verted a one-car garage at their residence into a miniature school room, and here, five days a week from 8:30 a.m. until 11 a.m., twelve youngsters, who were only five years old when school began, are taught letters, numbers, color words, and will be soon working on number words.

Mr. Vaughan had been a teacher in the Hurst Schools, and Mrs. Vaughan was employed in the County Superintendent's Office and served as assistant county superintendent in Fort Worth for fifteen years, before moving here. ## Area R.P. Economic Meetings Are Scheduled In November

Four kick-off meetings of the Rolling Plains Economic Program have been scheduled in Abilene, Rotan, Seymour and Paducah during the month of November.

An intense study of the economic influences in the 28 county Rolling Plains Area has been made during the past year, which was requested by agricultural and business leaders in the area to determine the principal problems and the major areas of opportunities in the Rolling Plains, according to Norman Brints, Area Farm Management Specialist and Coordinator, Rolling Plains Economic Program.

This has been accomplished by individual discussions with over 150 leaders and a review of research findings and other date pertaining to economic activities and resource use in the Rolling Plains.

The report, which includes suggested guidelines and program plans for more efficient use of the resources of the Rolling Plains, has been reviewed by the area committee and revisions and corrections have been made.

Brint said the report and guidelines are now ready to be presented to each interested representative that attends the kick-off meeting of the Rolling Plains Economic Program.

The first meeting will be held in Abilene, at Roberson Chapel on the Abilene Christian College Campus, on November 20, Re-

presentatives for this meeting will be from Callahan, Coleman, Nolan, Runnels, Shackelford, Stephens, and Taylor Counties. Second meeting will be in the Community Building in Rotan with representatives from Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Mitchell, Scurry, and Stonewall Counties.

The third kick-off meeting is scheduled in Seymour November 28 in the High School Auditorium. Counties represented will be Archer, Baylor, Clay, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young.

The last meeting will be held November 29 in Paducah in the Veterans Building on Backus Street. Counties are Cottle, Dickens, Foard, Hardeman, King, Knox and Motley. All meetings will begin at 1:30 p.m.; Adjourn at 4:30 p.m.

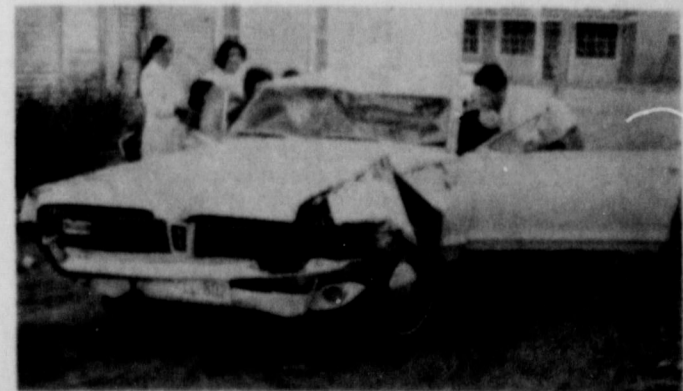
## Man Flips Vehicle Saturday In One-Car Accident At O'Brien

According to investigating officers, Bill Lusk and Roy Hollis of the Texas Highway Patrol, the car went into

a three-quarter broad slide to the right and overturned in a plowed field, landing on its top.

Barrios was taken to the Knox County Hospital and later transferred to a Wichita Falls hospital by Smith Funeral Home ambulance.

## VA Needs Full Information From Writers

Some people who get the fastest replies from the Veterans Administration may be disappointed, according to Jack Coker, Manager of the Waco VA Regional Office.

Coker said that his office receives an average of 500 letters per month that can't be answered fully because the writer failed to include enough identifying information.

To deal with the problem, Coker said that his office will endeavor to get the needed information by sending a form letter to the letterwriter, specifying the details needed to act on the original request.

A blank form is included in the VA letter so that the letterwriter can give VA such information as name of veteran, service number, social security number, dates of service, date of birth, branch of service, and VA file number, if the veteran has been assigned one.

Coker explained that VA maintains more than 30 million individual case files, thousands with the same name. So that each can be located quickly when needed, a number has been assigned to each file. Once the veteran or other beneficiaries of VA benefits is advised of this number, he should use it in all future correspondence with VA.

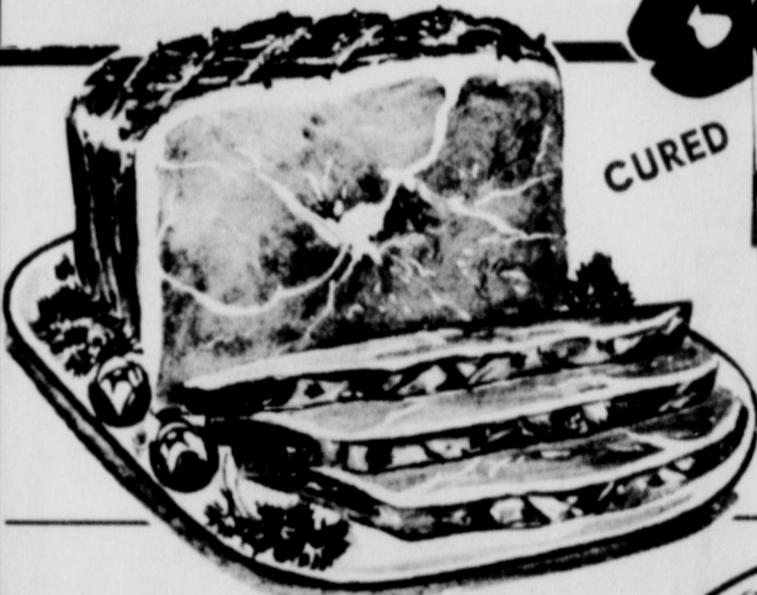

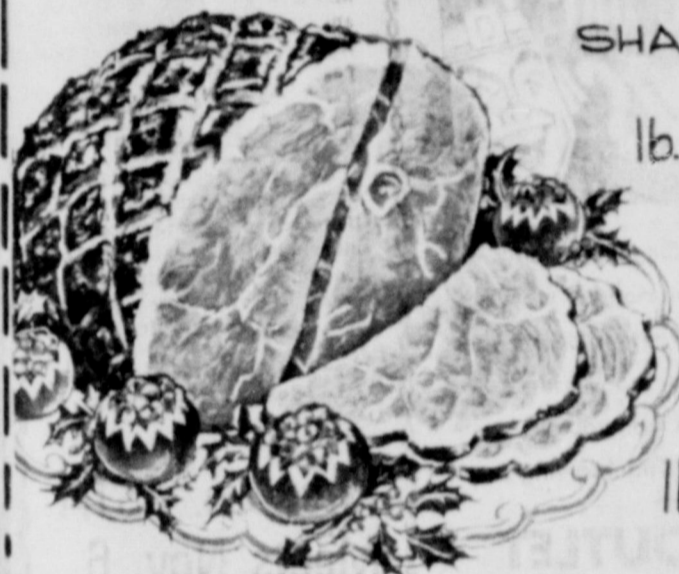

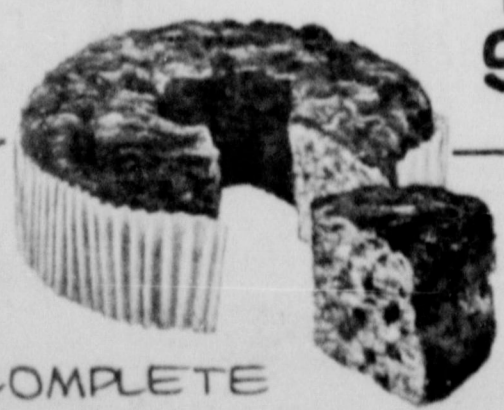
