buster) Chamberlain, 37, Goree postmaster.

Chamberlain was killed instantly late Saturday when a beam fell on him at the Goree football field. As president of the school board, he was overseeing the job of dismantling power poles around the football field when the accident occurred.

Pallbearers were Don L. Ratliff and Paul Pendleton, Monday; Jeff Graham, Knox City; George Nix, Ira Stalcup and Dorsey Rogers, all of Goree.

Chamberlain was born near Goree and had lived in the vicinity of Goree and Munday all his life. His father, M. T. Chamberlain, is county clerk of Knox County.

Survivors are his wife and two sons, Keith, 13, and Gaylon, 10; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. T. Chamberlain of Munday; three brothers, Pete of Dallas, Jimmy of Kansas City, Mo., and D. G. of Denton; and four sisters, Mrs. Athlene Martin of Wichita Falls, Mrs. Merle Moore of Goree, Mrs. Avis Denton of Dickens and Mrs. Edna Pearl Maddox of Oklahoma City.

## Meetings Held to Discuss 7-Point Cotton Program

A seven-step cotton program was outlined in a series of three meetings in Knox County during the past week.

"These meetings were held to aid farmers in producing better crops, and a follow-up program is being planned on insect control to be carried out in June," County Agent W. C. Pallmeyer said.

Meetings were held at Knox City, Munday and Vera. Included on each of the programs were talks by Roy Saunders and Mark Wadzek of the West Texas Cotton Mill, and Pallmeyer. Saunders explained the cotton variety test, Wadzek spoke on cotton insect control and showed a film on the subject, and Pallmeyer spoke on insect control.

About 35 farmers attended the meeting at the American Legion Hall in Knox City. Included on the program were: "Balanced Farming," Pallmeyer and Jesse Gilpin; "Care of the Soil," Charlie Cape; "Cotton Varieties," Roy Saunders; "Insect Control," Ancil Waldrip, Wadzek and Pallmeyer. Local implement dealers presented the machinery outlook, and ginners presented the ginners' problem.

More than 200 were present at the meeting in Munday, which was sponsored by the Community Development Association. Russell Penick spoke on Balanced Farming, E. R. Ponder and Clay Grove discussed Care of the Soil, and the program was completed by Saunders, Wadzek, Pallmeyer, implement dealers and ginners.

At Vera, with 70 in attendance, the program included: "Balanced Farming," Al Cartwright and Milton Ford; "Care of the Soil," Pallmeyer; "Cotton Varieties," Saunders; and "Insect Control," Clelan Russell, Wadzek and Pallmeyer.

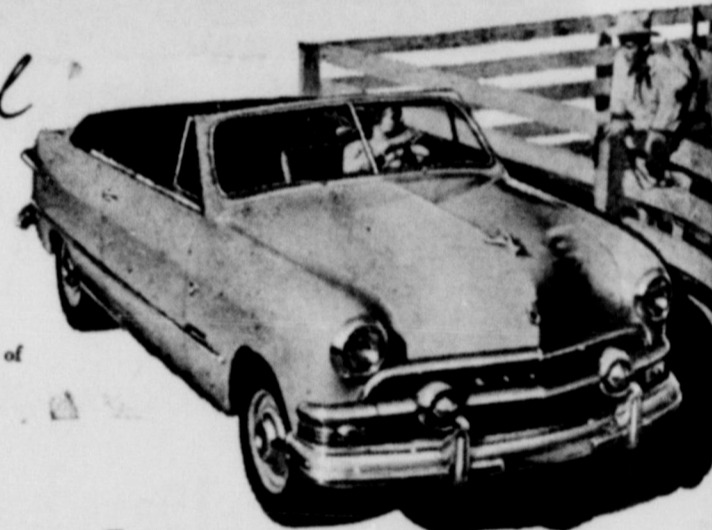

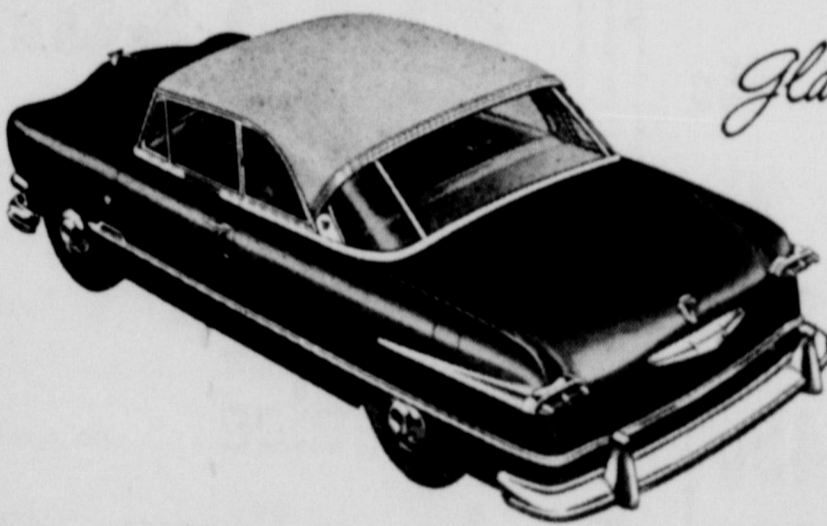

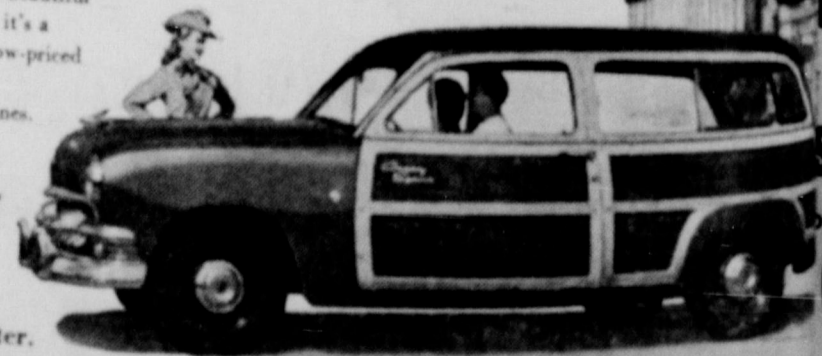
